# 1. Love Actually

This leaves Bernie feeling very guilty, that without the presence of parents shes managed to ruin Christmas and lose her baby sister. Meanwhile, Danny and his teacher, Mrs Trapper, set out a plan to rescue the parents and bring them home before the day is over. With everyone finally home, Bernie begins a rescue mission and is dedicated to finding Evie. Eventually, with the help of everyone in town, Evie is reunited with her family, and everything is okay.

The movie culminates in a happy ending on Boxing Day, where the town gather again for a swim in the cold sea. This highlights the themes that appear throughout, of community that the town possess. This film was also written by Richard Curtis, who is no stranger to a creating an amazing Christmas movie, with *Love Actually* also under his belt. This movie maintains a similar tone, with a focus on different families and people navigating through tough situations during the festive period, however That Christmas is tailored towards a much younger audience. Overall, this animated tale is a festive and heartwarming film that is filled with comedic scenes, love and friendship which make it a must watch during the holiday season.
