(DIAC). Students must first prove they are a



Genuine Temporary Student (GTE). This can be done through the Australian consulate or the embassy. You will then be required to fill out forms, declaring the type of temporary visa you will need. This is where it might get complicated and a visit to the *DIAC website* will help you find the right visa. You will also need a letter from the Commonwealth, stating your coursework and area of study.
