**Top University in Brazil:** University of Sao Paolo **Currency:** Brazilian Real - R\$ **Academic Year:** 2 semesters – August through December/February-July

**Student Visa:** A valid Passport with six months to expiration and four blank pages, as well as a Visa are required to study in Brazil. You must also include a copy of the confirmation of acceptance from the school or a copy of the school



registration. You must also include vaccination records, your financial records & evidence of funds to stay in the country, health insurance coverage, for those students under 18, there must be a copy of the birth certificate and a letter of consent from parents.

The current world-class performing arts and concert hall, The Sala Sao Paulo was originally a Victorian railway station. Ballet, theatrical productions and the Sao Paulo Symphonic Orchestra regularly perform at the venue. With music being such an important part of Brazilian culture, the schedule is filled with ongoing performances and productions year-round.

# Looking for a Private Day School in Brazil?:

With the structure of non-private schools in Brazil being poor, many international and Expat students attend international private schools. They are very expensive, however, the curriculum is rich with language requirements (multiple languages are taught), smaller class sizes and extracurricular activities. Some of those schools do offer a Boarding school option. Can You Work on a Student Visa?: If working on a student Visa, you must apply for a special temporary visa at the Embassy or Consulate. These visas are valid for up to one year and are called VITEM-IV visas. Students with a VITEM-IV are allowed to do an internship but that internship must be a paid internship. If not, then the best time to visit Rio is usually right after Carnival in late February or early March when the temps cool down and the tourists leave.
