## Behind the Lens with Jim Gilmore

An interview with Flagler College film professor

As professor, filmmaker, and director of over 20 documentary films, Jim Gilmore uses his many talents to educate others about the power of film. His journey began when he was traveling between the suburbs of Chicago and southwest Michigan while attending Kalamazoo College, majoring in theater, communication arts, and political science. After dipping his toe into filmmaking, Gilmore pursued a master's degree in broadcasting and film at the University of Iowa, which, as he says, "is ultimately what allowed me to teach, though I actually had no desire to do so." This distinction arose from some bad experiences he had with teachers, so rather than calling himself one, Gilmore claims, "I've always seen myself more as a filmmaker than a teacher."

Because Gilmore's approach to education is not traditional, his specific outlook on the subject led him to institutions such as St. Joseph's Catholic Academy, the University of Michigan-Dearborn, and now, Flagler College. He now passes along his experience in cinematography as a visiting filmmaker for Flagler's new cinematic arts major. Gilmore believes strongly that film has the power to open people to different world perspectives.

He explains his thinking by analogy, "Why do you try foreign food you've never tried before? Because it's good to try new things, right? Then sometimes you find you really like something you hadn't thought you would, and it becomes a passion."Distinguishing "film" from "movies," he views film as a distinct art form meant to affect people as individuals rather than appeal to the masses. As a member of the St.Augustine Film Society, Gilmore reflects on its importance, saying, "There's no cinema here in St. Augustine, so the Film Society fulfills a need people have for independent, foreign, and documentary films with important messages and thought-provoking perspectives." Challenging perspectives is what Gilmore believes a film society is equipped to do, and in his eloquent words, he conveys that it can be a showcase for meaningful films here in our small town.
