THE EXTRACTION FACTOR

A round up of the latest extractor innovations and trends taking over the market this year Words Danielle Lett

hen installing or refitting a kitchen, one of the most important appliances to include has to be the extractor – and the figures speak for themselves. "The UK extractor market itself is worth £125m in 2019, and will grow a further 2% this year – with the sale of extractors having increased by 15% since 2013," explains Mark Waddy, director of MTW Research. According to MTW Research's Kitchen Market Report 2019, by 2023 it is forecast that some 700.000 domestic extractors will be sold in the UK, reflecting the demand in the market – due in part to the growing preference for open-plan and brokenplan kitchens.

"Extraction is a massively growing market", says Lucy Dunstan, UK product manager at Smeg. "No longer an afterthought for homeowners, there are now a huge range of options, styles and technologies available when it comes to extraction, with many designs to appeal." But before deciding which type to opt for, there's an assortment of factors to consider.

Firstly, the layout of the kitchen itself needs to be taken into account, in order to determine the appliance's suitability. "Retailers need to be sure that they are selling the customer the right extractor for their kitchen. An extractor that is not powerful enough to clean the air effectively will just lead to complaints after installation," says Steve Corbett, marketing manager at CDA.

With the rise in open-plan living making the overlap between homeowners' cooking and living spaces more commonplace, extractors that are not just effective but also a design point are a huge incentive – and manufacturers are taking note. "With kitchen spaces increasingly amalgamating with living spaces, manufacturers are responding by designing highly functional and stylish hoods that are quieter and more effective than what has previously been seen," explains Indesit's brand manager Sara Bazeley. "Cooker hoods can make a real statement, offering consumers the opportunity to create a focal point in their kitchen." Island and ceiling extractors have also benefited from the trend due to the 'zoning' of

UK kitchens, "growing sales by around 20% in the last six years", adds MTW's Waddy.

Not only do people want to make a statement in their kitchen – especially in open-plan layouts - but extraction that sets the tone with multifunctional lighting is another big draw. Owain Harrison, country manager for Novy, says: "The rise of pure recirculation extractors is in part an answer to the desire for décor hoods with mood lighting that can be situated anywhere in a larger open space.'

On the other end of the spectrum is extraction that is hidden as discreetly as possible. BSH Home Appliances ventilation product manager Sean Liddle says: "People want the extractor to be powerful and efficient, but they're spending lots of money on the kitchen, and they don't necessarily want an extractor on display anymore." Ceiling hoods and downdrafts are on the rise, with research showing that downdraft extractors have 'grown share of the higher value market'.

To remedy this, extraction that is integrated into the hob is one way manufacturers are helping to keep components hidden, with Liddle adding: "A real innovation in terms of ventilation, the venting hob is two appliances in one. This removes the need for a cooker hood above the hob area or island, and means there are no obstructions to the space or views – it's all in one, compact and easy to use."

Regardless of kitchen layout or extraction preference, manufacturers will find that technological innovations are welcomed by the majority of homeowners. Max McCormick, product manager for kitchens at Miele GB says: "Smart appliances are gaining increasing momentum, and we predict that demand for smart appliances will grow. Smart appliances with wi-fi connectivity can offer precision cooking in a convenient manner. For example, Miele's hob with integrated extractor features exclusive Con@ctivity 2.0 technology. which automatically regulates the power of the hood depending on the hob setting. This allows users to fully concentrate on cooking, without hassle"

There is also the option of remote motors which remove the noise of the hood from the kitchen entirely and can substantially increase the extraction rate to 1362m³/h
