

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Where To Eat

At the Copacabana: Port Chester's Hot Dining Spot

f only your appetite had no limit. Then you could go on eating at Copacabana Brazilian Steakhouse as long as you wanted. Because the procession of meats on large skewers never stops—14 varieties, including flank steak, pork, and chicken sausages and the perfectly seasoned top sirloin steak. As long as you're ready for more, it all keeps coming. The restaurant calls it a "meat parade."

That's the main attraction at the Brazilian churrascaria—a downtown Port Chester favorite for the past decade.

"We pride ourselves on our service, on the quality of our meats—and on being the best churrascaria in Westchester County," says owner Luiso.

The meal starts with appetizers from the salad bar, including peel-and-eat shrimp and tomatoes with mozzarella cheese. The meat course comes with side dishes—rice, beans, fried bananas, salsa, and yucca flour. If you prefer a single entrée, there's classic Brazilian fare, including moqueca (a fish stew), and for a modern twist, salmon with passion fruit sauce.

For the perfect drink to complement the meal, try a tangy caipirinha, the national drink of Brazil. Copacabana's version was voted Best of Westchester in 2015.


With all that, it may be surprising that people have room for dessert, but they often do, Luiso says. It could be that the various versions of cheesecake, flan, and mousse, all made in-house, are just that irresistible.

Diners enjoy the meals in a lively room with goldyellow walls. A patio section fills with fun-loving soccer fans for televised games. Luiso plans a tiki bar out back to open next spring. But the restaurant's newest venue is its wine bar, centered around a granite slab on wine barrels.

"This is going to be a big hit," Luiso predicts. When complete, the wine bar will add one more feature that makes Copacabana guests feel like they are, in fact, in Brazil!



Roll WithIt: 23 Great Westchester Sandwiches


Hot or cold, piled high or melty with cheese, these are the county's must-have between-the-bread masterpieces.

The sandwich is arguably the supreme ruler of the food world what a simple concept yet so many permutations. Sandwiches are approachable, sometimes messy, downright delicious, and you probably find yourself scarfing one down more often than you'd care to admit. Still, a little more sandwich knowledge is a good thing, so embrace each one with both hands and an open mouth, and check out the **Great Sandwiches of Westchester**

Porchetta

Tarry Market, Port Chester I doubt there's a soul who can make a porchetta sandwich better than the Mario Batali/Joe and Lidia Bastianich-owned Tarry Market. The deboned pork is stuffed with hot sausage and slow-roasted to juicy perfection with crispy skin. The sandwich itself is simple: They slice and hack it up in front of you, including parts of the chicharrón-like skin, for added greasy crunch, and throw it on fresh Italian bread drizzled with EVOO.





The Julia Child

Got Thyme, New Rochelle Got Thyme proves that vegetarian sandwiches can be delicious, too! The Julia Child (Brie, arugula, caramelized onion, fig jam, and Granny Smith apple) is a sweet—but not too sweet—sandwich that gets pressed until melty and toasty.

Cubano Iron Vine, Peekskill

A real Cubano is made with buttered Cuban bread and then pressed to toasty perfection—exactly what they're doing at Iron Vine. They keep it mostly original, with Cuban bread from Rockland Bakery and all the traditional ingredients, like country ham, tender mojo pork, pickles, and mustard. The only thing they do that deviates from the norm is they use Gruyère instead of Swiss, which makes it nuttier and, ultimately, better.





Panino

Porta Napoli, Harrison



Balboa Larchmont Tavern, Larchmont


Toasty garlic bread, housemade rare roast beef smothered in melted Swiss, and ready to plunge into a vat of natural juices. Yeah, we're talking about that decades-old decadence known as the Balboa, whose gooey perfection can be enjoyed every day at one of the sandwich's earliest purveyors, Larchmont Tavern. Porta Napoli is doing wood-fired panini (I dare you to find one anywhere else) by using their very light pizza dough, which gets cut into a squarish shape, baked to rise, cut and stuffed, and fired again until that dough gets a perfect blistering. Their namesake panino (grilled chicken, avocado, homemade mozzarella, arugula, lemon vinaigrette) is fresh, fragrant, and on the lighter side. I have a feeling I'll be a regular for a long time to come.



Chicken Souvlaki

MP Taverna, Irvington

The pita is light, not doughy, and stuffed with chunks of marinated broiled chicken and all the classic veggie ingredients (tomato, lettuce, onion, roasted red peppers) and tzatziki sauce that has so much flavor, they should bottle and sell it. What's perfect about the marriage of ingredients is there's not an overuse of any one thing, and it's not overdressed.





Tammy Special (chicken cutlet) Royal Scarlet Deli, White Plains

It's no wonder Royal Scarlet Deli has been open for 75 years and counting. They serve up just about every classic sandwich you can think of, plus a bunch of original creations. Their chicken-cutlet flavor combos, stacked with thick pieces of fried, boneless breasts on crusty Italian wedges, are some of the best. I chose the Tammy Special, which marries the cutlets with plenty of roasted red peppers, fresh mozzarella, and lots of sweet honey mustard.

Parm Stars

Eggplant Parm

Amore Pizzeria & Italian Kitchen, Armonk

I judge eggplant by its tenderness and by whether you can tell it's eggplant. You see, I'm just not a fan. However, I kept wanting more of Amore's version, and having a rustic tomato sauce helps big time. If this eggplantparm non-fan liked it, true believers will love it.

Meatball Parm

Fortina, Armonk, Rye Brook, Stamford

It was a no-brainer for Fortina to take their already excellent deep-fried meatballs and tomato ragù and line them up on toasted Italian bread topped with copious amounts of grated Parmesan.

"BOH" Sandwich (chicken parm)

Amore Cucina & Bar, Stamford

While most spots make it classic, Bruno DiFabio's Amore puts their own spin on a chicken parm by adding a couple fried eggs and a touch of spicy Sriracha on top of house-made bread. Eggs and chicken parm? It works for brunch, lunch, or dinner.





Crispy Calamari Sandwich

Lex is a cozy, classy restaurant, but to take down this seafood sandwich and its sides, you'll need your elastic-waist sweatpants. While Lex offers only a few sandwich options, the crispy calamari stands out because you don't see something like this very often. It's a weighty sandwich on crusty Italian bread, stuffed to the max with lightly breaded squid, which offers a slight crunch while remaining tender. The tartar sauce that consists of yogurt, tuna belly, caviar, and dill, adds elements of creaminess and saltiness with an herbaceousness really coming through.

Fresh Roasted Turkey

Melt Sandwich Company, White Plains Melt Sandwich Company has endless options for creating your own sandwich. Some go together perfectly; with others, you can use your imagination and create something wild. It all starts with Melt's juicy roasted meats-done on the premises. They get serious props for their turkey, which somehow isn't at all dry. I paired the turkey with their cheddar-bacon-flavor profile. which means it comes with small chunks of smoked bacon, ripened tomatoes, gooey cheddar, and a spicy/smoky chipotle rémoulade.



Italian Combo

Cosmo & Alex Pisano Bros, Mamaroneck

When you step into this Mamaroneck Avenue Italian deli, you have to stop for a second and remember you're in a place that only *looks* like it belongs on Arthur Avenue. You should order an Italian combo—on a wedge—so you can experience the bread's chewy softness. The meat in combos differs from place to place, but at Cosmo & Alex, they're giving us a variety of hams: domestic, mortadella, capicola, and prosciutto—all layered evenly, so as not to give too much of any single ham. All that is combined with a sharp and strong provolone, not too many veggies (lettuce and tomato) and a restrained use of oil and vinegar, so the cold cuts stand on their own.



Curried Chicken Salad Sandwich

Bedford Gourmet, Bedford

Bedford Gourmet has a kicked-up chicken salad sandwich using its own curry blend, mixed with mayo and dill, that adds way more flavor than that bland, white mixture you're used to. It's served on Russian black bread that has a sweet, pumpernickel quality to it.





Mortadella Exit 4 Food Hall, Mount Kisco

They've got lots of choices under one roof (Italian, seafood, sushi, barbecue, local craft beer, and more) at Exit 4. One thing they're not short on is sandwiches. The mortadella on brick-oven-baked focaccia bread with arugula, Brie, and sweet-fig jam was my overall winner out of about 10 sandwiches sampled.

Executive Chef Scott Fratangelo's menu at L'inizio is divided along traditional Italian lines: antipasti, primi, pasta, secondi, and sides. Go with a pasta and choose from dishes like ricotta cavatelli with fennelsausage Bolognese and Parmesan or acorn-squash ravioli with Crown Maple brown butter; or opt for one of the secondi such as seared New York strip steak. Amore Pizzeria & Italian Kitchen Italian \$\$

This modern Italian eatery offers artfully prepared Italian fare in a casual, family-friendly atmosphere. 





The College of New Rochelle

Founded in 1904 as the first Catholic college for women in New York State (they went coed in the Fall of 2016), the College of New Rochelle is home to four diverse schools. The School of Arts and Sciences continues the all-women tradition and offers degree programs that include English, psychology, and business, as well as pre-professional programs and teacher education programs. The School of New Resources is designed for adults who wish to return to their undergraduate studies. In addition to the range of undergraduate and certificate programs, the graduate school comprises a number of master's degrees, from mental-health counseling and communication studies to public administration. The college is also known for its School of Nursing-a program that incorporates a compassionate approach to its rigorous curriculum.

Notable Alumnae: Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Madeleine Blais; Women's Wear Daily Executive Editor Bridget Foley; Shiba Russell, anchor, WNBC-TV/News 4 NY; and former co-chair of Disney Media Networks and president, Disney-ABC Television Group, Anne Sweeney

The College of Westchester

Recently celebrating its centennial, the College of Westchester focuses its course offerings and programs on career-relevant experience. The college is a close-knit community, and its graduates make up 25 percent of its employees. The college's six schools include the School of Digital Media, Accounting, and Allied Health, all of which offer flexible class times to easily accommodate adult learners. Hybrid classes are also offered across the curriculum, and in 2011, authorization was granted to offer the BBA degree and AAS degree in a fully online format.

Notable Alumnus: founder of Right Choices, Inc. Wade Young

Purchase College

Named by *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* as a Best College Value 2016, Purchase College sits on 550 acres in Purchase—just 35 miles from New York City. The renowned School of the Arts includes the popular theatre arts program, which boasts alums that have gone on to successful show-business careers. Purchase's liberal arts and sciences programs include a School of Humanities, Natural and Social Sciences, and the School of Film and Media Studies, which was recently added in 2010. The campus is home to the Neuberger Museum of Art, the 10th-largest university museum in the country, with 6,000 works in its permanent collection and 10 temporary exhibitions each year.

Notable Alumni: *actors Edie Falco, Stanley Tucci, and Parker Posey*

Berkeley College

In 1931, Berkeley College began as a finishing school for women in New Jersey. Since then, it has expanded to nine different locations. Berkeley College's White Plains campus offers seven different majors from its schools of Professional Studies, Health Studies,





Business, and Criminal Justice Studies—their most popular major. In addition to its on-campus classes, the college offers an online program, ranked as one of the best online bachelor's degree programs for two consecutive years by U.S. News & World Report. Notable Alumni: fashion designer Vanessa Deleon; boxer Paweł Wolak; television personality Teresa Giudice

Concordia College

Concordia College is a private college of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, located on 33 acres on White Plains Road in Bronxville. Founded in 1881, the college has gone through many transformations in its 135 years, evolving from a high school to a pre-seminary religious training school to its current incarnation as a four-year coed college. For the past three years, Concordia has been ranked in the "Top 5 for Ethnic Diversity" among colleges in the North, and it was named a Christian College of Distinction in 2015. At the foundation of Concordia's academics is "The Concordia Distinctive," a core curriculum that combines a liberal arts background with experiential learning through internships, service trips, and study abroad opportunities.

Pace University

Pace University's Westchester campus covers 200 acres in Pleasantville and offers 80 majors to undergraduate and graduate students. The school recently put its Briarcliff campus on the market in order to keep the university centrally located in Pleasantville. The renovations also include the relocation and construction of Pace's Environmental Center, with outdoor classroom space, a nature museum, and field-study labs for students in Pace's newly launched Environmental Studies and Science Department. **Notable Alumni:** television personality Rachael Ray; radio host and environmental activist Robert F. Sarah Lawrence College

Eschewing the traditional college system, Sarah Lawrence students build their own unique courses of study from more than 500 courses within four central areas: creative and performing arts: history and the social sciences; humanities and natural sciences; and mathematics. Traditional classes are replaced with "seminars"-a time for in-depth class discussion-while homework comes in the form of "conference work," allowing students to work on individual projects with their seminar professors every other week. With a 10-to-1 student-to-teacher ratio, SLC stresses the importance of the individual student through its advisor program, in which students are assigned a "don" who guides them through their academic careers through weekly meetings. With so many undergraduate students residing on the Bronxville campus, the tight-knit community enjoys an array of campus activities, from open-mic nights and instrumental ensembles to basketball games and independent-film screenings.

Mercy College



The longest of the four connected rail-trails repurposed from the defunct New York Central Railroad's Putnam Division line, this 22.1-mile section runs from Eastview in Mount Pleasant to the Putnam County border. It's part of a paved 40-plus-mile bike path stretching from Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx to Carmel in Putnam County—to the south it connects with the South County Trailway and to the north the Putnam Trailway. Ride this paved former rail bed with the Saw Mill River Parkway on your right and woodlands on the left. RiverWalk

Kensico Dam Plaza

Three hundred feet high and 1,843 feet long, the dam was completed in 1915 and is on the National Register of Historic Places. Lenoir Preserve

This nature preserve situated between Route 9 and the Hudson River in Yonkers, offers 40 acres of biodiversity. It is home to a number of tree species imported from around the world, including copper beeches from Europe, ginkgo trees from Asia, and Douglas firs from the Pacific Northwest. Cities

Mount Vernon

This city of nearly 70,000 residents has neighborhoods that range from quaintly suburban to densely urban. There are three Metro-North Stations and several shopping districts. The city hosts events such as the Arts on Third Festival, one of the largest arts and entertainment festivals in the county.

New Rochelle

Known as the "Queen City of the Sound," the city boasts miles of Long Island Sound shoreline. Between estates on private islands, older homes on quiet suburban streets, and urban skyscrapers downtown, housing options are diverse. New Rochelle is home to both Iona and Monroe College, as well as historical sites like Execution Rocks Lighthouse and Leland Castle and fun destinations like the 105-acre Glen Island Park and New Roc City, an entertainment and cinema complex complete with an IMAX theater, mini-golf course, and an arcade.

Peekskill


Between Hudson River waterfront views, art galleries, and live-in artist work lofts, Peekskill is the ultimate arts destination. The Hudson Valley Center for Contemporary Art regularly features exhibitions and programs, while Paramount Hudson Valley offers live entertainment, drawing in top comedy acts and musical performers. Throughout the year, trendy java joints like the Peekskill Coffee House and the BeanRunner Café host open mic nights for musicians to perform. Don't miss the Hudson Hop & Harvest Festival in the fall, featuring locally brewed craft beer and live music.

Rye

Although it's the smallest city in Westchester, tony Rye does not fall short of activities. Playland amusement park is easily the city's most renowned destination, complete with the famous Dragon Coaster and old-fashioned boardwalk. Picturesque Oakland Beach stretches down the Long Island Sound, and Rye's downtown district along Purchase Street is nearby for upscale shopping and dining.

White Plains

Commercial center by day, White Plains is a hub for corporate offices and shopping, including two major malls: The Westchester and The Galleria, as well as a freestanding Bloomingdale's. After dark, its nightlife scene surfaces with a number of bars, pubs, and lounges. Top-notch dining options are clustered around Mamaroneck Avenue, within walking distance to the luxurious Ritz-Carlton, Westchester.





Yonkers

The fourth most populous city in New York State, Yonkers sits right at the border with the Bronx. Ridge Hill and the Cross County Shopping Center serve as major shopping destinations within the city; both are outdoor malls with renowned retail and dining options. Empire City Casino at Yonkers Raceway has harness racing and a casino with 5,300 slot machines. Nearby is the Hudson River Museum, where you can find six art galleries, a planetarium, and the historic Glenview Mansion museum. Dine at Chef Peter Kelly's X2O Xaviars on the Hudson at the historic Yonkers pier.

Towns

Bedford

This chic rural haven, known for its miles of trails and horse-grazing pastures, offers residents the peace and quiet of tranquil countryside life. The town consists of three hamlets: Bedford Village, Bedford Hills, and Katonah—the most notable which features destinations like Muscoot Farm, Caramoor Center for Music and the Arts, and the Katonah Museum of Art. Celebrities like Bruce Willis, Ralph Lauren, Ryan Reynolds and Blake Lively, and Martha Stewart make their homes here. The queen of living well has been a Bedford resident since 2000, while actor Richard Gere is a co-owner of the quaint Bedford Post Inn.

Cortlandt

Defined by its many wooded hills, streams, and wetlands, this rural north-county town sits partially along the Hudson River, just south of Putnam County. Cortlandt is divided into two villages, Croton-On-Hudson and Buchanan, and multiple hamlets, including Montrose, Crugers, and Verplanck. The Cortlandt Town Center, which has a Walmart, big-name retail clothing stores, and a movie theater, is a favorite among locals.

Eastchester

The villages of Bronxville and Tuckahoe make up this family-friendly town. Spend the day out with the kids at Twin Lakes County Park or Interlaken Reservoir, or enjoy one of the county's best burgers at Piper's Kilt. Eastchester is an educational hub with award-winning public school districts and Concordia and Sarah Lawrence College campuses (both in Bronxville).

Greenburgh


Greenburgh's 36-square-mile border includes a whopping six villages—Ardsley, Dobbs Ferry,



Elmsford, Hastings-on-Hudson, Irvington, and Tarrytown—and three hamlets: Fairview, Edgemont, and Hartsdale. Visit the impressively modern Greenburgh Public Library in Elmsford, one of the biggest libraries in the Westchester Library System. Foodies will want to visit the Westchester Greenhouses & Farms for fresh produce. The hamlet of Hartsdale includes Poets' Corner, a neighborhood of neatly groomed 1950s ranch houses and Cape Cods built on 26 streets named for illustrious poets.

Harrison

Modest homes as well as a multitude of large estates, gated communities, and private country clubs constitute this south-county town. Within it is the hamlet of Purchase, home to the corporate headquarters of MasterCard and PepsiCo and two college campuses: Purchase College and Manhattanville College. While you won't find a downtown shopping district in Purchase, Harrison has shopping and restaurants along Halstead Avenue.

Lewisboro

This rural town borders western Connecticut, arching over the hamlets of Cross River, Goldens Bridge, South Salem, and Waccabuc. Lewisboro is known for its scenic charm with horse farms, riding trails, wooded fields, and seven lakes. Mountain Lakes Park and the Ward Pound Ridge Reservation span hundreds of acres, offering plenty of space for hiking, biking, camping, and fishing.


Mamaroneck

Nine miles of this town's beachy Long Island Sound coastline are lined with marinas, yacht clubs, and shorefront parks. Inland, you'll find a vibrant town known for its antique and vintage furniture and accessory stores, as well as trendy boutiques and mainstay eateries like Sal's Pizza and Walter's Hot Dog Stand. The town includes two villages—Larchmont and Mamaroneck.

Mount Kisco

Although spanning just three miles, Mount Kisco is packed with shopping destinations and a variety of dining options. Find large department stores like Target and Kohl's, chain retailers like Gap and Ann Taylor, and locally owned standouts like Wilson & Son Jewelers, Heller's Shoes, Beehive Designer Collective, Blithewold Home, and Churchills. Choose from Greek, Indian, Italian, and Mexican restaurants all close by. Café of Love, Winston, Village Social, or Little Drunken Chef are a few to try.

Mount Pleasant

With a total area of more than 24 square miles, Mount Pleasant encompasses the Village of Pleasantville and the eastern portion of Briarcliff Manor. Its several hamlets include Hawthorne, Pocantico Hills, Thornwood, and Valhalla. Visit Stone Barns Center for Food & Agriculture in Pocantico Hills for a tour of the farm and seasonal activities, or take a stroll around the impressive Kensico Dam in Valhalla.

New Castle

Comprised of the affluent hamlets of Chappaqua and Millwood, New Castle is famous for its topnotch school district, quaint little towns, and celebrity residents, including Bill and Hillary Clinton, Ben Stiller, and Vanessa Williams. Some of the homes here are historic, dating back to the days of the Revolutionary War. While in Chappaqua, check out the area around King Street for local food and shopping experiences such as Susan Lawrence Gourmet Foods, Local Ice Cream, and Family Britches.

North Castle

A cohesive blend of rural and suburban living, homes within North Castle's hamlet of Armonk sit on large plots of land, and the village is always bustling with its good eats and high-end boutiques. The town also includes the hamlets of Banksville and North White Plains. Visit Wampus Pond for scenic walks year-round and ice skating come cold weather. In September, check out The Armonk Outdoor Art Show, a gathering of more than 185 local artists at the IBM world headquarters.

North Salem

This quiet rural town is said to have more horses than people. Driving through, you'll spot several farms and open fields where horses and cattle graze. In the fall, apple picking at Outhouse Orchards and fresh-baked goods and produce at Harvest Moon Farm & Orchard won't disappoint.

Ossining

Home to the Sing Sing Correctional Facility since 1826, this Rivertown contains two villages: the Village of Ossining and a part of Briarcliff Manor. Ossining's Hudson River waterfront has several marinas and three boat clubs. On a clear day, residents are able to see the Manhattan skyline on the horizon. Also notable is Teatown Lake Reservation, a 1,000-acre reserve with 15 miles of hiking trails and diverse habitats as well as Wildflower Island, a sanctuary for more than 230 native and endangered wildflower species.

Pound Ridge

Within its 23 square miles, you'll find a country vibe among the hamlets of Sarles Corners and Scotts Corners. It's an affluent town filled with several restaurants, antique shops, and even Westchester's largest park, Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, which spans 4,300 acres into Lewisboro.

Scarsdale

Westchester's wealthiest town, Scarsdale has a Tudor-style downtown district lined with trendy boutiques, cafés, and restaurants. Beautiful homes and massive estates lie on the outskirts of the town, still in reach of Scarsdale's stellar school district (SAT score averages reach hundreds of points higher than the national average).

Somers

Bordering Putnam County, Somers offers a country feel with large areas of open land. Visit Stuart's Fruit Farm for fresh produce, pumpkin picking, and apple cider donuts in fall or to cut your own Christmas tree during the holidays. Historic to the town is the Elephant Hotel, built by Hachaliah Bailey between 1820 and 1825 (he brought one of the first elephants to America and toured with menageries of exotic animals). Today, the hotel stands as the Somers Town Hall.

Yorktown

Yorktown residents enjoy country pleasures with the convenience of suburban living. There are five hamlets within the town (Mohegan Lake, Shrub Oak, Crompond, Jefferson Valley, and Yorktown Heights). The Jefferson Valley Mall and the Cortlandt Town Center fulfill residents' shopping and entertainment needs.

Villages

Ardsley

As part of the town of Greenburgh, this tiny village spans only one square mile. While the town itself isn't bustling, the series of small strip malls down Saw Mill River Road offer a cohesive mix of independent shops, chain stores, and top foodie destinations like Riviera Bakehouse, La Catena, and L'inizio.

Briarcliff Manor


Ranked in 2014 by www.safechoicessecurity.com as the safest place to live in New York State, Briarcliff Manor offers a small-town setting with upscale amenities close by. This tiny village prioritizes education; its public school district is ranked among the top 100 in the country, and the village has one of Pace University's campuses within its border. It's also home to the awardwinning Trump National Golf Club.

Bronxville

Previously home to Joseph and Rose Kennedy, this picturesque, affluent village maintains a reputation for luxurious living—with a 36-minute Metro-North commute to Manhattan. While the village spans only one square mile, its downtown area is vibrant and extensive with a variety of restaurants, bars, and independent shops. Bronxville's public schools are among the best in the nation and are all housed in one building, close to the village's downtown area.

Buchanan

Located within the town of Cortlandt, this village (known as East Haverstraw during colonial times), comprises 1.4 square miles. It's home to Indian Point Energy Center, which produces 10 percent of the state's electricity.



Croton-on-Hudson

An artsy Rivertown with relatively affordable housing stock, Croton offers an abundance of public parks from which to admire its waterfront views and abundant green spaces. Visit Senasqua Park for picnics on the Hudson, Croton Point Park for the annual music-in-support-of-the-environment Clearwater Festival, or Croton Gorge Park for breathtaking views of the Croton Dam. The village has a small downtown with neighborhood eateries like Memphis Mae's and Ocean House, as well as standouts The Blue Pig ice cream shop and The Black Cow Coffee Co.

Dobbs Ferry

Part of the town of Greenburgh, Dobbs Ferry offers single-family homes plus a handful of condos and co-ops in close proximity to its downtown. There, you'll discover a busy dining scene, speckled with a few independent shops—the perfect college town for students at nearby Mercy College. For outdoor enjoyment, visit the Old Croton Aqueduct Trailway, a scenic jogging and biking route, or one of the village's many parks: Memorial, Gould, or Waterfront Park, overlooking the Hudson.



Elmsford

A hot spot for local businesses because of its numerous office parks, Elmsford is a workingclass community with a modest downtown strip. Destinations like Westchester Skating Academy, Sportime USA, and the Westchester Broadway Theatre offer distinct entertainment experiences.

Hastings-on-Hudson


Known for attracting successful writers, artists, and academics, this river village is home to playwright Richard Dresser, actor Kevin O'Rourke, fine art printer Ben Diep, and multiple Nobel Prize winners. The downtown area has an artsy vibe with a noticeable absence of chain stores. It's home to a vinyl-record store, gluten-free bakery, a handful of excellent restaurants, and several yoga studios.

Irvington

This historic riverfront village was once home to the great American author Washington Irving. Visit landmarks open for public viewing, such as the Stiner-Ross House, McVickar House, and Washington Irving Memorial. Along the tree-lined thoroughfare, which slopes down toward the Hudson, you'll find dozens of local businesses and eateries. Dine at one of the many restaurants with waterfront views, like Sambal, Il Sorriso, MP Taverna, or Red Hat on the River.

Larchmont

Named after its abundance of larch trees, Larchmont is widely recognized as a "Tree City USA" for its lush, natural beauty. Admire the village's greenery in one of its many quiet parks, including the 27-acre Flint Park or scenic Manor Park with gazebos, nature trails, benches, and spectacular views of the Long Island Sound. The charming downtown is replete with antique stores, art galleries, boutiques, and dining destinations.



Pelham Manor

Part of the town of Pelham, this tiny, well-todo village lies on the southernmost border of Westchester County next to the Bronx. With a smaller population than its sister village, Pelham, it maintains a preppie vibe. Various shopping and dining options are close by and easily accessible at Post Road Plaza, featuring a 75,000-square-foot Fairway Market, Dave & Buster's, Marshall's Shoes, HomeGoods, Lane Bryant, and Smashburger. You'll also find the New York Athletic Club at Travers Island, where members can participate in a wide variety of athletic programs.

Pelham

Art enthusiasts flock here for exhibits at the Pelham Art Center. The Picture House, a renovated 1920s theater showing mainstream, arts, and indie films, hosts a film club with critic Marshall Fine and special screenings with big-name actors like Ryan Reynolds and George Clooney.

Pleasantville

Located in the center of the county, Pleasantville is a charming village within the town of Mount Pleasant. Its downtown district is always bustling with visitors, who can stroll down its tree-lined streets and pop in and out of its numerous independent shops and restaurants



and visit its bustling farmers' market on Saturday. Well known to the village is the Jacob Burns Film Center, which regularly shows independent, foreign, and documentary films.

Port Chester

A village with a city-like feel, Port Chester offers a lively downtown area with an abundance of restaurants. Its culinary scene is vibrant with an array of cuisines to choose from, including Mexican, Peruvian, Colombian, Brazilian, French, Italian, and Indian. The village is home to the Capitol Theatre, a music venue where rock 'n' roll legends have performed and modern musicians still do. Also in Port Chester is The Waterfront, a mall featuring a 14-screen movie theater, Costco, Bed Bath & Beyond, Stop & Shop, and a range of dining options.

Rye Brook

While you won't find a historic downtown or train station in this Westchester village, the newly revamped Rye Ridge Shopping Center should service all your shopping and dining needs. It's filled with trendy independent stores like Lv2bfit and Indigo Chic Boutique, along with eateries like Fortina, Buddha, Chipotle, and Chop't. Rye Brook is also home to the 35-acre Crawford Park, which has softball fields, a playground, and the Crawford Mansion—rentable for special events.

Sleepy Hollow

The setting for the spooky tale "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow," the town has embraced its identity as a Halloween town. Come October, the village celebrates in style with haunted hayrides past the Old Dutch Church, Horseman's Hollow (which includes an appearance by the Headless Horseman), and the Sleepy Hollow Festival of Witches. Historic sites abound as well, such as the Rockefeller's Kykuit estate, colonial Philipsburg Manor, and Sleepy Hollow Cemetery—where notables like John D. Rockefeller, Brooke Astor, Washington Irving, and Andrew Carnegie are buried.




Tarrytown

Anchored by a slew of antique shops and farm-totable restaurants, this Rivertown exudes a fun energy and earthy vibe. Many single-family homes and townhouses have been built along the Hudson River, and they afford breathtaking views of the water and the Tappan Zee Bridge. Unique to Tarrytown is Lyndhurst, a historic Gothic Revival mansion built in 1838. Also standing since the 19th century is the 843-seat Tarrytown Music Hall, where a range of performers have graced the stage, including Ani DiFranco, BB King, Cyndi Lauper, Gregg Allman, Michael Bolton, Norah Jones, Tony Bennett, and Wynton Marsalis.

Tuckahoe

Although spanning less than one square mile, Tuckahoe manages to squeeze two train stations, a bustling Village Square, and an old-timey Main Street within its borders. Notable stops include Growlers Beer Bistro, Roma Restaurant, Martine's Fine Bake Shoppe, and the Westchester Italian Cultural Center. **UG**





Scarsdale

DeCicco Marketplace

Originally a tiny storefront grocery in the Bronx, DeCicco's has grown into a regional fine-food-market empire that includes ten county locations (12 overall). Look for weekly flyers with deals on staples such as Fage Greek yogurt (10 for \$10) and Ronnybrook Ice Cream (\$3.99/pint). Yes, ice cream is a staple!

Great Stuff

Style mavens shop here for cool designer clothes, accessories, jewelry, and outerwear (Searle, etc.); other stores are in Rye, Chappaqua, and Westport and Greenwich, Connecticut.

Chase Park

This tidy bit of green space hosts free events including Bike and Blade Night and The Westchester Band concerts.

Parkway Coffee Shop

Traditional American standards can be had at this throwback eatery with cozy booths and mismatched plates. Try the massive turkey club or French toast.

Rothmans

There's no excuse for the men of Westchester to not look sharp with this high-end men's clothier, open here since 2003; its sister store is in Union Square. Lubin's Boys Clothing, a young men's suiting and dress-separates institution, shares space within.

Scarsdale Inquirer

In 1901, the first year of publication for the newspaper (then oncea-fortnight; now weekly), single copies were 3 cents, an annual subscription was 60 cents, and advertisements were 25 cents an inch. Advertisers included B. Schweitzer Carriage and Wagon Builder of Scarsdale, M. Luikert Butcher of Tuckahoe ("Dealer in choice beef, mutton, veal, lamb, pork, poultry"), and Boyce Photographer of White Plains ("Sit till you're satisfied. No extra charge.").

Wilson & Son Jewelers

The business started by Morris Wilson, on Amsterdam Avenue on Manhattan's Upper West Side in 1905, is continued by his great-grandsons and Gemological Institute of America grads Michael and Matthew in Scarsdale (and Mount Kisco).

Zachys Wine & Liquor

If you can't find your bottle at Zachys, you probably won't find it anywhere. The family-owned wine and liquor store, founded in 1944, offers expert in-store service, plus thousands of selections online that include label images, tasting notes, and an inventory system that frequently updates.

Moscαto

Under the same ownership as Chat American Grill in Scarsdale and Lusardi's and Chat 19 in Larchmont, Moscato offers consistently good Italian dining.



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Peekskill

The Coop

From folk art and jewelry to home accessories, baby clothes, and cards, the majority of the items at this artisan gift boutique are handmade and one-of-a-kind from local artists.

Paramount Hudson Valley

Formerly known as the Paramount Center for the Arts, this 1,100-seat theater built in 1930 is the artistic anchor for a downtown that's home to many visual artists. (Downtown is zoned for artist loft living.) The seats, stage, and concession stand have been restored to their former glory.

Beale Street Barber Shop

Opened in May 2012, this retro-cool unisex barber shop has oodles of Elvis memorabilia, a live-music stage, local artist exhibits, and a tufted bluevelvet sofa in the waiting area.

Gleason's

There's lots to like about this sister restaurant to Birdsall House: apps and flatbread pizzas made using local ingredients, a wall of movie posters (a healthy percentage of which feature former Peekskill resident Jackie Gleason-and yes, that's who the eatery is named after), and a crafty craft-beer selection.

Arthur Weeks & Sons Iewelers

Customers may not arrive in horsedrawn buggies as they did in 1896 when this jewelry shop opened, but they can be assured a Weeks family member will still be there to assist.

For more than 116 years, generations of the Ford family have been involved in the three "R"s of the piano business: rebuilding, restoring, and refinishing. Ford Piano has worked on pianos for Duke Ellington, Stephen Sondheim, and John Lennon.

The Gazebo

Located on Jan Peek Square-named for the New Amsterdam merchant and fur trader who arrived in the area in the mid 1600s to trade with the Lenape people-the gazebo is the location of the annual city holiday tree-lighting, among other civic events.

Moorish Revival Tower

Among the contributing elements to the Peekskill Downtown Historic District is this tower, an example of the Moorish Revival architectural style especially popular in Europe and the US after the mid-19th century. La Villetta II Pizza and Pasta currently occupies the circa-1880s building.

Kathleen's Tea Room

Raise a cup of tea (there are 52 loosetea varieties) steeped tableside in gorgeous teapots at this English-style tearoom that's as authentic as its teas are delicious.

Birdsall House

A craft-beer gastropub located in the spot that was once the headquarters of George Washington and the Continental Army. The British razed Peekskill twice during the Revolutionary War-those dang Redcoats!



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Mount Kisco

Bicycle World

Owners Eric and Ilene Marcos often serve as advocates for improved bike paths in the Hudson Valley; they stock more than 600 bikes, all assembled in-house.

Billy's Hair Salon

For approximately 30 years, Billy Galasso and staff have made Westchesterites that much more beautiful.

Cafe of Love

Sister to nearby soup maestro Ladle of Love, this 55-seat, French/New American farm-to-table restaurant serves such dishes as seafood bouillabaisse, short ribs bourguignon, and a farmhouse salad chock full of local ingredients. Whatever entrée you order, don't forget a side of the truffled chickpeas.

Chief Kisco Statue

This painted zinc-alloy sculpture atop a water-less fountain, originally installed at Main Street and Moger Avenue, was one of 20 stock figures exhibited at Philadelphia's Centennial International Exhibition in 1876. On the base of the pedestal are the words: "God's Only Beverage For Man and Beast." There is no evidence that a Native American named Chief Kisco ever existed.

Lalibela Ethiopian Cuisine

You may ask for utensils at Westchester's only Ethiopian restaurant, but the traditional way to eat this cuisine is by using the spongy injera flatbread to scoop up a variety of stews and dips.

Mount Kisco Village Hall

Trivia question: Is Mount Kisco a village or a town? Answer: It's both! Starting in 1875, Mount Kisco was an incorporated village—one half of it in the Town of Bedford, and the other in the Town of New Castle. In the mid '70s, the Village seceded from the Towns and emerged as a coterminous and independent Village/Town of Mount Kisco effective January 1, 1978. The name on the building was never changed to include "Town."

Elephant's Trunk LTD

No, you'll never forget that this formalwear and designer jewelry and accessories boutique has been open since 1971.

NEO World Bistro & Sushi Bar

Far from a commonplace pan-Asian restaurant, NEO offers innovative dishes like a sushi tortilla, udon crawfish étouffée, and a grilled New Zealand rack of lamb with mesclun/ Fuji apple/basil vinaigrette.

Frannie's Goodie Shop

A frozen yogurt café serving probiotic-friendly YoCream out of Portland, Oregon, with 12 flavors daily and more than 80 toppings.

Heller's Shoes

This Best of Westchester-winning (2011) footwear specialist has been around since 1960.

St. Francis of Assisi Parish

This Catholic church honors the patron saint of animals and the environment, St. Francis, who created the first nativity scene in 1223 (a "living" version).



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
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Bronxville

NewYork-Presbyterian/ Lawrence Hospital

In 1906, after real estate/pharmaceutical mogul William Van Duzer Lawrence's son Dudley almost died of an appendicitis attack en route to a New York City hospital in the baggage car of a train, he decided Bronxville needed its own hospital; Lawrence Hospital was founded in 1909. Bronxville residents can pay their respects at William's grave in Valhalla's Kensico Cemetery.

Park 143 Bistro & Fish

Many of Chef Andrew Hopkins' best dishes at this seafood-centric bistro are found on starter section of the menu including mussels prepared three ways, shrimp and grits, and mahi mahi fish tacos.

Chantilly Patisserie

Macarons, those pastel-colored, meringue-based confections (a box of six is \$10.50), are a specialty at this Parisian-inspired bakery. Also, belly up to the new cupcake bar.

House of Botticelli Bridal Boutique

Guido and Fernanda Botticelli own this bridal boutique, which won a Best of Westchester Readers' Pick in 2010. Bridal collections include Lazaro, Pronovias, and Reem Acra, among other exotically and intriguingly named designers.

Adrian East

Longtime village residents will remember this upscale children's boutique in its former life as Fierson's, which opened in 1960.

Scalini Osteria

Just off Bronxville's main thoroughfare and featuring the cuisine of the regions of Italy that border the Adriatic (i.e., Puglia, Abruzzo, Marche), this restaurant offers fabulous seating during warmer temps in the Europeanstyle snug back courtyard with planters and paved brick.

Lange's Deli of Bronxville

The go-to sandwich spot in Bronxville, Lange's has been around for more than 25 years. Signature sandwich to try: the Morning Glory with Ovengold turkey, pepper Jack cheese, sliced green apple, and honey mustard on seven-grain bread.

J.C. Fogarty's

Across the street from the Metro-North, Fogarty's is a traditional dark mahogany Irish pub split into a bar area (with a common burgers/wingstype menu) and a more formal dining area (offering a separate menu of more complex fare).

Savanna at Home

A fire that began at an adjacent spa in 2011 forced owner Patty Canale to move her luxury home store from Kraft Avenue to the current digs on Pondfield.

La Gravinese Jewelers

A third-generation "bench jeweler" (an artisan who uses a mixture of jewelry-making skills to craft/repair jewelry), Robert La Gravinese opened his Bronxville store in 1976. Say hi to Lotus, the sweetheart Golden Retriever often found relaxing behind the counter.

Port Chester



The Capitol Theatre

This 1,800-seat concert venue on the National Register of Historic Places has had previous incarnations as a catering hall and vaudeville and cinema theater. Acts ranging from the Stones and Dylan to the Dead and Courtney Love have performed here. The grand-opening performance in 1926 included "The Star Spangled Banner" by a 10-piece orchestra and a showing of The Sea Wolf (based on the Jack London novel). A double feature at the time cost a nickel.

El Tio

Jay and Patty Barajas have been serving genuine Mexican fare (try the chimichangas and taco trio) since 1991.

Hubba

Formerly know as Pat's Hubba Hubba, Hubba is a greasy-spoon institution where seating consists of 13 counter stools, dollar bills stand in for wallpaper, and menu items are scribbled on paper plates in marker. Whatever you order, get chili on it.

Berger True Value Hardware

Skip the nearby Home Depot and opt instead for this independently owned hardware store for everything from key-cutting to painting and plumbing supplies to a new grill.

Pollo A La Brasa - Misti Restaurant

The name refers to blackened or rotisserie chicken, so you know the signature dish to order at this Peruvian restaurant.

Spanish-American War Memorial

Okay, so it's no World War II or Civil War (it lasted but 4 months), but the 1898 Spanish-American War did give the US two of its five unincorporated territories: Guam and Puerto Rico. The names of 22 Port Chester men who died serving in the conflict are inscribed here.

La Placita Supermarket

Aisles of Latin American foods— Mexican, Colombian, Brazilan—can be found here.

bartaco

California-beach-bar-inspired décor; Mexican street fare; a curated tequila list; and a stylish patio facing the Byram River make this a hotspot for people-watching and hook-ups.

Landmark Condominium (former Life Savers factory)

Susan Lawrence Gourmet Foods

Outfitted with a copper-gilded tin ceiling and Carrara marble-topped tables, this breakfast/lunch café offering 40+ entrées, salads, and sandwiches, as well as fresh-baked breads and pastries, is also a well-respected caterer.

Desires by Mikolay

Open since 2004, this jewelry boutique has won multiple Best Of Westchester awards; brands sold at the store include Hermès, Alex Woo, and Mizuki, plus a Tudor-inspired collection by owner and master jeweler Scott Mikolay.

sherry b dessert studio

Horace Greeley House/New Castle Historical Society

The former home of the man who helped found the Republican Party as well as the New-York Tribune (one of the widest read American newspapers during the mid-20th century) is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The New Castle Historical Society (Chappaqua is a hamlet in the Town of New Castle) purchased the house in 1998 and restored it by 2000.

New Castle Community Center

The New Castle Recreation and Parks Department manages this facility, offering classes ranging from yoga to tap dancing and women's self defense plus preschool and senior programs.

Family Britches

Many Chappaqua denizens dress well due to this family-run clothier that offers top-quality fashions from upscale designers for him (Canali, Toscano, and Allegri) and for her (0039 Italy, Niu, and M. Missoni).

Chappaqua Village Market

Owners Tony Milazzo and son Vinny have been feeding residents of Chappaqua and the surrounding area prime meats, fresh produce and fish, local dairy, and baked goods (don't miss the almond biscotti) for more than 40 years.

Always the Children

For lunch, this café serves salads, soups, and pressed sandwiches made with local ingredients. SoCo Creamery micro-batch ice cream is for dessert.



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
Mutant Manor

Under the Leather

A few years ago, there was talkof unearthing the Leatherman's grave and doing DNA testing to find out who he was and where he was from. What ever happened to that?

The Leatherman was a—let me find the right politically correct term-homeless individual? Vagabond? Explorer? Well, anyway, he was this guy who roamed the mountains and woods from the Connecticut River to the Hudson River from about 1858 to 1889. clad head-to-toe in a homemade leather outfit. His body was believed to be found near Mount Pleasant in 1889 and buried in Sparta Cemetery on Route 9. In 2011 the grave was exhumed. "...We found coffin nails, but there were no remains left, like teeth or bones, that would stand up to DNA testing," said former Ossining Museum president Norm MacDonald, who oversaw the project. "We know no more about the Leatherman than we ever did."

Known as the Great One, Jackie Gleason is a cultural icon in America. Gleason had a deep interest in UFOs and all things extraterrestrial, though he was reluctant to admit it publicly. Cortlandt Manor address). He referred to the secluded house on 196 Furnace Dock Road as The Mothership, and it looks remarkably like a classic flying saucer. Everything in the house was circular or rounded, which was no doubt an homage to the subject of his fascination.

There's an urban legend that one day, after playing a round of golf with friend and fellow UFO fanatic Richard Nixon, Gleason was treated to a private tour of an alien morgue by the 37th POTUS. Gleason's ex-wife even spoke of this incident in an Esquire magazine interview, saying that it traumatized Gleason. The two divorced shortly after that, so her veracity is uncertain.



The Dogs of War

I went with my friend when he had his cat buried at Hartsdale Pet Cemetery. While I was there, I went by a memorial for war dogs. How did that come about? -Brianna Gutierrez, Scarsdale

Founded in 1896, the Hartsdale Pet Cemetery is the oldest pet ceme-• tery in the US, and it is on the National Register of Historic Places. After World War I, in 1923, the War Dog Memorial was made to pay tribute to the thousands of dogs that served in "The War to End All Wars." In World War II, the US Army employed 12,000 dogs, and they played an important role in Pacific Theater battles. The memorial recognizes the service of canines in the time of war. The dog in the statue is looking off in the distance, to symbolize its commitment to vigilance, while its paw rests on a dented Army helmet, signifying the rescue of a wounded soldier.

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


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
