

Noon

Cross the street and make a right onto Chatsworth Avenue to poke around **7** Anderson's Book Shop (96 Chatsworth Ave; 914-834-6900; www.andersons booksny.com), located about a block up.

12:30 pm

If you like a leisurely lunch, head back to Palmer, to **3 Lusardi's** (1885 Palmer Ave; 914-834-5555; www.lusardis larchmont.com), for some of the county's best Mediterranean cuisine. Or visit **9 Turquoise** (1895 Palmer Ave; 914-834-9888; www.turqmed.com), a laidback restaurant specializing in Turkish food.

1:30 pm

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Cooking Outdoors

Iron Chef judge Donatella Arpaia shares how she created her amazing outdoor kitchen. and how you can entertain with finesse in the great outdoors.



ot everyone has the space that chef and TV personality Donatella Arpaia and her family are lucky enough to have, but you can steal her tips and style from her own outdoor kitchen in Greenwich for yours at home (no matter the size).

When it came to her own backyard kitchen, she says "I wanted a kick-ass kitchen, especially after living in the city for so long. I finally had the space."

No matter what space you have to work with, functionality does not have to trump style, Arpaia says.

"For me style always follows function," she says. "People really need to know that they don't have to settle for ugly. I think about the function, and then I think: *How can I make it look great?*" For her kitchen, Arpaia thought it important to have a full line of appliances, which she found in Lynx.

"I wanted it to be a complete outdoor cooking experience," says Arpaia. "So everything I can do inside, I can do outside. There is a sink, burners, a grill, a wine refrigerator, and I have a wood oven." This comprehensive approach to design minimizes running back and forth for virtually everything.

To design her dream outdoor kitchen, she followed some simple but smart tips. "Walk in your space and lay it out," says Arpaia. "[Do] a mock run-through of cooking something, to see what makes sense, where the sink should be, etc."



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Arpaia drew the elements of her design on cardboard, cut them out, and placed them around the space before building started, to ensure that everything was where she wanted it to be. "Because once you do it, you can't undo it," she says.

She also says to listen to the professionals, but don't let them push you around. And, she notes, couples should design the space with the chef in mind. If one of you is the primary cook, do what works for that person.

You should also consider lighting when designing your outdoor kitchen. "It's really important," says Arpaia. "[Everyone] is grilling throughout the year, and at nighttime, during the winter, it gets dark [earlier], so you want to make sure you have good light." One of the more special features in Arpaia's outdoor kitchen is the stone oven, which has her name etched above it. "It is crazy awesome! Not only can you cook pizza in it, you can cook many different things," she says.

The personalization was a present from her husband. "I knew [the oven] would anchor the entire kitchen," says Arpaia. "Right across from it is where I do cooking demos, where my son sits on the counter, and where we make pizza. In Italy there is a tradition of putting your name on the oven. If you go to Naples, where my father was born, you see names on the ovens. That's why my husband surprised me with it."

Entertaining Tips

From Donatella Arpaia

The restaurateur and entertaining expert shares suggestions for creating a successful get together.

Plan ahead. Think about what you and your guests will need ahead of time. Whatever you can eliminate once the party starts is really important, says Arpaia. If you have help, have them come 40 minutes early, and tell them where everything is. Let them get the lay of the land, and give them the timing of everything you want.

Simplify the menu (which doesn't mean boring).

You want to enjoy yourself and the party. I like to do an antipasti spread as an appetizer, says Arpaia. I like to focus on a main (a meat on the grill and a starch), and a dessert (usually with fresh fruit).



Hit every category, but don't go crazy. Make sure you have one type of beer, wine, water, and something for the kids.

Set up stations. Use beverage tubs. Set a table for the kids with everything they need. And be sure food stations are easy to find.

Make a playlist. Have music that matches the tone of the evening. Organize it so it's a little more mild in the beginning and then gets a little crazier, and then have it wind down when you want guests to start leaving, says Arpaia.

Create signs and clear paths.

Post signs for the restrooms, so guests are not walking through the whole house searching for one.

Think about lighting. You can do this inexpensively or expensively. Consider candles, citronella candles, torches, string lights, and more.

It's all in the details. I always have a table with bug spray, sunscreen, and a little firstaid kit, says Arpaia. If you think about what can happen ahead of time, it becomes a more intuitive experience for your guests.

Reduce the amount of

cleanup. I have a lot of ovento-table stoneware, and there is so much high-end disposable stuff now, says Arpaia. Mosaic has a great line of utensils and linens.

Keep everything near you

and organized. When you aren't searching for what you need, you can relax and have the best time.

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Donatella Arpaia's Grilling Must-Haves

- Stainless steel tongs
- Spatula wide enough to flip fish and meat
- Good grill brush
- Meat thermometer
- Squeeze bottles for marinades and dressings
- Kitchen towels instead of oven mitts

"I have a gas grill, and the technology today makes it so simple," says Arpaia. "It's as easy as turning on an oven, and it has taken the intimidation out of outdoor cooking. I like the fact that I have burners, so it's not just about grilling. I can make pasta, but I also have a flattop grill for pancakes and scallops. There's nothing like cooking outside. It's like a vacation."

Q: How would you describe your approach to design? Since you named your firm Clean Design, I'm guessing that's a big part of it. A: Yes! I named the firm very strategically and wanted it to reflect my style, which is clean and contemporary. I don't like a lot of clutter or fuss. I like streamlined, simple, functional, and comfortable. My aesthetic is not modern, and it's definitely not traditional. I can work in both of those styles, but the style I prefer is contemporary.

Q: How important is the "comfortable" part?

A: Very important. If something is uncomfortable or too fussy or too intricate or too ornate, I tend to stay away from it. My typical client is a family, and in today's world the design needs to work for the family and be comfortable. If it's not, people aren't happy.



Q: Where do you get your ideas?


A: To be honest, mostly my clients. I'm usually inspired by what they're looking to create. I guide my clients, but I have a very collaborative process. We work together to create the space they want, and I educate them along the way. I feel good knowing that I helped them achieve something they couldn't achieve without me, and they like feeling that they helped achieve what they wanted in the end.

Q: What are your favorite trends right now? A: I don't buy into so many trends necessarily. People misname trends, and the things I tend to like are actually classic, enduring design principles or elements. I love stainless steel appliances and countertops, for example. I don't really think that's a trend. It's classic and will endure. I love Lucite. It's a great material to mix in when you're combining fabrics and textures. That's not a trend. Everyone is concerned today whether gray is a fad and when it's going to be over. I don't think it's ever going to be over. It's a neutral classic that's been around forever, and it's just a matter of deciding whether you prefer cool versus warm. White is not over and beige is not over either!

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
Q: Do you have any favorite home accent pieces—a paint color, a wallpaper, a fabric?

A: I'm a huge fan of wallpaper and a big fan of color, too. My design style is known for being both neutral and very colorful. After the neutral base has been sufficiently created, I layer on color through artwork; pillows; and bright, fun fabrics. I don't overdo it on the pillows, but they're an easy way to add color and personality. And artwork is a must; you have to finish your space. Another accessory I really love is faux floral arrangements. They look so real and have no maintenance, and they're inexpensive once you consider the cost of fresh flowers.



Q: What do you like to do differently to a home in the summer? **A:** I try not to make a design season-specific because most people have busy lives and don't have time to be constantly changing things in their homes. I focus more on the exterior. I'm a big fan of planting white impatiens along a border in a big, long row in the front of your house. This adds curb appeal, and it feels good to drive up to your house and see those flowers every day. The white is a neutral, and then I put colored flowers in pots, whether flanking the front door or at the entrance to a pathway. Again, I like to use impatiens because they're hardy and low maintenance, and I use a mix of colors—orange, pink, and purple. This is similar to my design aesthetic: The majority is neutral, then I add colorful accents.

Q: What advice would you give to a homeowner who's looking to redecorate, whether through a major renovation or a DIY project? A: Keep it neutral until the end. I see a lot of people make mistakes with color. Adding color can be fun and amazing, but it can be tricky, so it's better to add color last. Another tip: Buy the rug bigger than you think it should be, and buy the lighting bigger than you think it should be. People tend to go too small on both of those!



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
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


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


Hot Annuals

Keep your garden colorful throughout summer.

The growing season got off to a rollicking start. Blossoms were bursting, color was pulsating, and everyone craves more of the same. But if you want the beat to go on, consider calling in reinforcements, because perennials often pause in midsummer. When the early bloomers are over, and the late show hasn't begun, you may want something to fill in. Bridging the gap is what annuals do best.

Annuals throw all their energy into now. Unlike perennials, which must store resources for future growing seasons, annuals don't survive through the winter. So they can safely pack all their resources into a continual show and keep pumping out blossoms until frost pulls the plug. Breeders have taken that natural tendency to flower without pause and dialed it up a notch or more. They've given us dwarf cleomes covered in flowers, lobelias that form little mounds of blooms, lantanas that become color carpets, portulacas in a rainbow of shades, verbenas that don't suffer from powdery mildew, coleus that can tolerate sun, million bells in the full spectrum, petunias that remain





Easiest Annuals Ever

Bacopa: For a cascade of white, pink, lavender, or pale-blue blossoms that laugh at neglect, this is your go-to.

Browallias: If you like sailor blue, this is the annual for you. Covered with bright-blue stars, browallias don't need deadheading.

Calibrachoas: Colorful, covered with blossoms, and easy to care for, million bells look like miniature petunias—no deadheading needed.

Coleus: When you want great foliage without waiting, coleus is it. And it is available in all shapes, sizes, and colors. Prune often to create a dense mound.

Impatiens: To avoid the issues pestering impatiens recently, go with the New Guinea hybrids. The SunPatiens series is colorful and heat tolerant. Lantana: Most lantanas become sizable plants, but the new Luscious Pinkberry Blend remains compact, with quiet pink and yellow clusters of flowers.

Lobelia: When you need something to cascade, lobelia makes a great draping plant. It becomes covered with tiny white, blue, or purple blossoms.

Portulaca: This succulent plant can go thirsty without fainting. Plus, it's covered with dime-size red, coral, pink, orange, or yellow blossoms. Prune it for a tight show.

Verbena: The old faithful trailing verbenas are still available (try the Superbena group), but upright Verbena bonariensis is also an option. It adds lavender-colored flowers on tall spikes. Want a compact, floriferous version? Try Meteor Shower.





compact, pansies that are more than just a spring affair, and impatiens without disease issues, plus much more. Annuals have a bright future; the trick lies in using them skillfully.

Nobody is suggesting that you go wall to wall, like the glaringly overwrought displays of the 1960smay the ribbon borders and bedding displays of that era rest in peacebut annuals still have their place in the garden. Tuck some annuals between your perennials for another dimension to the drama. Rather than waiting for the pause, put them in early in the game. Match or complement the colors in perennial foliage, and they'll strut their stuff when you need a little filler. Try these secrets to pull together a seamless annual display simpatico with a perennial border setting.

- Accessorize. When you dress for success, you factor your shoes and purse into your look. Similarly, use annuals to accent the garden, sprinkling the ever-ready bloomers around to bring out the color in the bark of a nearby tree or echo the shape of a perennial's leaf.
- Make a statement with multiples. One annual looks lonely. A six-pack feels half-baked. Go with a dozen or more. The more plants you put in, the more natural it will feel. Remember: Nature is usually generous. There are rarely onesies in the wild.
- Focus your energy. Rather than creating a crazy-quilt effect, go with multiples of the same cultivar. Choose an annual that works with your display and repeat it throughout.
- Choose the right plant for the right place. Check labels to ensure you position an annual where it will best perform. Blossoms will not smother a petunia in the shade. An impatiens is apt to wilt frequently in the sun.
- Care for your annuals. Even runway models need a little help from beauticians. Most annuals require

Sidewalk Warriors



Need fillers for a window box where wussies would wilt? Annuals are the plants for the job. Not only do annuals thumb their noses at tough growing conditions, they perform like pros throughout the growing season. Annuals make great frontmen when you need a dependable plant that will always be impeccably dressed.

Try these tips for selecting and planting annuals in containers:

- Choose annuals that don't need deadheading. Petunias can be labor-intensive, unless you love to remove spent blossoms regularly.
- Don't crowd your little minions. You don't want them squabbling over root space.
- Use a potting soil with plenty of organic matter, so your

plants get the nourishment they need.

- Use a container with plenty of depth so that annuals won't dry out frequently.
- Don't forget to water.
 Stressed plants will not look their best and may become prone to pests.

occasional pruning and trimming to encourage branching and become superstars.

• Echo your annuals. Add annuals to containers. If they echo the annuals from the beds, the result will be a "tied together" composition. In addition to mixed containers, consider displaying a mono container dedicated only to an annual prevalent in your garden beds.

- Underplant. Let annuals serve as a collar around taller perennials, or run them around the bases of trees.
- Say it with foliage. Beyond just pumping out flowers, annuals such as sweet potato vine (*Ipomoea batatus*), coleus, and dark-leaved dahlias add a foliar accent, as well.





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Life With Boys

When designing a bathroom for growing boys, two things are key: functionality and durability. Here's how one designer mom achieved both—and kept good style.

Trust is key in a designer-client relationship, and Dorye Brown had the instant confidence of her clients on this bathroom renovation—after all, she's their mom. Brown's vision for a stylish yet functional bath for her sons, ages 9 and 11, was a blend of contemporary and traditional decor that could grow with her boys.

"I didn't want to make it too babyish or too masculine," she says, "just handsome." She retained the footprint and location of the plumbing in this bathroom, situated in the family's center-hall Colonial in Purchase, but gutted the space for a complete update.

Anchoring the new bathroom is a double vanity that Brown designed. It was built in alderwood by American-reproduction-furniture shop Mulligan's (a Los Angeles trade-only source to the stars) and painted in layers of Benjamin Moore colors, resulting in a distressed look that improves with age. "The boys are rough and tough on this piece," says Brown. "They leave stuff right on the finish, and it's held up. There are a few nicks, but they look like they're part of the piece," she says, noting that it's important to have closed storage and open shelving, for easy access to towels or laundry baskets. White oval cast-iron sinks by Kohler were set above the top of the vanity both for the look that complements the white trim in the room and also because the chunky raised edges protect the vanity surface from splashes.

Colors found in the Waterworks penny round floor tiles inspired the hues in the rest of the room,

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
including the Ralph Lauren striped wallpaper and the sailboatpatterned fabric for the Roman shade. The subtle grays and blues are set off with high-gloss white trim in the substantial crown moldings and baseboards, as well as the wider-thannormal bead board that Brown specified for a transitional look.

Her sons have matured from bath takers into shower guys, and their new shower starts with a cast-iron drop-in tub with a beveled-brick subway-tile surround, all enclosed with glass doors. Every detail counts in the design, including the glass in those shower doors and in a partition that separates the toilet from the rest of the bathroom; Brown opted for ultra-clear Starphire glass, which has an attractive aquamarine edge.

Brown credits her contractor, Van Carvalho of Edgewood Contracting Corp. in Port Chester, for his expert installation. When the vanity arrived, it measured 1/8" bigger than the space. "But not to worry if you have a good contractor," says Brown. "There's a solution to every problem." Carvalho notched out the wall a little bit and cut the bead board around the piece so that it appears to be a perfect fit. "It was a little bit of a 'sweat' moment," she says, "but then it became an 'aha!' moment."

The Marble Masterpiece

The Ahearn Home • Yonkers

he vision: "This was envisioned as a natatorium, the technical term for a swimming pool that has its own separate building," explains Fred Cox, the architect on the project, who worked with Will Parker of the same firm and Janet McHugh of Artistic Tile. "This was built to be used by two brothers and their families, who share the property."

How it coordinates with the home: "The house is a Tudor built in 1926. It's a little Gothic, a little classical," Cox says. "The pool house is done with the same brickwork and stone as the original house. It's meant to be like one of the great estates of the early 1900s, with an indoor pool reminiscent of that era."





Key elements: "In addition to the pool area, which has a seating section, as well as a TV for watching games while you're swimming, there is a rotunda leading to the mezzanine, which contains a family room, changing room with shower, and kitchenette. On top is a patio area. Next to it is an outdoor country garden with patio and dining. A bar area is in progress."

Standout feature: Tiles! Millions of tiles! Each area of the building features different patterns and mosaics on the walls and floor. "We wanted to make it a very special, beautiful place unto itself," Fox says. "It's almost like the walls are covered in murals. We spent a lot of time considering what tiles would go where and mixing and matching. It was really quite fun." McHugh agrees: "It was like putting a puzzle together; this can work as wainscot, and it can work for flooring. It was a creative process of using designs and figuring out where they might go in this grand space—how to start and end them and how to border them," she says. "Without question, it's the most elaborate project I've ever worked on."

What it feels like to be in the space: "One really feels when you're there that you're in a storybook land," says Cox. "It has a real magical feel to it. You're transported. It reminds me of Hearst Castle or the swimming pool at the Beverly Wilshire Hotel. You expect Audrey Hepburn to come in wearing a beautiful ballgown from *Sabrina*."

The Year-Round Retreat

The Kantor Home • Scarsdale

he vision: "We wanted the pool house to be part of the design of the house," says owner and interior designer Tara Kantor. "Something that began inside the house and opened onto the outside that would allow people to easily go back and forth."

The look: "We had something specific in mind: whitewash, almost like a Miami Beach vibe."

What changed along the way: "Initially we were thinking about having a changing area and bathroom. But there is a bathroom right next to this room inside the house," Kantor says. "We also thought about having a table. But we ruled that out in favor of an open, airy area, in keeping with the way more people are entertaining. We decided to create a bar with stools, where people can come inside to get a drink, chat, and take a break from the sun."

Key elements: "The floor is porcelain tile made to look like

white, bleached, weathered wood. The sofa is covered in indoor-outdoor fabric that anyone can sit on, wet or dry. There's a refrigerator for drinks and cabinets for cups and everything else we need for entertaining. There is reclaimed wood in the ceiling, and the nano doors open 25 to 30 feet. There is also a TV behind the bar, so my husband can watch a football game from the pool. That was his dream."

Most pleasant surprise: "This was originally intended as a summer entertaining space, but it's been even more functional than we envisioned," Kantor says. "When we have friends and family over in the summer, the kids run in and watch the Yankees game and run back out to the pool. If we have friends for dinner at other times of the year, we have apps in the bar room and then head back to the dining room. It's turned out to be a year-round living room that happens to be a summer space, as well. It's beyond anything we imagined." The contractors on this project were Murphy Brothers Contracting.

he vision: "We were going for a combination of European hotel and Hamptons feel," says Emma Lesser, senior designer with JSE Interior Design, which handled the project. "Most of the architecture is speaking to the European portion of that. The furniture and color palette are more of the Hamptons side."

Additional goal: "We focused on the fact that this couple loves to entertain. They wanted lots of space in the pool area, so all their friends could enjoy it with them."

The feel: "It's a cool combination of luxurious but also something you can have fun in," she says. "That's not necessarily easy to achieve."

How it coordinates with the home: "It's a take on the house," she says. "There's a dome in the foyer of the home, and the cabana also has a dome. We used similar finishes, similar marble, and similar coloring on the floor. We used a lot of the same materials they used in the house. You have the

same privacy and the same feeling you do when you're in the home, but it's an extension of the home."

Key elements: "There's a bathroom with an exterior shower as well, along with a master bedroom and a living area. There's also a grill area, a microwave, and an indoor and outdoor wet bar."

Color palette: "It's a lot of light neutrals. The stone is light, and the furniture is all silver, white, and off-white, accentuated with black."

A slight problem along the way: "One of the neighbors wasn't that excited about the six-foot-high dome on top of the cabana that was obscuring their view," Lesser recalls.

The happy ending: "We flew in palm trees and planted them," she says, "so now they're looking at trees and not the structure. It really feels like they're on vacation."




he vision: "We wanted to integrate the new pool house with the existing main house and make it a bright, open, accessible place where people would want to be," says Robert Keller, principal of Keller/Eaton Architects, who worked with landscape architect Rivi Oren and interior designer Eddie Dumas. "We were going for something that was modern and light and airy and fun."

How he pulled it off: "The existing house was a shingle-style house with a stone first floor, but the owners' taste was more modernist than that. So we used the same materials—stone and wood—while reinterpreting them in a more modern way."



Key elements: "There's a small living room where you can hang out and watch a sports game—the husband wanted a TV at the pool house so he could watch weekend sports and still be with the kids," Keller says. "Indoors, there's also a kitchen and a bathroom with his-and-hers changing areas. Outdoors there's a hot tub with a circular bench and cushions, and a covered terrace where you can sit in the shade and still be at the pool. The curtains can be pulled shut if you want to block out the sun or wind, and they add a little color and interest."





Standout features: "One, we lit the building with a daylight band of glass that runs around the entire building underneath the roof. The glass gives the illusion that the roof floats above the walls and lets daylight in on all sides," Keller says. "For another, we built a three-story wall of glass on the main house as a way of integrating the main house into the pool house and vice versa. The pool house is quite a distance from the main house, and the big glass wall visually connects the two."

The result: "It's its own functional house where you can hang out in the building or be outside. You can get a snack, go swimming or watch TV," he says. "You could definitely just live there."

Bright, Bold, and Beachy

Just in time for summer, infuse some color into your everyday with tips from the designers of a Westport beach house.

he ladies behind D2 Interieurs are anything but shy when it comes to their personalities or their designs. They are bold, fresh, and colorful making them the perfect designers for this beach house.

The clients—a well-known local news personality, her husband, and their two young children—moved to Westport, CT from the city and were open to anything. And like all of the designs the D2 Interieurs team creates, this one had to be functional, child-friendly, and beautiful.

"The vibe was definitely a relaxed, modern beach house with infusions of color," say D2 Interieurs owner Denise Davies and creative director Kerri Rosenthal. "In a beach house, all the rooms should have a casual and relaxed feel. In the formal living room, in lieu of crowding it with furniture, we opted to do two Barcelona chairs and a custom ottoman in front of the fireplace. The client frequently has a glass of wine here at the end of the day. We [were] also able to push the design envelope a little more with a beach house."

Throughout the design, you'll find thoughtful placement of color. The palette was inspired by the ocean, but there are a lot of neutrals to work with, too.

"If you look closely, all the 'bones' of the rooms are neutral," say Davies and Rosenthal. "Color is infused through accessories and artwork. That way, if the client should ever want a little refresh or [wants to] change the pillows according to the season, it's a quick fix!"

One of the designers' favorite elements of the home is the custom front door, which they painted the perfect blue. When you open it, your eyes go directly to the Ikat wallpaper in the kitchen. "We wanted to give [the house] a beachyretro vibe, like Palm Springs in the 1970s," say Davies and Rosenthal. "I think we achieved it with [this] wallpaper and the Slim Aarons photograph. The wallpaper was the starting point for the rest of the house."

Another favorite is the porch swing. It was the first thing the client requested—before the couple even had a bed.

One challenge the design team had was blending the husband and wife's very different styles. "The wife is from Kentucky and is a bit on the traditional side, so the bedroom is a true reflection of her," say Davies and Rosenthal. "The husband is from the East Coast and has a more modern aesthetic, so the living room is more his style. The rest of the house is a true combination of the two of them."

Another key in the success of this design is the artwork. In addition to being an interior designer, Rosenthal is a well-known modern artist. The team often uses her work, in addition to other pieces. The blue abstract in the living room is by Linda Colletta; the painting in the bedroom is a vintage piece from First Dibs.

"We are constantly pushing ourselves to be different and not use the same pieces over again," say Davies and Rosenthal. "We would never want a house to look like the designer just left the building."





Tips for Success

Denise Davies and Kerri Rosenthal of D2 Interieurs share their best advice for a successful design in any home.

Merge styles. This can mean doing one style in one room and another style in a different room, or it can mean bringing different styles together in one room. Merging the varying styles a couple may share will make everyone feel more comfortable in the home.

Look at the whole house. Never look at one room individually—you want the house to flow.

Infuse vintage pieces into the design. This gives the house a sense of history and a feeling that it has been lived in.

Focus on two rooms and complete them, if you have a big project. It's better than having eight unfinished rooms.

Hire a designer. You will save money in the end. If you decide to go it alone, make a plan before you start. It will save you time, headaches, and money later on.

Buy what you love. It will all work out in the end.



Simple SUMMER entertaining

Easy and elegant touches come together to create a laid-back Provençal-themed fete. Here's how to pull off a similar party at your home.

E

ntertaining in the summer should be simple, elegant, and laid-back—not complicated, rushed, and "perfect." No matter what type of outdoor space you have, these beautiful and rustic (not to mention easy) ideas will work for you. Whether you're having an intimate dinner party for two or orchestrating a large gathering, just a few of these tricks will help you host an afternoon or evening event your guests won't soon forget.

The Table

We started by draping the dinner table with a crisp, white tablecloth and placing a burlap runner down the middle. Asiatic Pheasant dinner plates from Consider the Cook gave the table a Provençal look, while yellow plaid napkins brought a burst of color and a relaxed feel. Compotes of fresh fruit served as part of the centerpiece were enjoyed by guests after the meal. The theme continued with mismatched vessels filled with freshly cut flowers, including larkspur, delphinine, and clematis, and herbs such as mint and lavender. In lieu of place cards, sprigs of lavender were placed at each setting (name cards can be added for a more formal dinner party). To add a rustic touch, we put the salt in tiny wooden bowls.





The Bar

In a separate area of the patio, we set up a casual bar where guests could help themselves to signature drinks with special touches. The teak table was set with a preppy green-and-white seersucker table runner. The menu, which was typed up and taped to a cutting board, was both fun and functional. It included lavender lemonade, pink lemonade, mimosas made with two types of fresh purees, and Champagne.

Garnishes

To add a special touch to the drinks, we used three types of garnishes. The lavender lemonade got a sprig of lavender, edible floral buds floated in Champagne glasses, and skinny ice cubes had lavender frozen inside of them. (To make the ice cubes, use a silicone tray with long slits. Add the lavender sprigs before you put the filled trays in the freezer.)

The Favors

No party is complete without a little thank-you for guests to take home as a reminder of a wonderful get-together. And who doesn't love the smell of lavender? We filled glassine bags with small bouquets of lavender and tagged them "Just for You." (You can make the tags yourself on your home printer or purchase them from a stationery or craft store.)

Other ideas include a small bottle of wine or Champagne tied with a ribbon, a sweet treat wrapped in a glassine bag, or a candy buffet where guests can choose their favorites.







The Best Tips ^{for} Summer Entertaining

- Hire a caterer or pre-make food that can be served at room temperature. That way you can enjoy your guests during the party.
- Keep cocktails simple. Have a bar where guests can serve themselves a signature drink or wine and beer. Also offer nonalcoholic beverages.
- If your party is planned for outdoors, have a Plan B in case of inclement weather.
- Less is more with décor. A simple set-up means less prep, less clean-up, and more time with guests.
- Send guests home with a small thank-you gift, such as a sweet treat, flowers, or a potted herb.
- Enjoy yourself! If you're relaxed and having a good time, your guests will, too.

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To create a garden takes about seven years. To build a legacy landscape takes a lot longer. But that's just what Jay Robert Seebacher and his family did.

Jay Robert ("Bob") Seebacher's parents were visionaries, and that's what brought them to Ossining. Although they were infinitely proud of their one-third acre on the north shore of Long Island, they wanted to instill a sense of stewardship in their son. That's where Rivendel came in.


Bob was 19 years old when his parents came to him with a proposal. They were looking at a seven-acre property in Ossining. They would buy it with one stipulation: that he help maintain the land and eventually own it.

Although he was "a crazy college kid" at the time, Bob agreed. He knew full well what he was getting into, having accompanied his parents on various nursery and publicgarden excursions in his youth. He was aware that stewardship of Rivendel would mean much more than just mowing a lawn. Bob's goal from the beginning was to turn the slapdash property into a lush landscape, with all the work that entails. He embraced the challenge, through college and medical school, then through his residency in orthopedic surgery, while always remaining close to home. After all, he had a landscape to look after.

Even though the seven-acre lot includes an acre of pond and three acres of woods, the remaining three acres around the house—basically an inhospitable rocky ledge—required serious help. Dr. Seebacher was determined to forge gardens in its nooks and crannies. He made friends with nurserymen on his plant-finding junkets; he listened to Aunt Roslyn, a docent at the New York Botanical Garden; he talked gardening with his patients, and he soaked it all in. When his father died and his mother found the property too formidable to maintain, she came to him with another proposal. She gave him one year to take the property under his wing and become its owner. Again, Bob didn't have to think twice.

Initially, stewardship required more elimination than addition. "It was like the darkest jungle when I first came," Bob recalls of the heavily wooded property. Selective thinning was necessary to see the forest for the trees. There was no soil covering the rocks, which required additional topsoil to nurture plantings. The landscape was cold and windy. "It was harsh," he recalls of a garden that felt more like Zone 4 than the surrounding Zone 5 region.


Although the weather might seem like a stubborn adversary, planting midlayer shrubs created wind-buffering protective pockets. In addition, he forged pathways around boulders, to gain access to the rock ledge. Fortunately, he

had help in his endeavors. "For my first daytime date with Joanne, I brought her over to weed the property." Not only did the nurse whom he later married fall in love with the man, she also bonded with the land.

Finding plants that could endure the rigors required trial and error. The first solution was to plant 150 flats of impatiens (inspired by a Toronto garden), plus a lot of pachysandra, but Bob wanted a more natural, picturesque landscape-inspired by Andrew Jackson Downing's 19th-century aesthetic movement. There are people who like order, and there are people who like a more natural look, Bob realized. The good doctor fell into the latter camp. Fortunately, the nearby nature preserve at Teatown gave guidance.

"I learned to encourage wildflowers." He planted rhododendrons and acid-loving shrubs, to give the property an understory. He chose epimediums, primulas, jack-in-the-pulpit, Solomon seal, foxgloves, ajuga, and ferns that thrive in sparse soil and shady conditions while also preventing erosion. He nurtured wisteria to surround the pool with its blossoming branches. Gradually, the property began to look like the freestyle landscape of his dreams. Age, time, and maturity added to the natural ambience. Through an understory of stately shrubs and little wildlings that scamper around the rocks, Bob created a thrilling adventure that has gained intrigue with age. It feels like an expedition into the wild, but this wilderness features whimsical delight around every bend.

A shareable landscape was part of the goal. After treating an arborist who had fractured his leg, Bob hired the tree specialist to build a multilevel tree house in a stately silver maple, back in 1995. "It was the perfect trick to lure the kids out into the garden. They loved it so much that they slept out there," Bob recalls.

The young Seebachers grew up to be birdwatchers and frog admirers. "It's a family thing," says their father. Meanwhile, the naturalistic landscape continues to mature, and Bob is pleased with its evolution. "Gardening is ephemeral," he says. And given several generations of stewardship, this land is in caring hands.

They're taking a section of the property and creating a living space with hardscaping, landscaping, low-voltage lighting, and pergolas." A garden feature such as the pergola, which can be designed to include motorized shades, is now being manufactured using AZEK solid cellular PVC material that's pure vinyl with the weight and density of wood, yet it is impervious to moisture. "Walpole is able to build the pergola up to 32 feet between posts," adds Maglio. "When it's painted with a product made by Sherwin Williams, for example, a brand that offers a 25-year warranty on the finish, the structure requires little or no maintenance."



The master bedroom leads to an upper deck with a 180-degree view of the Sound.


