After all, it is a comedy sistom. Here is episode one which discusses the situation after the indescribable actions of police officers in 2000.

A little about it, the show is set in a fictional police precinct in Brooklyn, and we follow the lives of a group of detectives. This show has been praised for its bravery in tackling hard topics as well as its diverse characters. The core characters are a gay black police captain, a black sergeant, a bisexual Latina detective, a Latina sergeant, and two white detectives. People appreciate the show for not playing into stereotypes of POC characters in sitcoms.

Within 8 seasons, we see them tackle serious issues such as racial profiling, workplace assault, and sexism, all while maintaining the comedy aspect of the show. The initial approach of this show's unique is to open

up the conversation in a light-hearted way, making it easier for people to openly discuss them. The writers try to relate the episodes to real problems happening in the world, and they do that while delivering comedy and maintaining respect to the issue they're tackling. Let's look into the episodes where this comedy TV show successfully raised social awareness through its amazing stories.

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"Moo Moo"

(Season 4 Episode 16)

Released in 2017, this episode foreshadows the protests in 2016 following the killings of Alton Sterling and Philando Castile by the police. The episode spotlights the black sergeant, Terry Jeffords, as he was stopped by a police officer for no reason at all. Terry was walking in his neighborhood searching for his daughter's blanket when he was stopped and harassed by a police officer who wouldn't listen or believed him before knowing that Terry was a sergeant of the Nine-Nine. Terry's having a hard time dealing with the fact that the police officer apologized for not knowing that he was an officer sooner, not because he racially profiled Terry. The black sergeant spent the episode worrying about the

future of his daughters while trying to file a complaint that wasn't approved by his captain at first. In the episode, we also witnessed Terry's colleagues, Amy and Jake, struggling to babysit his daughters and having to explain what had happened to their father.

"Gray Star Mutual"

(Season 5 Episode 18)

It's easy for women to feel insecure when working with so many men and that is the case for Amy Santiago, our Latina sergeant. Amy and Jake were set to marry soon, but with all the wedding preparations they have to do, they couldn't fully turn back on their duties as an officer.

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As a woman, Amy had a harder time balancing both, she felt as if shopping for her wedding dress would make her look weak to her subordinates. Throughout the episode, Rosa Diaz, her co-worker, tried to help her overcome her embarrassment. They spent the day trying to find the perfect dress when they got a call about a perp nearby. Amy had to chase him with the dress still on and that made her feel powerful. It's really quite sad to think that a woman has to prove herself a thousand times more to be fully respected as a person, and it's more frustrating when that happens in your workplace. That wasn't the only time Rosa and Amy had to stick together when being faced with sexism issues. In another episode, when Amy was feeling a little jealous of Rosa's promotion, Rosa says, "We work at a police force full of dudes, we got to have each other's backs, okay?". It's disappointing to see a lot of women not having each other's backs these days. Us, women need to be able to count on each other for these things because no one else will understand what we go through.

"He Said, She Said"

(Season 6 Episode 8)

Being a woman means your words aren't worth much when faced with the one of a man. This episode is all about a woman's journey in the workplace and this world. The precinct received a very interesting case in which a guy, Seth, says his female co-worker attacked him for no reason at all, he is pressing charges and identifying this as assault.

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After interviewing the female co-worker Keri, we find out that she acted out of selfdefense after he sexually assaulted her. The firm had offered Keri a large sum of money if she let the incident slide, she would've taken it if not for Amy ensuring her that she needs to take a stand. Keri knows that this is a classic "he said, she said" situation in which no one is going to convict Seth on her word alone. On another hand, Rosa explains to Amy that Keri should've taken the deal because, in an almost impossible scenario that they win, Keri will still lose. She'll lose respect, name, reputation, and her job. It will be "two steps forward one steps back". Amy opened up why this case is important to her; she has experienced something like this before. After countless hours working the case, they finally got enough evidence, and Keri won. After all that, Keri had to quit the job she loved, she felt that the atmosphere in her office just changed, her career there is as good as over. Though Amy felt bad, Keri assured her that she is proud of herself for not letting Seth win and get away with anything. In the end, we see Keri's co-worker step forward about something similar that had happened to her, "Two steps forward, one step back is still one step forward".

Season 8

The events of George Floyd's murder in 2020 created a global "Black Lives Matter" campaign. As a TV show surrounding the lives of the NYPD, the writers and actors of Brooklyn Nine-Nine thought that it was inappropriate to treat the show as it was before. They decided to throw

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out the scripts they'd already written for the show's eighth and final season and reconsidered the show's perspective. They'd hope to be one of the contributors talking about these issues. Andre Braugher, who plays Captain Holt on the show says, "Can a comedy sustain the things that we're trying to talk about? I don't know. It could be a ground-breaking season that we're all going to be very, very proud of, or we're going to fall flat on our face... But I think this is a staff, a cast, and a crew that's willing to take it on and give it our best. I think we have a damn good chance to tell the kinds of stories that heretofore have only been seen on grittier shows".

"The Good Ones" - (Season 8 Episode 1)

We immediately see the impacts the events of 2020 made on the officers of the Nine-Nine precinct. Rosa has quit the force and became a private investigator working with victims of police brutality. Her decision to quit wasn't supported by some of her co-workers, one of them being Jake. He feels that by Rosa quitting the force, she thinks less of him for not doing the same thing. Jake jumps at the chance of working with Rosa again while trying to change her mind.

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During the case, they deal with body cam footage tempering by union officials which unfortunately also happens in real life. Rosa and Jake have different plans to get the real footage, when Jake's plan doesn't work, he gets frustrated and blurts out the truth to Rosa: he only agreed to work the case with her to prove to her that he's still a good person. Rosa rightfully gets angry at him saying that this case has nothing to do with him and neither does her decision to leave, all this is bigger than him. In the end, although Jake doesn't fully understand Rosa's decision to leave, he helps her out of trust, and they get the footage back. The injustice doesn't end there when they show the footage to the precinct's captain, her immediate reaction is, "I'm going to have to delete this". She resembles the, "one of the good ones" mentality and won't fire officer That's it, Jake then realizes that maybe no matter how hard he works or how good and pure his intentions are, he might be part of the problem.

Meanwhile, while all this is happening, Captain Holt is going through a divorce as a result of how hard being a black police captain has been during times like these. While all this has been going on, Charles Boyle, one of the detectives of the Nine-Nine, tries too hard to be an ally for black people. Terry, the black sergeant then tells him that he appreciates Charles's effort but explains that true allyship doesn't need to be some big gesture.

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

SEXUAL ASSAULTS EPISODE 2021: A NEW HOPE HAS RISEN

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Queerbaiting & How The Term Is Misused

Queerbaiting is originally defined as a marketing technique that hints at LGBTQ+ representation but never truly depicts it. This way of marketing is very harmful to the LGBTQ+ community. Medias are using their lack of representation to bait them into watching a movie, show, or reading a book that might have a slight chance of representing them.

Nowadays the term Queerbaiting is used not only towards works of fiction but towards people as well. Celebrities have the unfortunate privilege of having to grow as a person while the rest of the world watches them. Everything they do can cause a commotion on social media as if everyone is involved in their decision making.

A tweet made by an influencer back in June described the situation in the best way possible. A tweet by emattxiv:

"the conversation around queerbaiting has reached a confusing place — on one hand we say don't worry abt labels and on the other hand, if an artist presents even remotely "queer" we interrogate them abt their sexuality? yes queerbaiting bad but also there are

limits to this"

The tweet was made around the time when the media was talking about Billie Elish possibly queerbaiting her audience. She posted behind the scenes pictures of her song "Lost Cause" music video;

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in the caption, she wrote "I love girls". This created speculation about whether she was queerbaiting. Her comments section is filled with people angry at her or people defending her over the hate comments. This 19-year-old woman is being chastised for simply existing. It's normal and hard enough for teenagers to experiment and grow to find themselves, especially when doing it in front of everyone.

Other celebrities over the years have been a victim of queerbaiting accusations. People like Nick Jonas, Normani, Ariana Grande, Rita Ora have all been bashed for doing something closely resembling queerbaiting. The problem is not if they meant to do it, but the fact that the queerbaiting term aren't meant for them, they're not works of fiction.

On this day and age, people are easy to judge and voice their opinions on social media. A lot of people don't do the extra research, they post their opinions disregarding the facts.

An ethnic professor in Lawrence University talked to Rolling Stones magazine about people that are "premature to critical thinking". He stated that false accusations are harmful to active movements online and made a very valid point;

"People also have to decipher the difference between those who are performing for the heterosexual lens and that queerbaiting, which are very different". Those false accusations can easily cause mental health issues for the victim, which in this case mostly young celebrities.

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In the end as human beings with ethics, all of us must tolerate people's occasional mistakes and be the best version of ourselves. Queerbaiting false accusations are as much of a big deal as actual queerbaiting in media. Therefore, we mustn't misuse the term as it will directly impact both the LGBTQ+ community as well as victims.



It wouldn't be all that bad to get buried in a place like this," I thought to myself when I witnessed the beauty lying in front of my eyes. The plane ride from Wellington was pretty short, the whole time I kept my eyes glued to the window looking at the cloud's abstract shapes. The hour then passed and I could slowly make out the island known for its scenic view, I gasped a little. Looking down like a bird I see mountains so beautiful and so many of them, colorful flowers everywhere, and in the middle of it all, a lake so big I could imagine all the different animals living there.

My family and I had always wanted to visit this place, we've always enjoyed the beauty of nature and here it felt like we were being hugged by Mother Nature.
