A Conversation with Author Tera Arkin

Author of What Lies Behind Us

1. The writing style of What Lies Behind Us is so expressive. Can you tell us about your process?

Because my background is in theatre, my writing process mostly centers around dialogue. As a novelist, though, I still believe dialogue the best way to move a story forward, because the interactions and decisions of the characters are overall what creates the narrative. I really try to develop my characters thoroughly as human beings of their own before placing them into the setting of the story. As a result, What Lies Behind Us is a very character-driven story.

In terms of the plot, I utilized the traditional mystery novel technique by planning out the answers to any possible questions about the events that Sage and Taylor uncover in the novel, and then setting up the bread crumbs that bring them to that knowledge. The tricky part was having these story beats work with the story beats of Sage and Taylor's developing relationship, but I made it work by creating dueling outlines that meet at certain points in the narrative arc.

For my writing process itself, I write my drafts in my house and do editing at a coffee shop or public library. Being at home is comfortable to me so the words and ideas flow naturally onto the page, but editing feels more like work, so I have to bring myself into a more public, "presentable" space to make my work comprehensible to a general audience.

2. What drew you to this particular story?

My parents have always had a fascination with ghosts and the paranormal. We visited Roswell, New Mexico several times when I was a kid. This influenced the books I read and movies I watched in my youth; I was always drawn to fiction about supernatural things.

My whole family, as well, struggles with mental health issues, myself included (though I promise that it has nothing to do with the alien fanaticism). Most of my writing has involved themes about mental health issues, and for my first novel, I figured, why not combine the two?

The idea for this story came easily to me, but fleshing it out in depth was difficult. I had to do a lot of research about the prison system, and learned a lot about the awful history of police and prison violence in America. Much of this information isn't readily available unless you go looking; prisons will go to extreme lengths to cover up deaths and assaults. This is what inspired the idea of Taylor looking into her father's confidential records that the general public wouldn't have access to. This concept of secret-keeping and secret-finding is what guided me through writing the trickier parts of the book, because once I had established an unknown piece of information for Sage and Taylor, I had to figure out a way for them to uncover it.

3. The ideas of grief and change is strong in your book. What about these ideas moved you?

Obviously the concept of coming to terms with trauma informs what happens in the story, both before the book begins and during the course of its events. Everyone experiences some kind of circumstance that they can't truly deal with during the course of their lives; the way we differ is in how we deal with it. Some people never truly do deal with it, which often causes even more trauma for the people in their lives.

Humans are messy, complicated, and flawed creatures. For most of our lives, we are only able to manage what goes in our lives with the tools we're given, and this is the central concept that guides the plot of the book. Neither Sage nor Taylor came into this world with a good set of tools. In the book, the two learn, for better or worse, how they came into their lot in life, and try to understand the ways they've failed to deal with it before. They learn a lot about each other, themselves, and the workings of the world through the course of the novel, as I did while writing it. I genuinely hope that my readers will be able to gain a better understanding of their own circumstances by reading this story.


4. The setting of What Lies Behind Us adds much to the texture of the story. Can you tell us about why you chose to set the story there?

I grew up in a home less than three miles from the Washington State Penitentiary, so I've been hearing stories and rumors about the place for my entire life. I didn't set out to write a story about it initially, but once I realized that my story was going to address cycles of trauma and abuse, it seemed obvious to frame the story through the lens of the carceral system. Setting the story in my hometown, which is a place near enough to the penitentiary to observe its general existence, but far enough removed that those who do exist outside of it never have to know about the violence that goes on. Garrett is this privileged bubble that keeps itself on the fringes of Walla Walla, but never directly engages with the knowledge of what's going on there. I wanted to shatter that boundary through this story, making the reader have to acknowledge the reality of what's happening in my backyard, and theirs.

5. Is this book part of a series?

What Lies Behind Us is a standalone, but I have several novels in the works that also focus on transgender identity and the underpinnings of transphobia in the discourses of American society. My next book is set to come out in winter 2021, and, without giving too much away, it's about a busker who meets a film director and embarks on a mission to make the world's first flash mob feature length film.

Chapter Excerpt

Sage was damn near tired of everything. In the passenger's seat of their Ford Ranger, they'd sprawled out the contents of their messenger bag: a leatherbound journal, a billfold wallet, a lighter, a pair of dollar-store shades, and a paperback copy of Aleister Crowley's Book of Thoth. Nothing but the essentials. When they drove home, they turned the radio (105.9, currently playing Soundgarden's smash hit "Spoonman") up as high as it would go. It had been a long drive to Walla Walla and it would be an even longer drive home. Now that the night had fallen completely, construction along the I-90 ate up an entire lane of freeway, meaning that everyone and their grandmother would be funneled into three lanes of traffic on the drive back to Seattle. They were bumper-to-bumper behind a silver Prius, where Sage could see the driver obviously texting and not giving a damn who saw.

The construction phased out near the rest stop exit at the Wallula junction; after that, it was smooth sailing back home. Sage made a hasty effort to clean up the contents of their car, collecting the sundry garbage that had piled up after a week of traveling forty miles to and from their motel daily. It was mostly empty A&W cans and paper takeout bags, with a cigarette-butt-filled Gatorade bottle wedged under the seat for good measure. The trip from the motel they'd been staying at (a decaying specimen; all the surfaces were sticky and the shower spouted a murky, greenish substance that could barely pass for water) back to Seattle took four and a half hours. Thankfully, their schedule for the weekend was filled with a whole lot of nothing. It would take at least ten hours for all the footage from their UV camera to render; they planned to spend that time ensconced in a weighted blanket and sound asleep.

8am sharp. The alarm clock on the nightstand began to shriek out a series of beeps from under a pile of tissues and a tangle of phone chargers. With sleep still crusted into the corners of their eyes, Sage groaned and threw off the weight blanket, smacking the alarm until it turned off. They grabbed their phone and pressed the home button, letting the screen nearly blind them as their eyes adjusted to the blue light. Nothing new to speak of, unsurprisingly; no news or notifications that meant anything important to them.



Number of Books Sold in Spring/Summer 2020 vs 2021







