


# THEPROJECT

Propaganja is fresh take on the university sitcom genre with a three, female, queer protagonists from different races and social classes.



### AIMS

### Propaganja is a socio-political commentary presented through stoner comedy.

The current media representation of British universities is outdated. Previous shows fail to convey how social media has impacted student life, relationships and the university experience. Propaganja aims to showcase the untold truths of British university culture. People who refer to their twenties as 'the best years of life' often forget to mention the crippling debt, extreme loneliness and heartache, and turbulent path of self-discovery.

### INFLUENCES

Most students will experience the effects of addiction either personally or interpersonally. Young people deal with varying mental health problems that go untreated for years. They self-medicate because they can't get a GP appointment, and if they get that appointment, they're put on a waiting list with no interim support. There are waiting lists for waiting lists. The wait to be diagnosed is longer than the degree.

How do they cope? They get high.





### **Location Significance**

Manchester is Propaganja's birthplace.

The city of Manchester has a special space in my heart. It was the first place I felt I could be my authentic, queer self. That's not to say I didn't experience adversity or that I never felt Othered, but the queer and BIPOC communities in Manchester welcomed everyone and allowed them to feel seen and safe. Moss Side was the first place black neighbourhood I'd lived in.

Manchester, like London, is a multicultural city and arguably one of the best university towns. It caters to nearly everyone. The city is bursting with hidden gems down dark alleys and street corners. I have fond memories of nights out at the Gay Village, dancing and singing with drag queens and hazy memories of scatty raves at Depot Mayfield and The White Hotel.

The UOM vs MMU house parties in Fallowfield and the afters in Withington. I was drinking in dingy pubs in Hulme, ending up in dive bars in the Northern Quarter.

In the summers, we would have barbeques in Platt Fields Park and smoke zoots as we watched the sunset from skate ramps. On sunny days, we would visit Fletcher Moss Gardens for gorgeous views and have Roast Dinners in Didsbury like a family.



### **Episode 1: Fresher's Week**

Summer is over. Freshers Week is here. Roya is ready to party.

When Roya struggles to get along with her flatmates, she ditches an awkward flat partyto smoke a joint in the bathroom, which sets off the building's fire alarm and results in her getting kicked out of the halls three moving in.

Desperate for accommodation, Roya meets two girls, Amelia and Eve, who are also in her situation, and the three of them embark on the journey of finding a student house only days before the first term begins. Despite being the same age, the girls are starkly different, and the only thing they share in common is getting high.

Eve, the neurotic one, wants to escape her overbearing family and finally explore her sexuality.

Roya, the snarky one, wants a friend with benefits and a job in media to please her parents.

Amelia, the posh one, wants to have her cake and eat it, exploring non-monogamy whilst stringing along her on-again-off-again boyfriend, Laurie.

First Year is the place for reinvention and self-discovery, but the girls need a house first.




# ROYA FRANCIS (18)

Ending up in Manchester is a blessing in disguise as she uses the opportunity to reinvent herself. Her parents insisted she live at home whilst studying to save money, but Eve convinces them to let her move to Manchester (as it is only a 40-minute drive away.)

Desperate for freedom, Eve is ready to explore and experiment with her sexuality but is closeted to her family. Eve must learn give up her people-pleasing and focus on her own desires and wellbeing in order to mature and avoid being infantalised by her family forever.






