But I still call these my 'dark days.' The days when I was living paycheck to

paycheck, eating ramen noodles and returning bottles for gas money.

If it weren't for those days, I wouldn't be where I am today! Those days taught me how to persevere and as a result, I adopted a "never give up" mentality.

## Fast forward a few years...
