

Think you know how to cook? *The Photography* of Modernist Cuisine: The Exhibition at Seattle's

Pacific Science Center may give you a new appreciation for the art and science of fixing a meal. Sourced from the massive 24,000-page book created by ex-Microsoft executive Nathan Myhrvold, the pictures capture culinary dynamism and beauty with cinematic action shots as instructional as they are stunning.
