Karen Persichilli Keogh, Secretary to the Governor



Karen Persichilli Keogh serves in the administration of Governor Kathy Hochul as Secretary to the Governor, the highest-ranking appointed position in State government. Before joining the Hochul Administration, Karen served as the Head of Global Philanthropy at JPMorgan Chase & Co., where she managed \$2 billion in global philanthropic investments. She joined JPMorgan Chase in 2010 as Managing Director and Head of State and Local Government Relations.

Prior to her time in the private sector, Karen served on then-Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton's senior staff as New York State Director and campaign manager for her successful 2006 Senate re-election. She also managed U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand's transition from the House of Representatives to the U.S. Senate and served as a senior political advisor to Mayor Michael Bloomberg's 2009 campaign.

She is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and has served on a number of non-profit boards including the Stony Brook Foundation, iFoster, the East Hampton Trails Preservation Society, Invisible Hands, the Diamonstein-Spielvogel foundation and served as an ex-officio trustee of the Brooklyn Botanic Garden.

Ms. Keogh, affectionately nicknamed KPK, was born and raised on Long Island. She received a Bachelor of Science in Social Work from Stony Brook University and a Master's degree in Social Work from Columbia University. She and her husband live in Brooklyn and are very proud of their beautiful daughter Jessica.


FOSTER CARE





While Little Flower's ultimate goal is family reunification, we strive to meet the immediate needs of the child by recruiting high-quality caregivers as foster parents and appropriately matching them with children according to their experiences, strengths and skills. Support is available through a variety of services to ensure that each foster parent has the necessary resources to create the best home possible for the youth in their care.

As the foster care environment changes, we attempt to meet the needs of the community by offering a variety of specialized programs, such as the Preparing Youth for Adulthood (PYA) program, as well as provide a continuum of After Care services for youth exiting the foster care system.

ADOPTION SERVICES

Little Flower is committed to finding permanent homes for all children and adolescents who are not able to return to their families of origin because every child should have guidance, stability and love. Interested parents undergo a thorough application process, required training, and a full home study before adoption is considered. Little Flower has helped more than 5,100 children find their forever families since 1958.



FAMILY ENRICHMENT CENTER

Little Flower was one of nine service providers chosen to facilitate the opening and maintenance of a Family Enrichment Center (FEC), in partnership with the Administration for Children's Services (ACS). Family Enrichment Centers are family-centered hubs throughout New York City that offer community-based resources and support in a comforting and inviting space. By community vote, our FEC was named The Bed-Stuy NEST,

SERVICES FOR PEOPLE WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES



Little Flower has an unwavering commitment to providing quality services for adults with developmental disabilities. Each person is assisted to maximize their potential for self-care, social, emotional and physical development. The dedicated team of administrators, direct care workers and clinicians work together to provide a complete continuum of care.

We provide services in the Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Long Island. Little Flower's population of more than 350 individuals with developmental disabilities are offered Medicaid Service Coordination and two types of residential programs:

- Family Care: Most of our supported persons live with families who are certified by New York State and are supervised and monitored by Little Flower staff
- Individual Residential Alternatives (IRAs) are small-group residences that provides residents with opportunities for greater independence



HEALTH HOME

Health Homes is a care management model designed to help children in foster care gain access to critical health care and services that support their wellbeing. As part of the Collaborative for Children and Families (CCF), a health home of more than 35 child-serving agencies throughout NYC, Long Island and Westchester, children in our care have access to an extensive network of medical and behavioral health providers.

MEDICAL AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Little Flower's Mental Health and Medical Department utilizes a traumainformed, multi-systemic approach to provide children and families with quality medical and mental health services to support their physical, emotional, and general well-being.

Aligning with the agency's commitment to the Sanctuary model, we aim to heal the devastating effects on children and families of trauma, poverty, racism, substance abuse, violence, and lack of opportunity. We do this through the use of proven, effective mental health, medical, and support services.

About Little Flower (cont'd)

RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT CENTER



The Residential Treatment Center (RTC) is a therapeutic community based on the belief that a healthy and enriching community helps people heal. It is located on our Wading River campus. The RTC serves children experiencing trauma, socioemotional or behavioral challenges or who are on the autism spectrum. The young people reside in modern, home-like cottages and are offered an array of enriching recreational programming.

The Inner Lights Program is a specialized residential treatment program for children who need specialized medical or behavioral supports or who have a physical disability. It offers a home-like environment that balances the need for privacy with the need for supervision.



The RTC is also fortunate to have The Little Flower Union Free School District (UFSD) on campus. The UFSD, a Special Act Public School, is for students with special educational needs. It provides both Residential and Day placements for children in grades three through twelve. Teachers focus on each child so that their education, in tandem with the therapeutic milieu of the RTC, offers the opportunity to reach their highest potential.

ST JOHN'S RESIDENCE FOR BOYS



In 2019, St. John's Residence for Boys became an affiliated organization of Little Flower. Located in Rockaway Park, Queens, St John's is a nonprofit social services organization that provides residential foster care services to youth up to age 21. The campus provides youth with daily care, education, recreation and therapeutic services in an enriching environment. St. John's is dedicated to helping youth grow socially and emotionally, achieve their goals and return to their communities.

Residential Treatment Center

St. John's Residential Treatment Center provides a structured therapeutic setting for young people in foster care up to age 21. Youth live in family-style apartments and receive counseling, social services, comprehensive medical care, Preparing Youth for Adulthood services, career development, community service, and recreational opportunities.

Non-Secure Placement

St. John's Non-Secure Placement program provides long-term, residential and supportive services for adolescent males placed by Family Court. The program is connected to the city-wide initiative called "Close to Home," which allows young people involved with the court system to be treated and rehabilitated closer to their communities.





Louis Hansen and Father Quinn: A Little Flower Story

I was fortunate to hear the story of Louis Hansen from his daughter, Marian Hansen Isaac. Louis' parents emigrated to the United States from St. Thomas. In 1934, when Louis was just eight years old, his father suddenly passed away and his mother was unable to care for him and his siblings. Louis's father had wanted him raised Catholic, so his mom arranged for him to be raised at Little Flower's orphanage in Wading River while his siblings were placed elsewhere.

During his time at Little Flower, Louis was very proud of becoming an altar boy, learning to swim, and being trained in the Merchant Marines (as so many of the boys were). Father Quinn made sure that the youth received training and referrals to many city and state agencies when they aged out of care.

After leaving Little Flower at the age of 15, Louis began his life as a Merchant Marine, traveling to many parts of the world to assist Military efforts. He served proudly as a NYC firefighter and as a marine engineer on the city's fireboats.

Louis married Olga Garay, who had also grown up in an orphanage. Together they raised nine children. Marian describes him as a wonderful father, devoted to his family and providing for them lovingly. He continued to be a devout Catholic and was heavily involved in church activities such as the Knights of Columbus and the maintenance and care of his parish church.

Louis Hansen experienced many hardships in his life. But he often spoke of how grateful he was for everything he learned at Little Flower under the tutelage of Father Quinn. He fulfilled his late father's wishes and grew into a truly successful Catholic man.
