Demographic Insights: According to the World Health Organization (WHO), approximately 2.2 billion people worldwide have a vision impairment or blindness, with around 285 million being visually impaired. Within this demographic, there is a significant population of individuals who are blind or have low vision, representing a sizable market for inclusive sports initiatives such as blind cricket.

Market Potential: Despite the prevalence of vision impairments globally, the participation of blind individuals in organized sports, particularly cricket, remains relatively low. This presents a significant opportunity for growth and expansion within the blind cricket market, with the potential to tap into an underserved segment of the population.
