Sending your child to university can bring up many feelings - excitement, loss, apprehension and sometimes frustration in getting to grips with this new phase of life.

We're here to support you in this process, lending advice and information along the way to help you feel empowered and able to be there for your dependant in whichever way they need.

This guide lays out everything you need to know at this point in the process and offers tips and advice from parents and guardians in the same shoes as you.

Student life is more affordable than you think

Studying for a degree is a big investment but don't worry, we provide a whole host of financial support options to help your dependant get off to a great start.

All UK full-time undergraduate students can apply for a loan to cover their tuition fees. They will need to apply via Student Finance England* - applications usually open in March and close in May.

They can also apply for a maintenance loan to help with living costs which is based on household income and will only need to be paid back when they've graduated. For example, if they are a new student starting university in September 2024 they will repay 9% of everything earned over £25,000.**

Applicant timeline

January The official UCAS deadline date is usually in the last week of January. Universities will give equal consideration to any applications made on or before this date. Applicants that do not make this deadline can still apply or enter into Clearing.

March Applying for Student Finance early is recommended, visit **gov.uk** for details on how your child can apply for a student loan.

May If your child applied by the January deadline and they are still waiting on a decision from one of their choices, universities have until May to decide whether they will make an offer. Visit **ucas.com** to find the deadline date for this year. Remind your dependant the Student Finance deadline is coming up, and also to respond to any further offers.

June If your child has received all their decisions by May, they must reply to any offers by June. Except if they're using UCAS Extra to find a place, otherwise they will be declined.

July Clearing opens, enabling students to find remaining places on courses.

August A Level, BTEC and T Level results are released. If your child has received a conditional offer, then the university will be waiting to find out their grades before they confirm their place.

Jargon

You might have noticed the process of applying to university is full of acronyms and unfamiliar terms that can feel alienating, so here's your go-to guide for all the higher education jargon.

Admissions

The process to apply to study with us. Our Admissions Team are experts in assessing prospective students' qualifications, personal statements, and references to check if they are suitable for a course.

Applicant

Someone who has applied to university.

BA, BSc, BVMS, MEng etc

Letters indicating degree type and study level, for example Bachelor of Arts (BA) - BA (Hons) History.

Bursary

A monetary award based on need, that doesn't need to be repaid.

Clearing

A system helping students find unfilled course places, often used after A Level results day, but can be used from 5 July 2024.

Conditional offer

An offer to study based on meeting certain conditions. These are usually academic, eg achieving set grades in appropriate subjects.

Confirmation

When an offer holder meets all conditions, confirming their university place.

Deferred entry

Option to delay university enrolment, either when applying via UCAS, after you've submitted your UCAS application but before you have offers, or after you've accepted an offer of a place.

Enrolment

The formal process where students confirm course details and agree to our rules and regulations. Students enrol every year of their course.

Firm choice

A student's first choice course/university. It may be a conditional or unconditional offer and universities usually refer to this as a Conditional Firm or Unconditional Firm.

Foundation degree

A preliminary year of study that provides a route to study for an honours degree.

Graduate

Someone who has successfully completed their degree.

Insurance choice

This is a student's second choice institution and is a backup to their Firm choice in case they don't meet the entry requirements. If the first choice is an Unconditional Firm, then they won't be able to select an insurance, as they don't have any outstanding conditions to meet.

Interview or audition

Some courses require an interview or audition, to assess suitability for a course, before an offer can be made.

Offer Holder

Someone who has applied to university and has been made an offer to study a course.

Postgraduate

Someone who has successfully completed their degree and is studying for a higher level (usually master's) qualification.

UCAS

The Universities and Colleges Admissions Service. It is a shared admissions service for higher education in the UK and separate from universities

UCAS Extra

If a student has used all five choices on their original application, but is not holding any offers, they can add an 'Extra' choice.

UCAS Hub

A personalised space, helping students to research their options and apply for university in one area.

Unconditional offer

This offer means that a student has already met the conditions required to study with us, so the place is theirs if they want it.

Undergraduate

Someone currently studying for their first degree.

Parent, Alison Gudgeon says:

"I've had two different experiences, as my daughter chose to live at home and commute to uni, whereas my son is currently in his second year at uni and is living in a shared house. It does take a little while to adjust when they move away but I've found that terms are quite short and breaks for Christmas and Faster are generous, which means some quality time when they are back home. I try and arrange day visits every now and then to catch up and go for lunch. And take some food supplies and home-cooked food - free food is always welcomed!"

Alison's Top Tip:

Arrange regular times to catch-up whether it's every couple of days or once a week, that way you won't feel like you're being intrusive, but you'll have peace of mind that they're okay. Let them know you are there for them anytime.

Location

As a compact campus, almost everything is within walking distance, including accommodation, lectures, shopping centres, nightlife and great places to eat - this means they'll save money on transport and get active at the same time.

It's easy to get around Lancashire and beyond, thanks to excellent public transport links. If your dependants are thinking of staying at home and commuting, there's a robust network of trains, buses and cycle routes with options to pay weekly, monthly and per semester to save a little more cash.

Railcards are pretty handy when it comes to travelling, with 1/3 off certain fares, they'll be more likely to make the trip home to see you. We're on one of the main train lines in the UK, with places in easy reach such as:

- → Edinburgh 2hr 18 mins
- → Glasgow 2 hr 37 mins
- → London 2 hr 12 mins
- → Birmingham 1 hr 32 mins

A little closer to home we have great links with Manchester, Liverpool, Blackpool, Southport and Yorkshire.
