This book was fast-paced, and the writing style was truly engaging!

Pippa Fitz Ammobi, a 17-year-old high school student in a small town, Little Kilton, chooses a six-year-old unsolved murder case of Andie Bell for her senior capstone project.

The ending was so unexpected and left me speechless.

Throughout the story, she meets many harmful people (murder suspects and drug dealers??) but doesn't back out.

She compiles a persons-of-interest list, and as the plot goes on, the list expands and even adds her best friend's sister.

"I've already learned my lesson here: when you catch someone lying about a murdered girl, you go ask them why."

I also admired how Sal's brother, Ravi supported her at every turn. After starting an investigation together, the two quickly come to realize that they may have gotten themselves into a serious mess.
