- 3. Setting up Fun-filled Learning: Thinking from a student's perspective, many students lose their interest in a topic or subject, when they are unable to involve themselves in the class proceedings. A good teacher is one, who always comes up with innovative and interesting ideas to keep the students involved.



Recollecting my student life, I would plan to present my students an interesting classroom demo with live activities, which would include their participation. The eagerness to know the results of the activity

is the best driving force towards engagement. Moreover, in the world of digitalization, some intriguing audio-visuals can be the best to lure their attention in the class.

4. Exploring their creativity: As mentioned earlier, every student is unique in their own way. So is their creativity. Any person, when is allowed to follow his / her passion, evolves with flying colours. Using the same concept, an innovative step to implement the creativity of my students through some projects rather than suppressing them with homework or assignments can help them grow interest. This not only helps them learn, but also increases their power of imagination and provides quality knowledge.
