TIME

Accessing the Seaport District is relatively easy, but the neighborhood is large. From South Station, you can walk anywhere along the Fort Point Channel, but for farther afield take the Silver Line. If you're headed to South Boston, take a Red Line train and get off at Andrew or Broadway. By car, both the Seaport and South Boston have a moderate amount of street (free after 8 pm and all day Sunday) and lot parking.

East Boston poses more of a challenge. It's long, lean, and residential, so the best way to explore is by vehicle. Taking public transit is not impossible; ride the Blue Line to Maverick, Wood Island, Orient Heights, or Suffolk Downs and be sure to know where you want to exit. Blue Line and Silver Line trains service Logan Airport.

GOOD TO KNOW

GETTING HERE

Travelers looking for a vibrant nightlife scene should visit South Boston after dark, particularly along Broadway, with its abundance of bars and restaurants.

While distinctly different, the Seaport, South Boston, and East Boston have one major commonality: Boston Harbor. Historically, the Seaport has supported the textile and commercial fishing industries with its working piers. South Boston and Fort Independence have safeguarded the city from attack by sea since 1643. And, in East Boston, Donald McKay built record-setting clipper ships.

Today, a lot has changed. Over the last 15 years, the Seaport has transformed from an industrial no-man's-land to a vibrant, bustling extension of downtown Boston. Luxury hotels and residences, manicured micro-parks, upscale restaurants both local and national in name, and cutting-edge cultural institutions have all found homes here. Development projects remain in the works, so the face of the Seaport will continue to adjust for years to come.


Heavily populated South Boston has experienced its own renaissance, more so in the form of putting polish on existing multifamily homes and old-timey Irish bars rather than making room for new construction. The neighborhood's residents, both Southie lifers and young professional transplants, walk and walk: they walk to meals, they walk to Boston's best stretch of beaches, and they walk to and around Castle Island for exercise year-round.


Across the harbor, East Boston has been a haven for immigrants, first Italian and then Latino, and today's population reflects this heritage. Logan Airport is Eastie's crown jewel, but there are only a few other cultural sites to see unless you count the abundance of authentic Latin restaurants.

The Seaport

What's the appeal of the Seaport District? Bostonians have only been able to answer that question recently. As the neighborhood becomes developed, and its former life as a parking lot wasteland fades from peoples' minds, locals have realized its gorgeous potential, something the Moakley Courthouse, the Institute of Contemporary Art/Boston, and restaurateur-chef Barbara Lynch recognized more than a decade back.

Start your visit to the Seaport District at South Station, which is actually just across the Fort Point Channel in the heart of Downtown. From there, it's an easy walk to historical and cultural sites like the Boston Tea Party Ships & Museum, Fan Pier, and the Boston Children's Museum. If your destination is farther





afield, say the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center, Harpoon Brewery, the Seaport World Trade Center, or the Boston Design Center, head to South Station's subway concourse to catch the Silver Line.

■TIP→ The Silver Line operates three different branches (SL1, SL2, SL3) in the Seaport District and each has different destinations, so make sure you hop on the correct one.

Of all of Boston's neighborhoods, the Seaport is the least "Bostonian" in appearance. In fact, with all its skyscrapers and shiny glass, the Seaport could have been plucked straight out of New York. It's new; it's fresh; it's young.



Black Falcon Pier

MARINA/PIER | Surrounded by water on three sides, Black Falcon Pier is a stop on Boston's Harborwalk that seekers of amazing views won't want to miss. There's not much to do out this way at the end of the Seaport District except gaze at the fishing vessels, barges, and cruise ships navigating the inner harbor. Next door, the Boston Design Center offers shopping and dining options.

OTHER MUSEUM | FAMILY | The country's second-oldest children's museum has always been ahead of the curve with creative hands-on exhibits, cultural diversity, and problem solving. Some of the most popular stops are also the simplest, like the bubble-making machinery and the two-story climbing maze. At the Japanese House you're invited to take off your shoes and step inside a Kyoto silk merchant's home. The Boston Black exhibit stimulates dialogue about ethnicity and community, and children can dig, climb, and build at the Construction Zone. In the toddler PlaySpace, children under

three can run free in a safe environment. There's also a full schedule of special exhibits, festivals, and performances.

Boston Harborwalk

TRAIL | For the last 30-plus years, a number of agencies and organizations have been collaborating to create a waterfront walking path along Boston's shoreline currently, it stretches 43 miles. Boston's Seaport District boasts a hearty portion of the Harborwalk, which winds from the Fort Point Channel, around Fan Pier, up Seaport Boulevard, and out and around the Black Falcon Cruise Terminal, Along the way, pedestrians can see art exhibits, stationary viewfinders, open green spaces, and incredible Boston Harbor views. Marked signs point the way, and maps gress St. Bridge by Children's Museum ⊕ www.bostonharborwalk.org M South Station.

★ Boston Tea Party Ships & Museum

OTHER ATTRACTION | FAMILY | Situated at the Congress Street Bridge near the site of Griffin's Wharf, this lively museum offers an interactive look at the past in a place as close as possible to the actual spot where the Boston Tea Party took place on December 16, 1773, Actors in period costumes greet patrons, assign them real-life colonial personas, and then ask a few people to heave boxes of tea into the water from aboard historical reproductions of the ships forcibly boarded and unloaded the night Boston Harbor became a teapot. There are 3-D holograms, talking portraits, and even the Robinson Half Tea Chest, one of two original tea chests known to exist. ■TIP→ Abigail's Tea Room (you don't need a museum ticket for entry) features a tea tasting of five tea blends that would have been aboard the ships. \(\simes Congress \) St. Bridge, Fort Point Channel @ www.

Fort Point Channel Landmark District

NEIGHBORHOOD | This historic district. which was designated by the City of Boston in 2009, features the city's largest, most cohesive grouping of late 19th- and early 20th-century industrial loft buildings. The Boston Wharf Company owned and developed the area from 1836 to 1882. Today, the small, walkable, revitalized area sits between the Fort Point Channel and the Seaport District and is home to Boston Children's Museum. the Boston Tea Party Ships & Museum, working artist studios, and a variety of restaurants.

Harpoon Brewery and Beer Hall

BREWERY | Harpoon Brewery holds Massachusetts' first-ever brewing permit, obtained in 1986 by three college friends who wanted to create a fresh beer culture in their hometown. Today, Harpoon features guided tours of its Seaport

District facility, sharing its story, fun facts, and samples with beer lovers from around the globe. ★ Institute of Contemporary Art/Boston

ART MUSEUM | The ICA mounts temporary exhibits by the contemporary art world's brightest talents, as well as curated pieces from its permanent collection, all of which are as cutting edge as the breathtaking, cantilevered edifice jutting out over Boston Harbor that houses them. The ICA's fourth floor is where most happens: incredible art and stunning water views. The Poss Family Mediatheque serves as a great resting spot for families. Live programming, from film festivals to outdoor live music concerts take place regularly. Don't miss the ICA Store on the ground level, where you

John Joseph Moakley United States Courthouse

NOTABLE BUILDING | Believe it or not, the public is welcomed in for a visit to this architectural wonder and federal house of justice. Galleries across the courthouse feature rotating exhibitions on a variety of themes, from maritime history to the judicial system. Don't miss Ellsworth Kelly's permanent installation *The Boston Panels* in the courthouse's entry rotunda. It's not uncommon to see a tall ship or a charter vessel docked outside, in season. You can also book an hour-long Discovering Justice tour. ⊠ Fan Pier, 1 Courthouse Way, Seaport 617/261–2440.

The Lawn on D

CITY PARK | FAMILY | Stop, rest awhile, and have some fun. That's the purpose of The Lawn on D, a free-to-all open green space that features a plethora of geometrical swings, games like bocce, corn hole, and ping-pong, and chairs for lounging. In warmer weather, you can often catch a live concert or film screening here, or a public art installation. A concession stand makes sure visitors are well-fed. The only catch? Restaurants

As the Seaport District has grown over the last 15 years, so, too, has the quality of its dining options. A few humble "fish shacks" remain in operation as testaments to the area's lucrative industry, but accompanying them today are large-scale and upscale restaurants appealing to 9-to-5ers that now call the area home.

\$\$\$ | SEAFOOD | FAMILY | Decked out in cheery colors of yellow, red, and green,

this popular, somewhat touristy spot has the feel of a seaside clam shack located smack dab in the middle of Boston. An outdoor patio and lobster tent in summer features stunning views of the Financial District; in winter, dining retreats indoors to a warmhearted version of a waterfront dive, where you'll encounter a classic New England clambake or oysters and littlenecks from the raw bar, followed by meaty, golden crab cakes. COCKTAIL LOUNGES | Barbara Lynch handles this elegant den as only a chef of worldwide acclaim would—like a restaurant. Behind the bar, tenders use herbs, infusions, and elixirs to custom-create a top-shelf libation for your palate; that is, there is no drink list. There are low, beamed ceilings and a wooden bar that snakes through the space, maximizing room for a discerning cocktail crowd. A limited menu features snacks and things. including a legendary burger. South Boston


Never to be confused with the city's South End neighborhood, South Boston (Southie, as locals know it) still feels largely Irish and working class, even though the area has fully gentrified over the last two decades. In doing so, young professionals—drawn to Southie's waterfront, beaches, and green walking spaces—have bought condos in converted triple-deckers along Day Boulevard or up and down streets named for alphabet letters from A to P. The farther down the alphabet, the closer you are to historic Castle Island and Pleasure Bay.

Irish-Americans still hold sway here, as the city's raucous annual St. Patrick's Day parade and numerous Irish bars attest. Long-standing residents are hearty folk; every January 1 they follow tradition and run into the frigid waters off L Street Beach for a quick dip. Southie is also famously where Whitey Bulger held court over the Irish mob during the 1980s and early 1990s.




Castle Island

HISTORIC SIGHT | FAMILY | Although it once was. Castle Island is no longer, well, an island. Today, this tip of South Boston is accessible by car and by foot from Day Boulevard, Castle Island's centerpiece is Fort Independence, built in 1801 (although there have been battlements on-site since 1644) and open for free tours on summer weekend afternoons. Castle Island is a popular spot for South Boston residents to walk their dogs, jog, or cycle, whether just around the island itself or along the water-set Pleasure Bay Loop. There's also a nice playground for kids. If you get peckish, stop by Sullivan's (known locally as Sully's). Open February

★ John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum

LIBRARY | The library-museum is both a center for serious scholarship and a focus for Boston's nostalgia for her native son. The stark, white building (another modernist monument designed by I. M. Pei) at this Dorchester Bay-enclosed site pays homage to the life and presidency of John F. Kennedy, as well as to members of his family, including his wife, Jacqueline, and brother Robert.

The library is the official repository of JFK's presidential papers and displays re-creations of his desk in the Oval Office and of the television studio in which he debated Richard Nixon in the 1960 election. Permanent exhibits focus on his life before politics, the 1960 Presidential election, the Peace Corps, and the U.S. space program (currently under renovation). Two theaters show films about JFK's life. There's also a permanent display on the late Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis. East Boston

A drive into East Boston shows off street after street of multifamily homes and commercial squares laden with restaurants and markets catering to its varied ethnic communities, primarily Italian, Asian, and Latino. In the last few years, this waterfront neighborhood—"Eastie" as it's called by longtime locals—has begun to undergo a renaissance as modern, luxury apartments pop up on Jeffries Point. 


