## NEIGHBORHOOD SNAPSHOT

#### TOP EXPERIENCES

- Explore Camelot: Visit the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum for a look into the life and legacy of Jack and Jackie.
- Appreciate an architectural marvel: The Institute of Contemporary Art/Boston leans over Boston Harbor in opposition to physics.
- Take in stunning views: The unparalleled, 360-degree views from Boston Harborwalk of the water and the city's other neighborhoods can't be beat.
- Eat out: The Seaport District is known for its abundant culinary offerings, from gourmet local bakeries to top national steak houses.

#### PIER 4

■ For an absolutely stunning perspective on Boston, pause along Boston Harborwalk at the very end of Pier 4. To the left around the curve of Fan Pier, you can see the shiny facades of Waterfront and Financial District buildings. Straight ahead, you see the East Boston coastline and planes taking off and landing at Logan Airport, all while yachts, tall ships, and harbor boats sail past.

#### **GETTING HERE**

Accessing the Seaport District is relatively easy, but the neighborhood is large. From South Station, you can walk anywhere along the Fort Point Channel, but for farther afield take the Silver Line. If you're headed to South Boston, take a Red Line train and get off at Andrew or Broadway. By car, Seaport and South Boston have a moderate amount of parking on the street (free after 8 pm and all day Sunday) as well as in lots.

East Boston poses more of a challenge. It's long, lean, and residential, so the best way to explore is by vehicle. Taking public transit is not impossible, however: ride the Blue Line to Maverick, Wood Island, Orient Heights, or Suffolk Downs and be sure to know where you want to exit. Blue Line and Silver Line trains service Logan Airport.

#### **GOOD TO KNOW**

■ The Seaport District is a dining and nightlife hot spot, offering a mix of local eateries and outposts of upscale national chains. This doesn't mean the neighborhood is excessively noisy, though; there are hidden parts all over the Seaport that provide places for people to sit amidst the greenery or public artwork.

#### PLANNING YOUR TIME

You'll spend some time getting around the Seaport. Ambitious travelers can see two museums in a day, have a beer at Harpoon Brewery or Lord Hobo, and walk part of the Harborwalk. If you have only a few hours, plan an early dinner to enjoy tasty food and sunset water views.

#### **SAFETY**

■ Safety isn't a concern in the Seaport and South Boston. East Boston can be dicey after dark. While distinctly different, the Seaport, South Boston, and East Boston have one major commonality: Boston Harbor. Historically, the Seaport has supported the textile and commercial fishing industries with its working piers. South Boston and Fort Independence at Castle Island have safeguarded the city from attack by sea since 1643. And, in East Boston, Donald McKay built recordsetting clipper ships.

Today, a lot has changed. Over the last 20 years, the Seaport has transformed from an industrial no-man's-land to a vibrant, bustling extension of downtown Boston. Luxury hotels and residences, manicured micro-parks, upscale restaurants both local and national in name, and cutting-edge cultural institutions have all found homes here. Development projects remain in the works, so the face of the Seaport will continue to adjust for years to come.

Heavily populated South Boston has experienced its own renaissance, more so in the form of putting polish on existing multifamily homes and old-timey Irish bars rather than making room for new construction. The neighborhood's residents, both Southie lifers and young professional transplants, walk and walk: they walk to meals, they walk to Boston's best stretch of beaches, and they walk to and around Castle Island for exercise year-round.

Across the harbor, East Boston is largely residential. It has been a haven for immigrants, first Italian and then Latino, and today's population reflects this heritage. Logan Airport is Eastie's crown jewel, but there are only a few other cultural sites to see unless you count the abundance of authentic Latin restaurants.

## The Seaport

What's the appeal of the Seaport District? Bostonians have only been able to answer that question recently. As the neighborhood becomes developed, and its former life as a parking lot wasteland fades from peoples' minds, locals have realized its gorgeous potential, something the Moakley Courthouse and the Institute of Contemporary Art/Boston recognized more than a decade back.

Start your visit to the Seaport District at South Station, which is actually in Downtown. From there, it's an easy walk across Fort Point Channel to historical





and cultural sites like the Boston Tea Party Ships & Museum, Fan Pier, and the Boston Children's Museum. If your destination is farther afield, say the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center, Harpoon Brewery, the Seaport World Trade Center, or the Boston Design Center, head to South Station's subway concourse to catch the Silver Line.

■TIP→ The Silver Line operates four different branches (SL1, SL2, SL3, SLW) in the Seaport District and each has different destinations, so make sure you hop on the correct one.

Shipping containers scattered around the area pay tribute to the neighborhood's industrial seafaring history, while fitting in with 21st-century high-rises. Of all of Boston's neighborhoods, the Seaport is the least "Bostonian" in appearance. It's new; it's fresh; it's young.



#### **Black Falcon Pier & Flynn Cruiseport Boston**

MARINA/PIER | Surrounded by water on three sides, Black Falcon Pier is a stop on Boston's Harborwalk that seekers of amazing views won't want to miss. There's not much to do out this way at the end of the Seaport District except gaze at the fishing vessels, barges, and cruise ships navigating the inner harbor. However, lots of visitors find themselves out this way as Black Falcon Pier is home to Flynn Cruiseport Boston, where major cruise ships dock daily with Boston as a port of call. ⋈ Black Falcon Pier, Seaport Mory Dock, Black Falcon.

#### \* Boston Children's Museum

CHILDREN'S MUSEUM | FAMILY | You know you'll have found the country's second-oldest children's museum when you find the giant Hood milk bottle structure. This museum has always been ahead of the curve with creative hands-on exhibits, cultural diversity, and problem-solving. Some of the most popular stops are also the simplest, like the bubble-making

machinery and the two-story climbing maze. At the Japanese House, vou're invited to take off your shoes and step inside a Kyoto silk merchant's home. Children can dig. climb, and build at the Construction Zone. In the toddler PlaySpace, children under three can run free in a safe environment. #### ★ Boston Harborwalk

TRAIL | FAMILY | Stretching for 43 continuous miles. Boston Harborwalk is a walking trail that skirts the twists and turns of the coast from Charlestown down to the city of Quincy. In the Seaport District specifically, the Harborwalk journeys along Fort Point Channel, around Fan Pier, up Seaport Boulevard, and out and around the Black Falcon Cruise Terminal. Along the way, pedestrians can see art exhibits, stationary viewfinders, open green spaces, and incredible Boston Harbor views. #### ★ Boston Tea Party Ships & Museum

OTHER ATTRACTION | FAMILY | Situated at the Congress Street Bridge near the site of Griffin's Wharf, this lively museum offers an interactive look at the past in a place as close as possible to the actual spot where the Boston Tea Party took place on December 16, 1773. Actors in period costumes greet patrons, assign them real-life Colonial personas, and then ask a few people to heave boxes of tea into the water from aboard historical reproductions of the ships forcibly boarded and unloaded the night Boston Harbor became a teapot. There are 3D

holograms, talking portraits, and even the Robinson Half Tea Chest, one of two original tea chests known to exist.

■TIP→ Abigail's Tea Room (you don't need a museum ticket for entry) features a tea tasting of five tea blends that would have been aboard the ships.

#### Fort Point Channel Landmark District

HISTORIC DISTRICT | This historic district, which was designated by the City of Boston in 2009, features the city's largest, most cohesive grouping of late-19th- and early-20th-century industrial loft buildings. The Boston Wharf Company owned and developed the area from 1836 to 1882. Today, the small, walkable, revitalized area sits between the Fort Point Channel and the Seaport District and is home to working artist studios, bars and restaurants, and some small businesses.

#### ★ Harpoon Brewery and Beer Hall

**BREWERY** | Harpoon Brewery holds Massachusetts's first-ever brewing permit. obtained in 1986 by three college friends who wanted to create a fresh beer culture in their hometown. Today, Harpoon's Boston brewery features 25-minute guided tours and tastings for beer lovers from around the globe. Harpoon's on-site beer hall pours a rotating lineup of limited-edition and pilot beers, non-brand beers, and ciders—try a flight of UFOs or Clown Shoes. #### **★** Institute of Contemporary Art/Boston

**ART MUSEUM** | It's hard to say what's more cutting-edge: the Institute of Contemporary Art/Boston's cantilevered building or the works that reside within. The events calendar is studded with changing,

thematic exhibitions by the contemporary art world's brightest talents. Visitors will also see some curated pieces from the ICA's permanent collection, including some by Robert Mapplethorpe, Yayoi Kusama, and Louise Bourgeois. Live programming, from film festivals to talks to outdoor concerts, take place regularly. #### John Joseph Moakley United States Courthouse

NOTABLE BUILDING | Believe it or not, the public is welcomed in for a visit to this architectural wonder and federal house of justice. Galleries across the courthouse feature rotating exhibitions on a variety of themes, from maritime history to the judicial system. Don't miss Ellsworth Kelly's permanent installation The Boston Panels in the courthouse's rotunda. It's not uncommon to see a tall ship or a charter vessel docked outside, in season. #### ★ The Lawn on D

CITY PARK | FAMILY | Stop, rest awhile, and have some fun. That's the purpose of The Lawn on D, a free-to-all open green space that features a plethora of games like bocce, corn hole, Ping-Pong, and pickleball, and chairs for lounging. In warmer weather, you can often catch a live concert or film screening here, or a public art installation. A concession stand makes sure visitors are well fed. The only catch? #### **Museum of Ice Cream**

SPECIALTY MUSEUM | FAMILY | Opened in late 2024, this whimsical entrée into the Seaport District has locals and visitors alike licking their lips. Check out 14 immersive, interactive exhibitions across two floors inspired by the eponymous dessert, including a sprinkle pool, a carnival, and the Hall of Freezers. ## Restaurants

As the Seaport District has grown over the last 20 years, so, too, has the quality of its dining options. A few humble "fish shacks" remain in operation as testament to the area's lucrative industry, but accompanying them today are many large-scale and upscale restaurants focused on seafood and steaks.

\$\$\$ | SEAFOOD | FAMILY | Decked out in cheery colors of yellow, red, and green, this touristy spot has the feel of a seaside clam shack located smack-dab in the middle of Boston. An outdoor patio and lobster tent in summer feature stunning views of the Financial District; in winter, dining retreats indoors to a warmhearted version of a waterfront dive, where you'll encounter a classic New England clambake or oysters and littlenecks from the raw bar, followed by meaty, golden crab cakes. ## **South Boston**

Never to be confused with the city's South End neighborhood, South Boston (Southie, as locals know it) still feels largely Irish and working class, even though the area has fully gentrified over the last two decades. In doing so, young professionals—drawn to Southie's waterfront, beaches, and green walking spaces—have bought condos in converted triple-deckers along Day Boulevard or up and down streets named for alphabet letters from A to P. The farther down the alphabet, the closer you are to historic Castle Island and Pleasure Bay.

Irish-Americans still hold sway here, as the city's raucous annual St. Patrick's Day parade and numerous Irish bars attest. Long-standing residents are hearty folk; every January 1 they follow tradition and run into the frigid waters off L Street Beach for a quick dip. Southie is also famously where Whitey Bulger held court over the Irish mob during the 1980s and early 1990s.



#### ★ Castle Island

HISTORIC SIGHT | FAMILY | Although it once was, Castle Island is no longer, well, an island. Capping the South Boston neighborhood, Castle Island is accessible by car and by foot from Day Boulevard. Its centerpiece is Fort Independence, built in 1801 (although there have been battlements on-site since 1644), open

for free tours on summer weekend afternoons. Castle Island is a popular spot to walk dogs, jog, or cycle, whether just around the island itself or along the water-set Pleasure Bay Loop. There's also a nice playground for kids. Stop by Castle Island institution Sullivan's for a hot dog, fried seafood dinner, or ice cream. ## ★ John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum

HISTORY MUSEUM | FAMILY | Sitting at the edge of Dorchester Bay, this stark, white building (a modernist monument designed by I. M. Pei) pays homage to the life and presidency of John F. Kennedy, as well as to members of his family, including his wife, Jacqueline, and brother Robert. The library-museum is both a center for serious scholarship and a focus for Boston's nostalgia for her native son.

The library is the official repository of JFK's presidential papers and displays re-creations of his desk in the Oval Office and of the television studio in which he debated Richard Nixon in the 1960 election. Permanent exhibits focus on his life before politics, the 1960 presidential election, the Peace Corps, and the U.S. space program. There's also a permanent





TRAIL | FAMILY | This 300-acre patch of remaining wetland environment is indicative of the salt marsh landscape that covered Boston when early settlers arrived and which today has been filled in. As you walk or run Belle Isle's gravel paths, listen to the sound of the marsh's diverse bird community, which includes the American kestrel, belted kingfisher, great blue heron, northern harrier, and salt marsh sparrow. Every summer, a single largescale, immersive art installation makes the 15,000-square-foot space its own. 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#### Madonna Queen of the Universe National Shrine

RELIGIOUS BUILDING | A 35-foot golden and green statue of the Virgin Mary standing atop a globe dominates the Pope Paul VI Pilgrim Plaza that welcomes curious visitors and religious pilgrims to this Roman Catholic shrine. From its perch in Orient Heights, the shrine also boasts some pretty spectacular views of Logan Airport and the downtown skyline. Beneath the plaza, a sprawling sanctuary offers a guiet retreat, and some holy relics are on display. #### **Piers Park**

It is so named because of its many long piers that jut into the inner harbor. For a bit of historical knowledge: it's also in close proximity to the site where naval architect Donald McKay built his reputedly fast clipper ships. Take a stroll down the promenade and let the kiddos enjoy the large playground.


#### Rincon Limeño


