

Climate change closes schools



It was a real privilege to visit South Sudan back in March. There I saw first hand how your support is enabling people to release themselves from poverty through our Transforming Communities work with local churches. Thank you.

What I wasn't prepared for was the almost unbearable heat. During the visit, the South Sudanese government issued advice on how to cope as temperatures reached 47°C.

As we sat, sheltered under a mango tree, I asked Rev Canon Edward Jale from the Diocese of Kajo Keji what the extreme weather meant for his community.

'They have closed schools because the extreme heat is too much,' he said. 'It's also harming our harvests. Earlier there was only a little harvest because there was too much rain last year. Our prayer is that God will answer us and immediately bring rain so that it cools the weather.'

Thanks to your prayers and donations, we are supporting communities across the world as they face increasingly volatile and destructive conditions. In the centre pages, you can read a special pull-out impact report which demonstrates how your prayers and generous giving are making a huge difference across the world.

Alongside climate change, conflict is another growing threat to people's lives and health. On page 8, you can find out how your generous support is reaching out and helping families displaced by violence in the Central African Republic.

Tearfund staff killed in the DRC

Two Tearfund aid workers have been killed in an attack in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Please continue to pray with us.

The two staff members, Jonas and John, were travelling in a convoy from Lubero with a group of colleagues on Sunday 30 June. The convoy was attacked as it arrived in Butembo. The majority of the team escaped, but tragically Jonas and John were killed.

Nigel Harris, Tearfund CEO, said: 'I am utterly devastated by the deaths of Jonas and John in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Our staff work selflessly to serve communities living in poverty. This news came as a huge shock to all of us at Tearfund.'

Our priority is to continue to support Jonas and John's families as they continue to grieve. We're also working with the local authorities to ensure the safety and security of our remaining staff in the country. We are working with their families to provide support and the wider team in the DRC in their shock and grief.

Please pray for the families and friends of Jonas and John, that God will provide everything they need in this time of crisis. Also pray for the remaining 12 people who were caught up in the attack, thank God that they have returned home safely, and pray for their continued recovery.



Please pray for an ambitious plastics treaty

Tearfund took your concerns about plastic pollution to the United Nations negotiators in April, as efforts continue to agree on a global plastics treaty in Ottawa, Canada.

Millions of communities in Latin and Central America, Africa, and Asia are forced to dump or burn their waste, releasing toxic fumes that cause breathing difficulties for those more vulnerable, particularly children and the elderly.

Miriam Moreno, Tearfund's Environmental and Economic Sustainability regional manager for Latin America and the Caribbean attended the UN talks. She said, 'The treaty is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to bring about an end to the worldwide problem of plastic pollution.'





James' epic run across the UK for Tearfund

James Norman, 23, from Coventry set off from Land's End in Cornwall on 30 March. He completed his run across the UK, reaching John O'Groats on 12 June. What an amazing achievement!

That's a gruelling 1,406.5km (874 miles) – carrying a tent and cooking stove in his backpack – to support people living in poverty across the world. James said he wanted to show that 'you can achieve anything'.

'I genuinely thought this would be a good story for the grandkids,' James explains. 'If I'm ever going to do something like this, it's now while I'm young.

'I've also had some inspiration from Russ Cook and I thought that's such an amazing challenge and I wanted to do something on a bit of a smaller scale.' Known as the 'Hardest Geezer', Russell Cook finished his run of the full length of Africa in April.

James paced his journey by covering 12 miles each day, apart from Sundays, which he used as rest days. He documented his travels to 8,500 followers on TikTok and said that the highlight of the run was meeting people on the way. James travelled on his own, often camping or staying in hostels.

'I genuinely thought this would be a good story for the grandkids'

'I've never run a marathon in my life,' James said. 'To be honest, I'm not the best runner and the most distance I've done in the past is around 12 miles.'

With donations still coming in, he's raised £8,589 so far. What a superstar, we're so grateful, James!

'I wanted to find a little project to help me get to know people in the community,' Ian says. 'I started going to the St Mary's Community Choir and asked if the church would take a collection for Toilet Twinning, and they were great!'

St Mary's church was the first place Ian encouraged to twin their toilets in the town. Five years later, more churches, schools, scouts, cafés, pubs, clubs and many homes have joined them. It culminated in his 101st toilet twinned at 1st Barnard Castle Scouts. After that amazing achievement, Ian has decided to retire from twinning toilets too. Thank you Ian, you are amazing!

In recent years, the Ouaka region of the Central African Republic (CAR), its capital, Bambari, and outlying villages have been badly affected by violence. The latest wave of fighting between armed groups swept over CAR following the presidential election in December 2020, once again bringing the country to breaking point. Conflict forced many families to flee to safety. **Djara**, aged 35, her husband and children, were among them, leaving their home and possessions behind. This is their story.

'We used to have a good life. We had cattle, we raised chickens, goats – even turtles. I was the one who took care of our chickens. We'd have enough eggs for my children and more eggs to sell.

'My husband looked after the cows. Every day we'd have fresh cow's milk to sell and earn money to buy essentials for our home. I would make butter, use some, and sell the rest. We had a nice home. Life was good.'

Hit hard by conflict

'Then the crisis happened and trouble came. During the conflict, we lost all our cows and our chickens. We left all our possessions behind. There's nothing left. So we fled to many places before settling here in Yakuta village. We came here to seek refuge.

'It took a month and a half to get here. We had to walk all the way. Sometimes my husband carried the children. 'We'd walk for a whole day and then sleep in the forest at night. That was our life until we arrived. We've been here for three years now.'

'Life is difficult when you have almost nothing. Getting enough food to eat is a struggle. We were given a small piece of land to build a hut. But we don't have a field to farm. Every day my husband and I go out seeking odd jobs to do, working in other people's fields.

'We eat in the morning but have nothing to eat in the evening'

'If we find work we can go home and feed our children. But it's not an easy life. This community is very poor, so finding paying work is a struggle. Most people farm their own land, they don't pay people to help. If there are no jobs there's no food. We go to sleep hungry. We eat in the morning but have nothing to eat in the evening.'

Lacking life's essentials

'We often get sick with malaria and have pains in our bodies, hands and feet. Because we don't have money, the children aren't well fed. When it rains they catch colds. So they often get diseases and suffer from diarrhoea and vomiting. We don't have mosquito nets, decent sheets and blankets. We don't even have a toilet. That causes even more sickness for our children.

Above: Before she received support from Tearfund, Diara struggled to feed her family 'If one of our children becomes sick we need to earn money before taking them to the hospital. But if we don't have money, what can we do? Even if we manage to get a child to the hospital we still need to take care of them, find money for food and medicines for them and the rest of the family. Paying for school fees is also difficult. If we have money, we pay. If we don't, we don't.

'We don't have soap or jerry cans and buckets. We have to borrow some to fetch water. Look at the state of this house! It's in a very bad state. When it rains, water comes in. We plug the holes with more straw. But it still gets in. When it's cold, we cover the children with mats. But they are not in good condition so the children still get cold. And that means more sickness.'

How your faithful support fed this family

'But Tearfund has supported us, they gave us food including sugar, oil and rice. And some money. We are so grateful for all the blessings that they have given to us. Thanks to you, we have recovered a little bit of our health and wellbeing. Thank you so much.

'Before, my children were skinny because the quality of the food was so bad. But now I cook with the oil that was given to me and my children eat well. If I sell a little oil, it gives us some money and pays for other things we need. **Thank you**, **Tearfund**, **for this great support**.

'At least it is peaceful here and we are safe. No one comes to hassle us. We live in peace. I am not afraid about the future now. I used to be scared, but not any more. Thanks to your support, I believe our future will be better. The little we get we will take care of and share. In our family, we have a united heart.

'In the future, I'd like to have a better house and some cows, chickens and goats. If we had enough money, we would build our own house. But it's difficult. I'd like to learn a new skill, maybe baking bread and cakes. Then I could sell them to earn some money to improve our family's lives. If I had some seeds, I could borrow or rent a field and grow some crops to provide food.

'Thanks to your support, I believe our future will be better'

'I want my children to go to school, have a good home so we can do well and prosper. In fact, I want my entire country to prosper.'

In March this year, in collaboration with a number of organisations,*
Tearfund hosted Tears of Gold, an event to mark International Women's Day.
It was an amazing day of art, photography and discussion.

One highlight of the event was a display of beautiful paintings showing courageous women created by artist Hannah Rose Thomas. The exhibition featured portraits of Yazidi women who escaped ISIS captivity, Rohingya women who fled violence in Myanmar, Nigerian women who survived Boko Haram violence, and Ukrainian refugees fleeing conflict. Alongside the paintings are the women's own words, stories and self-portraits.

'I think art gives us a way into understanding the stories of some of these women in a unique way,' Hannah explained at the event. 'Through a piece of artwork, a product of contemplation that requires a great deal of time, you can encounter the stories of the women for yourself. It's not the same as meeting the women in person, but it's the next best thing.'

'I use early Renaissance painting techniques and gold leaf. I find these methods to be very prayerful and contemplative. I am praying for the women while I paint. I hope these paintings create a space for those who see them to contemplate. To imagine the stories of the women. And imagine themselves in their shoes.'

Many of the portraits and stories feature in Hannah's debut book, *Tears* of Gold: Portraits of Yazidi, Rohingya, and Nigerian Women from Plough Publishing and is available from their shop (plough.com) and other bookshops. All publisher profits from this book are being donated to charities working with women in these countries.

What do you think about when you see this painting?

Nadiia: When I look at this painting, I think I look like I have fewer wrinkles now than two years ago when it was painted. That's because of all the care and love I have received. I'm very grateful for the support of people in England over the last two years. I have a roof over my head, a bed and new friends. When we left our home, we never dreamed this would happen.



After your experiences as a refugee, what do you think our response should be to the refugee crisis in other countries, many of whom are not as welcome here as people from Ukraine?

Maria: It's a huge responsibility to respond to such a question. Before my experience, I never thought about this problem, this tragedy, that many people go through... There are so many countries going through the same. But no one deserves this, no matter where you are in the world. The most honest answer would be that no one should have to face this. In the 21st century, we should be able to live life without war.

A stitch in time

How two blankets united two families 6,000km apart

Margery Jackson, who's been a Tearfund supporter for many years, shares the story of the gift of two blankets that have stitched two families together for more than 40 years.

Margery worked with Tearfund in a refugee camp in Thailand in the early 1980s. At that time, it provided support for Vietnamese people who were escaping oppression by boat following the end of the Vietnam War.

It was there she met Mai, a 15-year-old Vietnamese girl who was rescued from pirates that were raiding ships and killing passengers. Mai had been badly abused. Sadly, her brothers and all the other passengers on their boat did not survive.

As she started to recover, Mai struck up a friendship with Margery. When Mai found out Margery's sister was expecting a baby, later named Shona, she decided to crochet a blanket for her.

Feeling joy

'I was touched that somebody who'd lost so much could feel such joy on my behalf,' says Margery. 'I sent it to my sister who was thrilled.'

When Margery returned home to Scotland, the two women kept in touch, exchanging Christmas cards. In 2017, Mai – who was now married with four daughters, living in Canada – contacted Margery to say her daughter, Jennifer, was coming to the UK to study for a Master's degree in Manchester.

So Margery invited Jennifer up to meet her family in Lenzie near Glasgow, and Mai and her husband came too. The two families had a reunion gathering including Margery's daughter Lesley and her baby granddaughter, Lucy. Mai had heard about Lucy and crocheted a new blanket for her.

'It's been lovely over the years to know how happy Mai is and how well her four daughters are doing in their life,' says Margery.

Margery was delighted to see Mai in person after so many years. 'In many ways, she was the same. The people in the refugee camp were remarkably resilient. Despite the awful stories that almost all of them had, they didn't go about feeling sorry for themselves.'

In 2019, Tearfund launched a matched giving appeal to help build new recycling hubs in Pakistan to prevent further damage to the environment, protect people's health and provide jobs.

The UK Government agreed to match gifts, pound for pound, up to £3 million as part of its UK Aid Match scheme – £2 million for Pakistan and £1 million for Haiti. When that target was reached, an amazing Tearfund supporter agreed to match a further £1 million. With match funding and gift aid, you helped raise an amazing £8,884,768. Thank you.

Thanks to your donations, lives were transformed across the world in communities where the need is greatest. Match funding from the UK Government was used to promote waste management and create recycling hubs in Pakistan and Haiti.

These recycling hubs have huge benefits: reducing the amount of plastics in the oceans, preventing flooding of watercourses blocked by waste and lowering greenhouse gas emissions from burnt waste.

Your support is helping to improve the health and wellbeing of communities by reducing toxic fumes from burning waste, which can lead to illness and death. Each hub can also create jobs for 25 people – a secure and dignified form of employment for marginalised members of local communities. Thank you.

How your support helped Saima, her family and her whole community...

Saima, aged 40, from a suburb in Saeedabad, Karachi, lives in a small house with her husband, son, daughterin-law and two other family members.

With no rubbish collection or understanding of how to separate waste, Saima and her family used to put all their rubbish into a single bin. Then – like many families in her neighbourhood with no alternative option – she would dump it in the street.

Tearfund established a recycling unit called a Haryali Hub in her district. The unit sorts through waste from around 12,000 homes and puts it to good use. Discarded plastic is turned into new products and kitchen leftovers become compost.

As part of the awareness campaign, Saima's family was encouraged to separate waste and hand it over to the hub. They now have different bins for kitchen and dry waste and send it to be regularly recycled.

'Before, we were dumping all our waste, dry or wet, in the same bin. We never knew that our waste could be recycled,' Saima says. 'Plastic bottles and other waste can now be made into new products. I am so happy to be part of this programme to establish a recycling unit, to make our streets and environment clean and green.'

The Tearfund team in Pakistan organised awareness sessions with many families about how to separate waste. The team also held community consultations to recruit volunteers to promote the programme in Saima's neighbourhood.

Three women, including Saima, offered to volunteer to spread the word about putting waste to good use. Saima has visited many of her neighbours to encourage them to do the same as her. Many more families in her street now separate their waste and hand it over to the collectors.

Living together in unity amid conflict in the DRC




