Hearing Christine call her mom after her first night in New York and thank her for everything she had done destroyed me. Simply because I was in Lady Bird's shoes not to long ago with my own family. When film does that, when it directly connects to you and your own situations, it makes it that much more beautiful.

Greta Gerwig created something that was real, raw, hilarious, passionate and heartbreaking all at the same time. Anyone who watches this film can find something or someone who they directly connect with. They can find something that resonates within them.
