### Seminole County **Commission Meeting Recap**

The Seminole County Board of Commissioners began the new year with matters related to special events permits, rezoning, right-of-way vacates and design updates on a crossing project at their bimonthly meeting on Tuesday.

The commission approved a special event permit for the annual Wekiva Island Spring Fling and Paint Out events to be hosted from Feb. 23 through March 1 and March 16 to March 20 in Longwood.

The 12-day-long event will include artists painting outside with their art displayed and sold. There will be an art auction, quick draw and gala with live performances.

The commission was also presented with a design update for the Seminole Wekiva Trail Grade Separation Crossing Project at State Road 434 and 436, detailing some major setbacks due to utility conflicts and an unfeasible initial design concept.

The project, which was initiated in 2021, could potentially face a redesign for the 436 tunnel, causing significant and costly delays in the process, more utility conflicts and traffic disruptions. Total costs for the projects sit at an estimate of \$39 million, 14 percent higher than predicted in 2022.

Public Works Director John Slot and Engineer Jorge Jimenez presented three options to the commissioners, including a continuation of the tunnel project with a new concept, a reconsideration of a bridge alternative or to hold the project and request the Florida Department of Transportation to include grade separated crossings when they make improvements to State Road 434 and 436.

# The F3 Mission: Believing in Something Bigger than Yourself

F3 is a network of free workout groups for men that emphasizes physical fitness, community, and leadership development. F3 stands for "Fitness, Fellowship, and Faith" and these peer-led workouts occur in 415 different regions, Sanford being one of them. F3 (NEO) is the Northeast Orlando fitness

F3 (NEO) is the Northeast Orlando fitness group, and they call themselves, "The Bokey." Their workouts start as early as five in the morning and they happen outside rain or shine. According to the F3 fitness group website, all F3 men always hold these five key principles.

1. Free of Charge- Never pay to workout, ever.

2. Open to all Men- No matter the man, you are welcome here.

3. Held Outdoors- Rain or shine, hot or cold, we are out there.

4. Peer Led- Rotating fashion of men lead-ing each other.

5. Ends with a COT- Always ends with a Circle of Trust.

Looking at the group's history on their site, F3 started in 2011 in Charlotte, North Carolina. It has grown to more than 46 states and 3,400+ scheduled workouts each week. Some would say the faith part of the name would stand for religion, but on their site, they specify the part of faith stands for simply believing in something bigger than yourself. Some of the workouts done outside include a mix of bodyweight exercises like burpees, push-ups, squats, lunges, mountain climbers, planks, and much more. This is often done in a bootcamp style with a focus on high intensity.

many of us are present, and we see any announcements that we want to share with the group, or any thoughts or prayers. It's based on everybody's comfortability level if they want to share with the group or not," said Cannon.

Cannon continued to add that on top of working out with other people, you inevitably make some good friendships.

"These are guys that, you just develop that fellowship and friendship. We have each other's phone numbers, and they're guys that I know I could just text anytime of day, if we ever just want to talk or meet up. They are reliable guys that are totally in," said Cannon.

Community outreach is also a priority for this fitness group. Cannon said once a quarter, F3 (NEO) cleans some of the streets of Sanford by picking up trash. He also said that in the past, the fitness group had helped clean, fix and revitalize a house for domestically abused women.

James Emerson talked about his life since joining F3 (NEO).

"Since I started, you know, I've lost weight. I've gotten in much better shape and I've been more accountable

at getting up early so I can work out," said Emerson.

Emerson digs deep when explaining how the F3 group inevitably becomes a vulnerable and open space. He said, after working out side by side for an hour, because they are exhausted, it is easier to let your guard down. Especially, after they have been pulling for each other and motivating one another to hit their physical and mental limits. The most important thing about this group is not just fitness for Emerson, but also fellowship. <sup>\*</sup>I speak for myself and I know I speak for many of the members of the group, is that you come on the first day for the fitness right? You're showing up because you want to get in shape, do some exercise, and then you find out about the second F. The second F is for fellowship. You find out that it's a great group of guys, and you meet so many friends, and that's the reason you stay. So, you come for the fitness, and you stay for the fellowship, I think," said Emerson. ## Winter: Cultural/Spiritual Across World

This auspicious month is dedicated to Lord Vishnu, with devotees engaging in prayer, meditation, and fasting, particularly on Vaikunta Ekadashi, when the gates of Vaikunta are believed to be opened. In Tamil Nadu, the singing of hymns called "Thiruppavai" by the poetess Andal is common, fostering community and devotion. Rituals like kolam (decorative floor art) and community feasts promote togetherness. For agrarian communities, Margazhi signals preparations for the harvest season, intertwining spiritual practices with cultural identity and prosperity. Overall, it's a time of heightened devotion and community bonding. Margashirsha is a holiday during Margazhi Masam, significant in the Hindu calendar. It can be seen as a time for spiritual reflection and growth, where many engage in spiritual practices to enhance their inner peace and connection with the divine.

In Hinduism, a Hindu god named Lord Vishnu is considered the protector and preserver of the universe and is honored during this time. In Margazhi Masam, many devotees perform rituals to express their reverence and seek his blessings for prosperity and protection. Margazhi Masam serves as a time for spiritual reflection and connection to the divine through rituals such as river baths and the worship of Lord Vishnu, fostering a sense of community and shared devotion among participants. Bathing in sacred rivers is seen as purifying and is believed to wash away sins and bad karma. Many devotees rise early in the morning to participate in these baths, often accompanied by the chants of devotional songs. The cold water of the rivers symbolizes the cleansing of the mind and body, preparing individuals for prayer and worship. It's important to note that the dates for Hindu festivals can vary each year due to their reliance on the lunar calendar, adding a unique aspect to their observance.

December is filled with diverse celebrations that showcase various cultural traditions worldwide, including Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, and Margashirsha. Christmas involves family gatherings with shared meals and gift exchanges. Hanukkah, the Festival of Lights, features the lighting of the menorah and enjoying traditional foods like latkes. Kwanzaa honors African heritage, focusing, on community and gratitude.

The winter solstice, a crucial astronomical event marking the shortest day of the year, signifies the return of longer days and the eventual return of light.
