

# PASSION FOR INVESTING IN THE LIVES OF YOUNG PEOPLE DRIVES GRIFFITHS

Solly James Rodan, namesake of the Solly School.



Investing in the future of young people is close to the hearts of  ${\bf Jim}$  and  ${\bf Pam}$  Griffith.

Earlier this academic year, the Griffiths made the lead gift in the upcoming expansion project at the Lipscomb Brewer Campus that will provide facilities to house a new special needs program at the Lower School. The inspiration for their gift? Their 4-year-old grandson **Solomon James Rodan,** better known as Solly.

At birth, Solly suffered three massive strokes, and at the age of one he was diagnosed with triplegic cerebral palsy. Since his birth on Oct. 9, 2014, the Rodan family has been on a journey.

As Solly's mom, **Camie Griffith Rodan**, has talked with families of special needs children in the Nashville area, she recognized a real need to serve children like Solly once they reach elementary school age.

"There seemed no better place than Lipscomb to step up and include children with special needs within its mission," said Rodan.

In April, the Rodans and Griffiths gathered at the site of the future Solly School, at the Lower School's Brewer Campus, for a groundbreaking ceremony. The Solly School will offer the access, flexibility, sensory accommodations and safety needed to ensure a successful educational experience for students with special needs while also offering as fully integrated a schedule as possible in appropriate grade-level classrooms, chapel, recess and lunch periods.

"I would like to thank the leadership of Lipscomb Academy, for the perspiration it has taken to make this a reality," said Jim Griffith, who held Solly in his arms as he spoke at the ceremony. "I would like to thank President Lowry and Rhonda for the leadership to truly make this thing happen. And then I would like to thank the community in advance, because for this to be a reality, there is going to have to be a lot more financial support on an operational basis to make sure all kids like Solly have an opportunity to come to Lipscomb on the same terms."

Many of Solly's family members are integral parts of the Lipscomb Academy family. Three of Solly's cousins attended Lipscomb Academy. **Eli** and **Emma Weber** are currently students, and their brother, **Reid**, graduated from the academy in 2014 and from the university in 2018. Solly's aunt, **Jennifer Webe**r, is on faculty in Lipscomb University's School of Nursing. His uncle, **Josh Weber**, is a former academy middle school





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# **ATHLETICS**

he 2017-2018 school year marked a new chapter in Mustang Athletics as the school moved to the Tennessee Secondary Athletic Association Division II classification. This move offered many opportunities, such as the ability to offer need-based financial aid to student athletes, as well as challenges, such as facing some of the premier athletic teams across the state. The Mustangs saw success in the fall, with the boys and girls cross country teams participating in the state meet, volleyball tying for second in the region and the middle school football team going undefeated. A strong spring season followed with the girls tennis team and girls softball team finishing as two of the top eight teams in the state in their sport. To finish the year, Lipscomb Academy won its first Division II State Championship - the girls 4x100 meter track relay. With this win, Lipscomb Academy now has more than 130 combined team and individual state championships.



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LaDonna Boyd ('03)

LaDonna Boyd, a Lipscomb Lifer, is the president, CEO and chairman of R. H. Boyd Publishing Corporation and one of Nashville's Top 30 Under 30 Honorees. Currently, she is a candidate for the degree of Doctor of Education in organizational leadership at Pepperdine University. She is most proud of Lipscomb for the balance of academic rigor and faith-based education that encourages inquisitiveness as students wrestle through gaining and understanding the truth. She would advise current students to "stick with your beliefs and never be afraid to ask questions, always be true to yourself and your convictions."

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Dr. Caleb Rucker ('02)

Assistant Professor of Mechanical, Aerospace and Biomedical Engineering with the University of Tennessee Knoxville

Dr. Caleb Rucker, also a Lipscomb Lifer, is a tenure-track assistant professor at the University of Tennessee in the mechanical, aerospace and biomedical engineering department. He currently teaches graduate and undergraduate classes and advises Ph.D. and master's students, while directing the research lab for Robotics, Engineering and Continuum Mechanics in Healthcare. He has received numerous awards and accolades, including the National Science Foundation CAREER award, which is the foundation's most prestigious awards in support of early-career faculty who have the potential to serve as academic role models in research and education and to lead advances in the mission of their department or organization. # Steve R. Dozier ('75)

Criminal Court Judge for the Davidson County Criminal Court Division

Steve Dozier has served as a Tennessee state criminal court judge for 21 years, previously serving as an assistant district attorney for Davidson County. Dozier is extremely active in the Nashville community, formerly serving as first vice president for the Nashville Bar Association and the Tennessee Supreme Court District 5 Investigating Committee a long with numerous other boards and commissions. Dozier said he feels Lipscomb taught him discipline and respect that has been a guiding principle throughout his career. The spiritual formation he received at Lipscomb has been crucial to his Christian growth and in raising his three children, he said.



# WONDER TIME, ART PROJECTS TELL THE BIBLE'S BIG STORY AT LOWER SCHOOL

It is not always easy for very young children to grasp how spiritual concepts apply to their young lives, but Lipscomb Academy's **Melanie Grogan**, the Lower School's first spiritual formation director hired three years ago, has found plenty of creative and innovative ways to help children in the fourth grade and younger to understand their spiritual walk with God.

A spiritual curriculum, the six Cs of the Bible's overall story: creation, crisis, covenant, Christ, Church and communion, is embedded into chapel services, art projects and the academic curriculum to "help kids understand the big story of the Bible and their own place within that overall story," said Grogan.

During the 2017-18 school year, Grogan coordinated a series of art projects, where locally connected artists created works related to the six Cs. This past school year, those original artworks were displayed on the Lower School walls, along with a new art project, a collage of bowls handmade by students, to reinforce the 2018-19 spiritual theme: "Filled."

During chapel services, the Lower School has explored the "Filled" theme by watching and learning from a potter as she created a vessel on a potter's wheel and hearing students' and teachers' testimonies of their own challenges, among many other interactive and hands-on activities.

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Another technique Grogan uses to engage young students is called Wonder Time, where children sit in a circle and are invited to enter into the Bible story lesson by making comments that begin with "I wonder".

"With typical Bible curriculum you often find that the objective is stated at the beginning of the lesson, such as 'We should share.' With that approach, we are telling children what they should get out of it rether then allowing the Word to enable to the

During Wonder Time, Grogan hears student comments such as "I wonder what it would have been like to be a little boy and to stand that close to Jesus" and "I wonder what Jesus said as he blessed the bread."

- "They are so into the story, and they become so engaged," she said.
- Grogan says that she strives to use every moment of each school year to be spiritually formative.

"The goal is for each child to understand the big story, to understand their place in it, and to learn who God is and how that shapes who we are and how it changes our interaction with people," she said.

Hembree served eight years as CEO of Nashville Electric Service, after a lifetime of working at the utility. He started as a junior engineer in 1947 after returning from service in the U.S. Army. He entered Lipscomb Academy in the sixth grade. During his senior year, he was voted by his teammates as the Best Mustang for the 1938-1939 basketball season. After attending Lipscomb University for two years, he obtained an engineering degree from Vanderbilt University. After retiring in 1985, Hembree took an art class in painting at Lipscomb University and has since sold more than 200 pieces of art.



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## MARY NELLE COPASS HUTCHESON CHUMLEY ('49) Nashville, Tennessee



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


