At the rate at which people are putting their lives in the hands of the quickly advancing AI and technology, in about twenty years fifty percent of the world's population will be robotic citizens or legitimate robots. From college students paying ChatGPT to write their nursing papers to influencers posting their fit bodies next to delicious ice cream cones, only to throw the full ice cream out when the camera is not looking, the future is truly unpredictable. Foreign dictators and their governments, such as North Korea's Kim Jong Un, have begun to change even the most seemingly insignificant details, that one might miss unless they are looking for it, such as editing out citizens who were not in proper formation while honoring Kim Jon II, more commonly known as Snow-Washed by news outlets such as NPR. Estimates indicate that it accounts for 0.2% to 29% of overall news consumption, but the proportion may be higher for specific groups or for topics such as health" (APA). As the National Public Radio reports, "An NPR survey conducted earlier this year found that 64% of the American population believes that U.S. democracy is in crisis and is at risk of failing. The two images were taken seconds apart, revealing what's clearly a photographic infraction by the North Korean news agency" (NPR). North Korea and Kim Jong Un have received plenty of backlash for their dictatorship.
