

Since 1999, we've provided quality compassionate health care to millions of children, with around 350–400 children visiting AHC every day to receive health care.

We pioneer specialty treatments rarely available elsewhere in Cambodia, caring for children with long-term, rare and acute conditions



We improve healthcare for children across Cambodia through education for health workers, community members and caregivers



We run a locally-led, strong and transparent organisation, ensuring we have the human, technological and financial resources to deliver our work in the hospital, classroom and community

As healthcare in Cambodia has changed, so have we



When AHC opened in the late 1990s, children were dying from preventable infectious diseases or from malnutrition



Now, children have more access to treatment for common illnesses at their local health centres



So AHC fills the gaps — providing specialty care for children with rare diseases like cancer, long-term conditions and life-threatening injuries

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As Cambodia has developed over the 20 years I've been volunteering at AHC, injuries have changed. We now see more serious injuries, like those from road traffic accidents.

AHC has repeatedly shown they can and will adapt, using the little resources they have to provide the best possible care for children. But they'll always need more.

Supporting AHC's commitment to excellence, teaching and service is important to me. Children need to have a place like AHC to care for them.

A severely injured or ill child has few options to get the right and timely care they need

Four people die and 12 people are injured from traffic accidents on average every day in Cambodia. It is the country's leading cause of death ¹

With 74% of Cambodians living in rural areas, many rural hospitals lack the resources to provide complex critical or trauma care ²

8.6 million deaths in low- and middle-income countries could be avoided with appropriate emergency care. Around 40% of deaths relate to not being able to access care ³

Without immediate care, children can be disabled for life, or worse — die.



Saved from third-degree burns

- Mengleang (2 years old) fell into a pot of boiling rice porridge — suffered third-degree burns on 50% of his body
- Initially treated at local facilities, then urgently transferred to AHC
- Arrived unresponsive and in critical condition
- Underwent intensive care, multiple surgeries and skin grafts
- Hospitalised for over 60 days
- Recovered well active, smiling and talking again
- His mother praised AHC for their life-saving and compassionate care



Sreyphy's last hope

- 17-year-old girl from Oudor
 Meanchey fractured her knee in a trampoline accident
- Turned away and overcharged by two hospitals without proper treatment
- Referred to AHC as a last resort after a month of worsening condition
- AHC surgeons modified tools and operated within two days
- After surgery and physiotherapy,
 she now walks without pain

Give a gift, save a life

US\$500

could provide one child with life-saving treatment in our intensive care unit

US\$6,000

could treat one child with leukaemia for a year

US\$1,800

could run our emergency department for one week

US\$8,000

could pay for all medicine for all children in our intensive care unit for three weeks

US\$2,300

could treat one child with retinoblastoma for one year

US\$18,000

could pay for one year of training for a specialty doctor in surgery, anaesthesia or intensive care
