- Michael Bentz, MD, has developed a <u>face shield</u> that can accommodate scopes, cameras, and loupes, protecting providers from exposure to patient droplets while preserving the limited stock of PPE.
- Hau Le, MD, has developed a device called <u>The BADGER</u>. The first of its kind, the box uses "negative pressure" to reduce airborne transmission from patients with COVID-19, and prevents direct splashing of droplets on healthcare providers and others who are caring for them.

Our physicians have mobilized to create solutions to protect themselves, other healthcare workers, and their patients when providing care for COVID-19.




