hether you want a complete overhaul or just a mini refresh, the best kitchens are both functional and beautiful. The kitchen is the hub of a home but also sees the most wear and tear. You can give your space an instant update by simply giving a nod to the latest on-trend colours - or perhaps it's time to replace your cabinets with a brandnew design style. The breadth of choice is vast and constantly evolving, meaning there is something out there to suit all tastes.

For classic cabinets with a difference, Tomas Kitchen Living's Naturalsheer kitchen collection - which is hand-built in Cambridge – is inspired by soft organic forms, boasting curved features. With a nod to Nordic style, wood kitchens create a warm, inviting atmosphere; the natural grain and textures adding depth and character to the home and providing the perfect backdrop for an abundance of natural textures - from quartz worktops to sandstone floors."

Founded by architects, Roundhouse crafts bespoke kitchens. Based at the company's Cambridge showroom, senior designer Allison Lynch notes that a mixmatch approach can add visual interest to a space. "Our work surfaces are built to last and designed with longevity in mind, so we recommend leaning towards timeless trends which you won't tire of easily. Fluted designs - such as the Dekton Ukiyo style, for instance - are gaining momentum in kitchen design."
