



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WHAT IS ACT UP?

According to ACT UP's official website: "The AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power (ACT UP) is a diverse, nonpartisan group of individuals, united in anger, and committed to direct action to end the AIDS crisis."

"We focus on HIV/AIDS and closely-related issues. Many of our members are also involved in other types of activism or activist groups, but ACT UP recognizes the importance of staying focused on HIV/AIDS until there is no longer an epidemic."

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WHY WAS ACT UP FORMED?

"ACT UP was formed in response to social neglect, government negligence and the complacency of the medical establishment during the 1980s. Soon it found itself needing to fight corporate greed, lack of solidarity and various forms of stigma and discrimination at home and abroad."

They end their mission statement with a call to action: "While ACT UP has an incredible history, HIV/AIDS is not history. HIV/AIDS is very much with us. And we call on you to join our fight to end AIDS."



THE RED ZONE


WHAT IS IT?




- Be aware of your surroundings and plan your nights out carefully

- Don't be a bystander; Remember that people who are under the influence cannot consent!



















STATS TO KNOW

- A U.S. woman's lifetime risk of breast cancer is t in 8
- Women who attend regular screenings for breast cancer have a 26% lower breast cancer death rate than women who do not attend screenings.
- In 2024, an estimated 42,250 women will die from breast cancer in the U.S.
- Black women are 40% more likely to die from breast cancer than white women.
- Hispanic women are more likely than white women to be diagnosed with breast cancer at later stages when it is more difficult to treat.



FACTS AND STATS

- An average of 24 people per minute are victims of rape, physical
 violence or stalking by an intimate partner in the United States
- Nearly 3 in 10 women (29%) and 1 in 10 men (10%) in the U8 have
 experienced rape, physical violence, and/or stalking by a partner
 and reported it having a related impact on their functioning.
- Black and African American members of the LGBTQIA+
 community are more likely to experience physical violence.
- Approximately 40% of Black Women experiencing Domestic
 Violence in their lifetimes
- 26% of gay men and 37% of bisexual men have experienced forms
 of rape and physical violence by an intimate partner
- Lifetime intimate partner violence among the transgender community ranges from 31% to 50%
