butlers, no cooks, and they even let their nanny go a couple of years ago. Kate especially wanted a normal family life, like the one she grew up

with, and although it's not what William was used to, he went along with it. He's very happy he did, because it's given the kids a very grounded and stable life.'

After switching the hustle and bustle of Kensington Palace for the sprawling countryside of

Windsor, the Prince and Princess of Wales made plenty of cutbacks. With no space for live-in help, it was reported that the

children's nanny - who had been employed by the couple since Prince George was eight months old - did not relocate with them, with the pair employing no

housekeepers or cooks in their

Although there's no staff, the busy parents don't do it alone. The insider reveals that their three children Prince George, 11, Princess Charlotte, nine, and Prince Louis, six, are all a big help - particularly in recent months, while Kate was undergoing preventative chemotherapy for cancer.

The insider says, 'It's very impressive how well behaved the kids are, and they pitched in even more when Kate wasn't well. They all have chores to do, like keeping their rooms clean, setting the table, and helping with the washing up. George and Charlotte are at an age now where they take turns helping with the cooking, and even little Louis has chores!

While Prince William's traditional royal upbringing was

much grander, his children's home life is reminiscent of their mother's own childhood. Growing up in leafy Berkshire with her mum Carole, 69, dad Michael, 75, and younger siblings Pippa, 40, and James, 37, Kate lived a 'very happy childhood'. Describing her parents as 'hugely dedicated', the royal previously revealed how her early years were spent attending Brownies, doing gardening and making arts and crafts.
