- the brain behind the car's multitude of functions and features - has improved over the years and is now intuitive and easy to use.

I'm constantly and increasingly impressed with BMW diesel engines. The 2.0I 4cyl turbodiesel in the X1 is a gem - 140KW and 400NM. Those are impressive figures and the motor is smooth and responsive.

Average fuel consumption is a claimed 4.6l/100km. That might not be a realistic, day-to-day figure but with a little patience you should be able to keep it under 7l/100km. So, would I buy one instead of the Kia Sportage (for instance)? The Korean equivalent starts at R483 995, a full R82 000 less than the BMW and the Sportage is, in my opinion, a better-looking car. The build quality is vastly improved and the factory warranty is impressive. The maintenance and insurance will be considerably less than an (out of warranty) X1. So which one then? If I could afford the extra (estimated) R2000 per month, I would buy the BMW. It has a presence. It feels stronger, safer and more refined and it's more enjoyable to drive.

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r Woman for that matter? The BMW X1 is a family car after all. These cars are going to be driven as much by women (if not more) as they are by men. But are they worth the extra money?

If you're hoping that I'm going to start using phrases such as 'pricing hyped up by brand snobbery,' then you might as well stop reading. Pricing, cost and

expense are all relative terms. The heart, as we're well aware, will often rule the head.

BMW say about the X1, "Whether in an urban setting or off-road, its powerfully-defined silhouette with a long wheelbase and short overhangs cuts an impressive figure." I'm still not convinced by the looks. From the front, it's purposeful and handsome. The rear of the car, however, is still a little function over form.

The problems regarding interior space with the previous model have been addressed. The new car has 56cms of leg room in the rear and improved boot size. We may, in that case, forgive the slightly clumsy rear profile.

As you would imagine, the interior of the X1 is a comfortable and sophisticated place to be. Thankfully BMW's iDrive system
