

Auto Tech students win Grainger award

Automotive students Austin Lehmann and Joseph Dietrich are the lucky recipients of two scholarships in the Grainger Tools for Tomorrow Scholarship program. This is the fifth year that Forest Park students have won the award—about \$14,000 in scholarships to date.

Lehmann and Dietrich will each receive a \$2,000 cash award and a custom \$1,000 tool box. STLCC is one of 50 community or technical colleges across the country that have been selected to participate in this scholarship program. Grainger is an industrial supply company, originally out of Chicago, with 600 branches in the United States, Canada, Mexico, India, China and Panama. Grainger has been sponsoring the Tools for Tomorrow scholarship program since 2006 to help technical education students achieve their educational goals.


