Commitment rally mixes promise with fun

"ARE YOU COMMITTED?" shouted rapper Ryan Bell, a former Wildwood student.

"YES I'M COMMITTED," students shouted back, arms swaying overhead, some clapping, some dancing in the aisles in the amphitheater at Kiener Plaza in downtown St. Louis.

"ARE YOU COMMITTED?" he rapped again and again, performing what is probably the nation's first and only rap song about Phi Theta Kappa's "Commit to Complete" initiative.

Energy and enthusiasm were high in sunny Kiener Plaza Friday afternoon as several hundred STLCC students gathered to publicly demonstrate their commitment to finishing their college educations. PTK Executive Director Rod Risley was the keynoter and was joined by Heather Wathington, a data coach for the Achieving the Dream Initiative, and Chancellor Myrtle Dorsey and Vice Chancellor Donna Dare.

The "Commit to Complete" rally was a dream come true for organizer Jeannine Shaffer, Wildwood's PTK president, who at one time was a homeless mother of three, living in her car and fleeing an abusive relationship. She found a new future at STLCC.

A community college graduate, Rod Risley has been executive director of PTK since 1985, growing the organization from 550 **national** chapters, to 1,250 **international** chapters.

"We're here to celebrate and inspire not just our own students, but every student in the city, the state and the nation to commit to complete their education," said Shaffer, who also serves as the PTK district regional vice president. "Community colleges are the great equalizing factor. They allow us to achieve our dreams and to better ourselves."

The rally was capped off with free tickets to the Cardinals baseball game where the Cards whomped the Washington Nationals, 12-2.

Campus rallies preceded the Kiener Plaza finale. At Forest Park last Wednesday, more than 200 students lit candles and repeated a pledge to "commit to complete" their educations, signing the large blue and silver banner which later hung at Kiener Plaza.

Four alums returned to Forest Park to share their personal success stories:

- Derek Adams, who earned a degree in business administration from the University of Missouri-St. Louis, and now works at A.G. Edwards.
- Shahrouz Yousefi, an engineer at Boeing.
- Clark Porter, an ex-offender who is now a Jobs and Family Specialist with the U.S. Probation Office in St. Louis, after earning a master's degree in Social Work from UMSL.
- Courtney Boddie, a Student Resource Specialist at Cornerstone: the Center for Advanced Learning at Washington University, who just finished his master's degree in counseling at UMSL and hopes to apply for the doctoral program next fall.
- Jeanina Triggs, who is a candidate for a doctorate in English at Saint Louis University and has taught at SLU and UMSL.

On Friday, PTK district student leaders lunched with Risley at Forest Park, and other students attended a pizza party before boarding the buses for the hoopla at Kiener Plaza.



10 Questions with Sandra Knight





Counselor Sandra Knight has spent 20 years as the adviser of Phi Theta Kappa's Xi Epsilon Chapter at Forest Park. She has been honored with numerous regional and international awards, including Distinguished Adviser, and under her leadership, students and the organization have thrived. She lives in O'Fallon, III., with her husband, and she has three grown children.

1. Where did you grow up?

I was born in Panama City, Panama, but grew up in Puerto Armuelles, a city near the Pacific Ocean.

2. What drew you to your career path?

In my family there was always an emphasis on education, and they wanted me to become a teacher. However, my desire to become a counselor was first inspired by a friend who was majoring in psychology and with whom I shared some affinity. After reviewing the psychology curriculum at the University of Panama, I decided that psychology was just right for me. 6. What are some of your favorite things to do?

I am passionate about listening and dancing to Latin music, especially salsa. I like to travel. I enjoy meeting people from all over the world. I appreciate the arts and the outdoors. I like parties!

7. What motivates you to do your best?

I believe that the intrinsic rewards that I receive from what I do in my relationship with others, motivates me to continue to do my best.
