DEDICATED volunteers have taken part in a mass clean-up of Whitley Bay beach.

The clean-up, organised by Californian wine company Barefoot Wines and Surfers Against Sewage, was part of the Barefoot Wines Beach Rescue Project — a nationwide effort to make Britain's coastline clean, safe and "barefoot friendly".

Almost 100 people, including young musicians and surfers, took part in the clean-up on Friday, collecting more than a dozen kilos of rubbish – ranging from crisp packets and drink bottles to copper piping, reading glasses and even abandoned car parts.

"Barefooter" representative Alistair
Feest, said that, despite it being a
nationwide project, the North East's
beaches have been a focal point in the
company's forethoughts.

He said: "The North East has some beautiful beaches and some very enthusiastic communities around them.

"So we were delighted to be able to visit four of them over the bank holiday weekend on the Barefoot Wine Beach Rescue Project.

"There were lots of members of the surfing community among the hundred or so volunteers at our Whitley Bay beach clean.

"All summer on the national Barefoot Wine Beach Rescue Project we've had fantastic support from the surfing community and Whitley Bay was no different."

But amassing almost 100 volunteers is no mean feat, with the company going to great lengths to recruit volunteers for the project.

Alistair added: "Our Barefooters visited Whitley Bay several weeks ahead of the beach clean and spread the word throughout the local community."
