Three years later, I was promoted to editor and have been responsible for the editorial direction of the paper since then.

On Monday, as I take over the reins at the Melrose Free Press, David Rogers will take over the reins here at the Transcript. Rogers has been editor of CNC's Amesbury News for the past three years. Prior to that, he was the sports editor of that paper and has worked for other CNC publications as well as the Eagle Tribune.

To all the elected town officials, appointed officials, committee members, volunteers and residents who helped make my tenure here at the Transcript a pleasure, thank you. To those who perhaps made my tenure here uncomfortable at times, thank you as well. Both experiences led to tremendous learning opportunities for which I am grateful.

I will continue to work out of the Beverly newsroom here at 72 Cherry Hill Drive and will be packing my office only to move across the newsroom. I'll also still be around Topsfield with my family, eating ice cream at Sweets (until, sadly, it closes), checking out books from the Topsfield Library, popping into Gil's while my children purchase

penny candy and bugging Jack at Dawson's with some obscure hardware-related questions. It will be nice, for a change, to walk the town and the soccer fields and the school hallways as a resident only, without having to wear my journalists' cap at the same time.

However, there will always be that tug. And I'll still be a faithful reader of the Transcript. You can count on that.
