My managers immediately saw me as a motivated and reliable individual. After just a few months of working with my company they decided to inform me that I was eligible to take the next steps to move up and work higher paying positions like being a certified trainer for our new hires. This can be attributed to the fact that my tone had shifted and set me apart from other employees by staying professional and motivated. I know that if I were to have spoken to them the same way I spoke to my friends and family prior to the interview, they would not consider me nearly as qualified for either position. The casual way I talk to my peers on a daily basis may be seen as unprofessional which is why I speak with a more skillful manner in a workplace. A German philosopher by the name of Friedrich Nietzsche has a quote that says, "We often refuse to accept an idea merely because the tone of voice in which it has been expressed is unsympathetic to us." This shows the importance of using the right tone for certain audiences. If we as writers try to connect with the audience using a tone that is "unsympathetic" to them, they won't want to continue reading to see the rest of what the author is saying. Our voices have the power to be the most impactful tools if we know how to use them properly. Not only the words you write, but also how you phrase them can be extremely effective.

Having a voice in writing is so important to me because it allows me to create a positive atmosphere at work, be compensated fairly to reflect my skill sets, and connect with a vast majority of people on a more personal level. I feel it is something that just comes naturally to me, however, there is always room for improvement and times I may learn new words and or phrases to better my writing. Using the ability to adapt to different voices for different audiences not only made an impact on this situation in particular, but can also be used in different scenarios such as

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applying for college, communicating with teachers, etc. It signals who I am and how I want others to perceive me as a person, student, and employee.
