BELLEAIR — Tim Hartle has fond memories of the Bellevue Biltmore Resort & Spa — he and his wife, Angela, were married there six years ago.

"We had the wedding at the little pink church right down the street from there," the 34-year-old Tampa financial adviser said. "We put up all

of our guests from out of town at the Biltmore. We had the reception in the Starlight room. It's just a beautiful, beautiful place."

Like many others who have stepped inside the hotel and meandered through its great expanse of corridors, Hartle is sentimental about the architecturally inspiring, 107-year-old landmark whose days may be numbered.
