10:10	MKT Introduces Keynote: Joseph Fuller	<p>Now, it is my distinct pleasure to introduce our keynote speaker, on Children, Caregiving and Competitiveness.</p> <p>Many of you have seen the Florida Chamber Foundation's Untapped Potential report, released before this year's legislative session. It showed that our state faces a \$5.4 billion loss each year due to inadequate child care.</p> <p>Our keynote today will take us a step further... looking at the data on how employee's caregiving responsibilities affect employers directly in surprising ways.</p> <p>Of course this is important to The Movement and the members of our Bosses for Babies initiative: business champions for early childhood who understand that when business supports families, everyone wins.</p> <p>Joseph Fuller no longer has young children at home, but he knows well the joy of grandparent life. He is a professor at the Harvard Business School, where he co-directs the school's long-term project, Managing the Future of Work, and also co-heads the university-wide Project on the Workforce. 11:14	<p>MKT thanks ROBIN</p> <p>MKT Introduces ROADMAP and Varnessa</p>	<p><b>Thank you, madame representative!</b></p> <p>The challenges of dealing with increasing rates of children with autism diagnoses, or other special needs and behavioral issues, has been a recurring theme in many of our conversations in the field over the last few years, so it's especially encouraging to know our leaders are focused on these issues.</p> <p>As we acknowledge a good bill on special needs that didn't quite make it through last session, I also want to share the good news of what did pass:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The largest increase in early learning funding in two decades - bringing our total investment to \$1.7 billion</li> <li>• Increased reimbursement rates for School Readiness, with \$46 million to support it.</li> <li>• Extended access for families enrolled in School Readiness, with \$23 million to support it.</li> <li>• Passage of a new child care tax credit that helps employers play a role in addressing affordability of early learning options - with \$5 million available each year for the next three years.</li> </ul>	<p>MARILYN hides BARTLEMAN</p>

That is a lot of millions and switching gears now I want to share one more...

We turn our attention now to Florida's Early Learning Roadmap - a very special document we released last fall, that was developed with the participation of nearly 1,000 Floridians..... Parents, educators, owners and operators of early learning programs, law enforcement, business leaders, and more.

The Roadmap was developed in three phases:

1. First, we went around the state having conversations with parents and educators in small groups, talking about their experiences with early learning and asking about their hopes and dreams for their children and for their families.
2. Then, we brought some of these "proximity experts," who directly experience the early learning system, together with system leaders and policy "experts" in a statewide Steering Committee. This group worked collaboratively to develop recommendations that responded to what we heard in the first phase.
3. Last, we brought those draft recommendations across the state again, hosting community meetings to learn what we got right and what folks wanted to see changed.

So the final Roadmap—with 41 recommendations across four key components—is truly the work of extensive collaboration. That collaboration continues today as a statewide advisory board is charged with prioritizing the implementation of these recommendations.

		<p>Today, I am pleased to announce that we've got new wind in our sails to continue this work: Helios Education Foundation has given a grant of \$1 million to support the implementation of Florida's Early Learning Roadmap. This will support the work of our advisory board, which is divided into four working groups that have each identified short- and long-term priorities and legislative asks... AND to build momentum with partners across the state who are networked locally and championing the Roadmap in their own communities. In keeping with the theme, we call these our "community drivers," because they are leading their community on the road to the recommendations they have prioritized!</p> <p>We are so happy to share this million dollar day with all of you! We have said from the beginning that the recommendations in the Roadmap are a recipe, not a menu — <u>each one</u> is crucial for meeting the needs of parents, children, and the people who educate them. We are grateful to Helios Education Foundation for recognizing the importance of this work to accelerate the pace on improving early education in Florida. Thank you!!</p> <p>The beauty of this effort is in the diversity of Floridians who join together to make change. I can think of no better way to showcase the work than to let you meet some of the people involved...</p> <p>For our next panel -Faces of Florida's Early Learning Roadmap, I'll turn it over to my colleague Varnessa McCray to moderate. <b>Varnessa is our first director of community engagement</b> at The Movement, and a dedicated road warrior who has covered so much of the state in her first 9 months that her face will be familiar to many of you! One of the guiding principles of our work with the Roadmap has been that “it takes all of us.” So our recommendations go beyond legislative action.</p> <p>PAUSE</p> <p><b>HERMAN</b>, tell us more about the priorities of the early education workforce workgroup that you sit on...</p> <p>Thank you, Herman. Professional development of our workforce is so important to ensure our young learners are having impactful learning experiences, whether that be in a family child care home, early learning center or similar. We love the idea of parent choice and allowing a parent to decide what best fits their child and family’s needs.</p> <p>PAUSE</p> <p>With that said, <b>CARI</b>, you were one of our guest speakers earlier this year on The Future Call and you mentioned an early learning portal that would roll out this year. I am so excited that it is up and running. Can you share with us how the portal works and the benefits of having such a resource for our families?</p> <p>Thank you, Cari. So we have our Roadmap Advisory Board working at the state level to push forward specific recommendations. Now, we have Community Drivers on that same road choosing recommendations to prioritize locally.</p> <p>PAUSE</p>	
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		<p><b>DIANA</b>, as a Community Driver, Thrive by Five Tampa Bay is already leading the work, already convening voices in your community and now implementing Roadmap recommendations in your local community. What recommendations have you all chosen to implement? And how is that going?</p> <p>Thank you, Diana. As I have told you time and time again, I love the idea behind Thrive by Five Connects to support our parents by connecting them to resources to help their families.</p> <p>PAUSE</p> <p><b>CLOSING:</b> Wow, I can't believe how quickly time has gone by. As you all have heard we have a lot of movement around the Roadmap. Now, — PAUSE — Imagine our future when each child in Florida has the early learning opportunities they need to thrive.---- PAUSE ---- There is a role for each of us as Floridians in moving this work forward and making that future we imagine a reality. But when a five year old already gets that feeling of "I just can't do this," it's a real American tragedy. We want <u>all</u> children to feel ready for the challenges of elementary school!</p> <p>So, we know how important literacy is. And we know that supporting young readers isn't only about putting books in their hands; it's about building relationships and fostering a love of reading. That's what our ReadingPals program is all about, and we invite any of you who has an extra hour each week to volunteer to consider being a ReadingPal this year.</p> <p>Throughout the school year, ReadingPals mentors spend one hour a week visiting with one or two students who need a bit of extra help. We have 14 Regional programs across 19 counties—last year matching 2,575 students in 500 classrooms with mentors.
