As she delved into her undergraduate studies, Prof. Maryam found herself slowly changing in ways she could not have anticipated. She started to see the world through a new lens, things that were once ordinary to her became extraordinary. She started to focus on the deeper aspects of life, like the very creation of the sky, the grass, and all things created by God. She started to see the beauty in all creations including humans. Instead of focusing on what appeared on the surface, she looked deeper into what lay beneath. She saw potential in everyone and that quality is what inspired her to become an educator herself. Her degree was no longer just a means to an end, it became a path towards a deeper connection with her faith and a desire in helping others.

The more she learned about Islam, the more she realized how little she had truly known before. She began learning not just from books or lectures, but from life itself. Her understanding of Islamic principles began to go beyond theory, it became a way of living. After graduating, however, Prof. Maryam felt an unexpected void. The satisfaction she thought would feel after graduating was missing. She realized that her academic journey had only opened the door to a much greater calling. She started to dream of reshaping how people perceived Islamic Studies,

not as a rigid or limited field, but as a bridge that connects knowledge with humanity, reflection, and change. Determined to bring this vision to life, Prof. Maryam pursued a Master's degree in Islamic Studies at Qatar University, specializing in the Science of Qur'anic Explanation (Tafsir). It was during this time that she discovered her true calling not merely as a student of knowledge, but as an educator, a mentor, and a voice for transformation. Teaching became her means of giving back, of nurturing the next generation of thinkers who would approach Islamic knowledge with openness, curiosity, and sincerity.

Upon completing her master's, her passion for deeper understanding and global impact led her to Morocco, where she pursued a Ph.D. in Islamic Studies and Community Issues at Mohammed V University. Over the years, Prof. Maryam authored three books and numerous research papers, each contributing to knowledge that redefines the purpose and perception of Islamic Studies. Her works gained recognition, earning her invitations to participate in the Doha International Book Fair multiple times, where she engaged with readers, scholars, and students who were inspired by her insights. Today, Prof. Maryam Alsada continues to be a figure of knowledge and transformation.
