

emmeline pankhurst 1858-1928

Here at Femme we are all about celebrating incredible women, and each issue will be dedicated to a different inspiration of ours. This issue we are celebrating the life of Emmeline Pankhurst.



"i'd rather be a rebel than a slave"

Emmeline Pankhurst was the leader of the British suffragette movement, and it's because of her that all of us women are able to have our say in the general election and vote on political matters. 2018 will mark the 90 year anniversary of both women winning the right to vote, and the sad death of Emmeline.

In 1903, she was one of the founders of the Women's Social and Political Union, whose members were known as the suffragettes. She was arrested numerous times during her life as a women's rights activist, after encouraging women to stop being silent. They smashed windows, they started fires and they went on hunger strike in prison. They weren't going to give in until they got what they so desperately wanted.

We also spare a thought for the equally incredible activist Emily Davison who died after throwing herself under the king's horse at the derby, as an attempt to garner publicity to their cause that had been so widely ignored.

Exactly 100 years ago, thanks to Emmeline and her astonishing army of suffragettes, the Representation of the people act was passed giving women over 30 the right to vote. Although not quite what they had all wanted it was still a groundbreaking achievement.

Emmeline was not just an incredible leader, she was a mother too and her daughters both joined the women's rights movement. Years of hunger strikes eventually took their toll on Emmeline and she became very ill, she passed away on the 14th June 1928 just after she finally saw women given over 21 equal voting rights to men.

In 1999 she was voted one of the 100 most important people of the 20th century by Time magazine. In 2015, the film Suffragette was released with Academy Award winner Meryl Streep playing the roles of Emmeline.

She died a hero and we, as a nation of strong, independent women, owe so much to her. RN

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audrey hepburn

If you ask a woman who her ultimate fashion icon is, she will most likely say Audrey Hepburn. Her impeccable style is one that has truly stood the test of time. And her most famous role is of course, that of Holly Golightly in the 1961 adaptation of Truman Capote's Breakfast at Tiffany's. That little black Givenchy dress she wore is one of the most iconic looks of all time, and it recently sold at auction for $\pounds 467,200$ - the highest paid price for a dress from a film ever.

It's not just on the screen that Audrey inspires a whole cross-generation of women. Off-screen, her classic look of cropped tailored trousers and a sweater is one that is still seen on hundreds of thousands of women walking down the street. Whether they know it or not, they have been inexplicably inspired by Audrey, and her style legacy still fills the pages of magazines, the rails of shops and touches the silver screen every single day.

In popular culture, Gossip Girl's Blair Waldorf is heavily inspired by Audrey's style, so a whole generation of fans emulated Blair's look, so in turn, are inspired by Audrey. More recently, Emma Stone's character in LaLa Land look was influenced by Audrey's earlier looks and her wardrobe in Roman Holiday.

To get Audrey's look, go for classic shapes like cigarette trousers, fitted sweaters, cropped jeans, sleeveless shirts, cocoon coats and of course, the little black dress. Simplicity is key.

jane birkin

Before Alexa Chung, there was Jane Birkin. The British born actress is one of the main inspirations behind the Parisienne chic fashion movement of the recent years. Her style throughout the seventies was effortless but so great. The classic blue jeans and t-shirt everyone is wearing? Jane Birkin did it first. One of her most iconic style legacies which have stood the test of time is the basket bag. If you take one piece of style wisdom from Jane, make it a wicker basket to carry your essentials in.

Jane has been a muse to fashion designers, for example, the iconic Hermès Birkin bag is named in her honour. After Hermès chief executive, Jean-Louis Dumas, met Jane on a plane and saw her struggling to carry all of her belongings in her basket he created the Birkin bag for her. It has gone on to be one of the most iconic bags of all time and can cost as much as £300,000. Another fashion designer inspired by Jane is Bella Freud, the designer created her best-selling Je t'aime Jane sweater in her honour and it's been worn by everyone from Alexa Chung to Kate Moss.

For Jane's look, a pair of loose-fitting light wash jeans are vital, a white t-shirt and a basket bag. She also experimented with soft gingham prints and for that true French look a beret for that true Jane je né sais quoi.





bianca jagger

The first wife of Rolling Stone Mick Jagger is most known for her incredible style during the seventies disco scene. A frequent visitor at New York's infamous Studio 54 nightclub (she even turned up on a horse for her birthday!) Bianca Jagger favoured jewel-toned colours, rich fabrics, faux fur, diamonds, and of course platform shoes. She even chose to clip her Rolling Stone's backstage pass to the strap of her platforms instead of ruining her outfit.

Her style was more dazzling and exciting than the hippy population of the seventies. She was bright, and glamorous and exciting. She was also a huge fan of tailoring and was extremely brand loyal to her favourite Halston. She often chose to wear a three-piece suit over an evening gown. Her style was androgynous yet also incredibly feminine, it had a layer of mystery to it that many women are still so desperate to emulate today.

katharine hepburn

A true icon in the menswear as womenswear movement, actress Katharine Hepburn is one whose style influenced a whole collection of women. If you like Diane Keaton's style in the cult classic 'Annie Hall', we have Katharine Hepburn to thank for that. Tailored shirts, waistcoats, and coats were also favoured by the actress, but despite her style, she always kept her hair and makeup soft, in order to create a more feminine juxtaposition.

how glossier became a beauty game-changer

The beauty brand built by a girl boss, for all your dewy skin needs.

Since its launch in the US in 2014, Glossier has rapidly achieved cult status in the beauty-sphere. So, when news landed that the brand was shipping to the UK, it was no surprise people were excited.

Glossier was set up by 32-year-old Emily Weiss, famous for her blog Into The Gloss that she founded in 2010 whilst working as Vogue's style director's assistant. Emily would post interviews that gave insight into the bathroom cabinets of celebrities including Kim Kardashian and Karlie Kloss. She was able to make a living from blogging alone thanks to advertisement money when the site grew in popularity.

Into the Gloss fast became a hub for beauty discussion and Emily started seeing a demand for products missing from the industry. "Let's create a brand that reflects what women want right now," she told Forbes of her thought process. They reported she raised \$2 million in venture capital funding ready to form a team. From there, with a focus on dewy skin and simple products (with the help of millennial pink branding), came along beauty game changer, Glossier.

The brand launched with 'Phase 1' which consisted of four skincare essentials: a skin tint, lip balm, priming moisturiser and face mist. Glossier's ethos is all about stripping things back to basics with gentle formulas. "Treat your skin like silk. It's delicate! We purposely make all of our products 'for sensitive skin' because what skin isn't sensitive?" told Emily to Forbes.

Glossier later introduced 'Phase 2,' makeup staples with the same brand values - keeping the skin looking natural and glowy. "It's very counter to the pop culture message, which is heavy contour, cut creased lid, caked on, baked makeup," Emily explained to Fashion Magazine. The range includes a highlighter, brow gel, concealer, powder, cream blush, lip gloss and matte lip. An eau de parfum with base notes of ambrette, ambrox and musk, an oil wash, and body cream designed for "all day hydration", are the latest additions to the brand.

In 2015 Entrepreneur wrote that Glossier's sale revenues were already in "the multiple millions". Emily implied this is largely down to being "a socially driven brand" during an interview with Mashable.

Through the strategic use of their huge online following their Instagram alone boasts 835,000 followers – where they advertise and socialise with customers, Glossier is revolutionary as the first digital beauty brand. "We're responsive in real time to our customers' needs and the changing needs of women," said Emily to Time.

But what makes Glossier successful also lies in one of the brands sentiments: Glossier is for all women who want to enhance their natural beauty. "Our girl doesn't need our products, but she chooses them because they make her feel great — simple as that," Emily mentioned to The Fader.

Emily's mix of girl power and ability to create products as great as they are Instagrammable to build her cult following, makes one thing certain: Glossier is here to stay - and our now glowing skin is very thankful.





Rainbow by Kesha

After facing a publicised, grueling sexual assault case, Kesha bounces back in an album of empowerment and artistic versatility. 'Hunt You Down' has an upbeat country feel, 'Hymn' is an addicting pop anthem for outcasts, and 'Praying' is an emotionally driven ballad.



Ctrl by Sza

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the old taylor is dead

You can release the best selling album of the year just to find people are still picking you apart and trying to diminish your success. Taylor Swift knows this better than anyone.

November saw the release of Taylor Swift's highly anticipated sixth album Reputation. But with it came a predictable onslaught of backlash, made up of old rumours and criticisms about the singer with new angles.

People seem to find amusement in brushing aside the fact that Taylor has released the critically acclaimed, best-selling album of 2017. Instead, they focus on picking her apart – as if calling her a snake and liar for a whole year previously, wasn't enough of a blow. These criticisms can come from an incredibly misogynistic place and maybe it's time we realise what a hard time Taylor is being given.

Let's start with the oldest problem in the book people have with T-Swift: why does she only write about boys? You don't see people making these comments about other successful musicians like Adele or Ed Sheeran, so why do people think she's oversharing? Her ability to be vulnerable with her feelings by turning them into art through music should really be praised. And ultimately, using this as a reason to discredit Taylor is redundant if you've taken the time to listen to her albums. They contain themes varying from friendship to eating disorders to her admiration for her fans – so no, she doesn't just sing about love. And let's not forget when she wrote a tear-jerking ballad about the passing of a boy with cancer, titled Ronan, with proceeds going to charity.

People also seem to have a problem with Taylor and her love life, believing it is their duty to be a commentator on her personal life, dissecting her relationships and attacking her for dating purely for new material. Take her romance with Tom Hiddleston last year, people suggested it was fake and said she moved on "too quickly" from Calvin Harris. Since when did it become illegal for women to have relationships?

Then last year, Taylor haters were clapping their hands when the feud between Kanye West and Taylor was revived although she publicly forgave him for interrupting her acceptance speech for Best Female Video at the 2009 MTV Video Music Awards. They seemed to be friends until Kanye released the controversial song 'Famous' in February 2016, featuring the lyrics, "I feel like me and Taylor might still have sex/ Why? I made that bitch famous." Taylor's team denied her giving consent to the lyrics and said in their statement, "Taylor was never made aware of the actual lyric, 'I made that bitch famous."" Fast-forward to July 2016, and Kim Kardashian tweeted a snake emoji before posting a clip on her Snapchat of Kanye and Taylor's phone call where he read only the line about having sex to her.

Cue the endless stream of snake emoji's commented on Taylor's Instagram and aggressive tweets calling her a liar, attached with #taylorswiftisover. This was whilst ignoring Taylor's bite back in her post about Kanye failing to ask permission to call her a "bitch" - a highly demeaning term to call your "friend".









Kanye then rendered it acceptable to use a wax figure of Taylor's naked body in his music video. She was placed among other celebrities that included Rihanna led next to her abuser Chris Brown – but Taylor is still the problem here, right?

August of 2017 Taylor released 'Look What You Made Me Do', the lead single from Reputation. The lyrics, "I don't like your little games/ I don't like your tilted stage" and "The old Taylor can't come to the phone right now/ Why?/ 'Cause she's dead," hinted it was about Kanye. Articles immediately started popping up taking a dig at Taylor, claiming she "won't stop talking about Kanye West". So are we suggesting Kanye can take credit for her fame based on an incident seven years ago, but Taylor can't respond? It doesn't sound remotely fair. But let's continue celebrating the problematic man who openly endorsed Donald Trump and called sexual assaulter Bill Cosby innocent, it makes perfect sense.

On the topic of sexual assault, remember in August 2017 when Taylor won her case against former radio DJ David Mueller for groping her in a meet and greet in 2013? Well, lots of the public decided to call it a publicity stunt for Reputation's release, or equally as worse, chose to be silent in supporting her. This response completely disregarded how Taylor's victory in the trial encouraged individuals to stand up and report their assault. Taylor even acknowledged her privilege in being able "to shoulder the enormous cost of defending myself" and donated to organisations that help victims of sexual assault. Yet, many of the self-proclaimed feminists out there are you guessed it, nowhere to be found. Anyway, Taylor wasn't even the reason for the trial, she was countersuing for one dollar after Mueller tried to sue her for \$3 million over false allegations she made him lose his job.

Another complaint people have enjoyed making to Taylor around the release of Reputation, is that she should be singing about politics - as if her music has ever been the place for political discussion. People aren't asking this of musicians like Sam Smith, but as usual, it's different when it comes to Taylor...

Shouldn't it be okay for music to be an escapism from the world of politics? And it certainly seems odd to apply it as a reason to claim Taylor is a white-supremacist. This is to the point where her lawyers had to threaten to sue a blog in a letter of "yet another unequivocal denouncement by Ms. Swift of white supremacy and the alt-right".

People can accuse Taylor of many things, but you certainly can't accuse this woman of not being gratuitous.

"I got smarter/ I got harder in the nick of time," sings Taylor on Reputation, and thank God she did because her ability to prevent masses of hate from getting in the way of her being a great musician shines through on this album. And if you're a hater, please rethink, then listen to 2017's best album. MR

Although still unsigned, Dainá is now collaborating with British producer August Twelfth, who handles the technical parts of her verses.






A review of the award winning movie Hidden Firgures

It is the age old question, can a woman really have a thriving career if she becomes a mother?

It's either a career or children, you can't have it all. Women hear this continuously as they grow up. It leads to so many questions, but no straight answer. It is quite an unfair thing to say to any woman, because what if we want both? If men can be both fathers and have a successful career, we can too.

But first, let set some things straight. This is not just another article desperately trying to convince you to be a mother. Or one that tells you your life is going to be filled with love and joy. Or that being one is the answer to all of your problems. Because it really is not.

This is about showing you it is possible to combine both professional success and family commitment.

Why? Firstly, having a child is a sacrifice. It is the single most selfless act. Secondly, when a woman becomes pregnant she gives up her body, then once the baby arrives: her sleep and even her food at times. She has to run around and care for everything and everyone.

How do I know? Just look at my mother. She had three at the same time. She had to do everything three times over. For her, neither peace of mind nor sanity have been a priority for the past 21 years. She has had several jobs and still has; a MasterChef, schedule organiser, cheerleader, comforter, mentor and detective. But, there is one job she had to sacrifice – her career.

Of course, some manage it. Mrs Fila, a mother of one and part-time lecturer at the University of Zagreb managed to juggle both. "I was lucky because my job was quite flexible and I could bring my son into work, whether it was in university or art exhibitions I had to present," she said. "Everything is possible, but you have to balance it out."

"The most difficult part was when my child would get sick and the teacher calls you to pick him up, it always had to be me. It was never my husband. And if you are in the middle of something it gets quite tricky."

Being a mum is a 24/7 job, but so is being a dad. Men are still conditioned to believe that their primary obligation is to be the breadwinner. On the other hand, women are led to believe that their primary family obligation is to be the caregiver. And while this may be logical, we should expand our horizons.

Many men might consider the choice to spend more time with their children instead of working long hours selfish. They are always praised for having sacrificed their family life to make progress in their career. Yet women are criticised and called "bad mothers" for doing the same thing.

Fathers believe that there is little interaction possible with a new-born baby. However, they can get a lot of benefit from caring for the baby. Time spent with the baby in the early weeks and months should provide a positive foundation for the developing relationship as the child grows, making fatherhood more rewarding and enjoyable.

Also, it has been proven that fathers who are involved in their children's lives from day one significantly increase their child's physical and mental development. Hands-on fathers also suffer from less stress. "Fathers can attune to their babies, to become familiar with them, their likes and dislikes, and therefore increase their confidence with the baby," Helen Hans, a postnatal leader with the UK's National Childcare Trust told *The National*. "when a woman becomes pregnant she gives up her body, then once the baby arrives: her sleep and even her food at times. She has to run around and care for everything and everyone."

Men are more "rough and tumble" with their children and encourage more risk-taking behaviour. Women tend to use simple words to adjust their language down. But, men use more complicated words which help to broaden the child's vocabulary.

"Babies who have benefited from paternal interactions from an early age get on better with their peers," Dr Lin Day, the founder of Baby Sensory development classes, said in a recent interview. "They're academically more successful, stay in school longer, use drugs and alcohol less frequently and are less likely to get involved with crime. They may also be better equipped socially and psychologically than infants who receive very little attention from their fathers."

It is the time that we raise awareness about these issues. And the reason this is an issue is because women tend to forget their careers and throw them away. If both parents had equal roles, this would give mothers the chance to focus on their careers. It is not something to throw away. There is so much more we can do than just being mums, for instance being bosses.

As working mothers, we promote equality in our marriage or partnership. And while some might think that if you work full time you will spend less time with your children, that is actually not the case. According to the Bureau of Labour Statistics married women who work full time spend 2.1 hours per day on primary childcare on average, while married women who were not employed spent 3.1 hours each day on childcare. As a working mum, you will be aware that you have limited time to spend with your children and this will make quality time with them more valuable.

Not to get too Utopian and make it seem it is all going to be pretty in pink. The harsh reality is that it is going to be difficult, and you will face plenty of obstacles, and there will be times where you will want to give everything up, and where sleepless nights will take over. But then you will remember why you started (as cliché as it sounds) and you will be alright.

It is sad that some believe that motherhood and a career cannot co-exist in the eyes of 43 per cent of mothers according to *The Atlantic*. We can have it all, and we should have it all. Especially in this day and age. If your child asks you if she can be a brain surgeon and a mother, your response should be "Of course you can". At least that would be a start. LD



how to be successful like her: oprah winfrey

She's smart, world famous and incredibly succesful... but Oprah Winfred started from nothing, and here's how she earned her success.

Success - it's a term that everyone defines differently. For some, it is working until their bank account resembles a phone number (or at least half a phone number), for others, it is landing their dream job, and for the rest it is happiness. Oprah Winfrey is a woman who has achieved all three.

She is one of the most powerful people in the world. With a net worth of \$3 billion, she is one of just two black billionaires in North America (the other is Michael Jordan). Her 25-year career as host and producer of The Oprah Winfrey Show changed the TV business.

Surprisingly, her first screen job ended quickly because she was deemed "unfit for TV". Quite ironic since she is now praised for popularising the confessional form of the talk show, which has since become common across cable networks. Whoever's lips spoke those words probably still tears up whenever they hear Oprah's name.

But it was not always like this. As a child, her outfits were made of potato sacks as her family could not afford clothes. This earned her the cruel nickname of 'Sack Girl'.

And she was sexually abused by her cousin at the age of nine, a pattern that continued with other family members later in life.

"Anybody who has been verbally abused or physically abused will spend a great deal of their life rebuilding their esteem," she told 3,000 students at Ball State University in Indiana.

This may help explain why she succeeded as a talk-show host. It is no surprise that her guests confess their biggest fears and secrets to her. Whatever has happened to them, Oprah has probably experienced worse and therefore can bond with them.

Her talents became visible quite early. At the age of three, she could read and she would perform mock-interviews with her doll. 'The Preacher' was a second, much kinder







nickname she earned in church because she was a talented speaker. The gift was always present, it just needed the right environment to bloom. That environment came when she moved in with her father.

He was a soldier; strict and disciplined. He drilled her in reading a book and writing a report week-in, week-out. Oprah soon became the best student in the class. At 17 she won a beauty contest and was awarded the title of 'Miss Fire Prevention' - this was her breakthrough. She visited a Nashville radio station and, as a joke, read the news. She was offered a job on the spot. Her career was born.

After years of hard work, she was crowned a media mogul, and she still is one. Success comes to those who work hard. Oprah definitely did. Her bank account looks like at least two-thirds of a phone number. She got her dream job. And despite the fact she does not have children and is unmarried, a beautiful bright smile never leaves her face; proving everyone wrong! LD



Dany Cotton had been appointed first woman commissioner of the London Fire Brigade a few months earlier, but when the Grenfell Tower housing estate was burning down on June 14, she had to quickly assess the danger and send firefighters into the blaze, managing a quick response.

She says, "Looking at the building engulfed by the flames and knowing I had hundred-plus firefighters inside at any one time, made me feel sick".

In the meanwhile, survivors might praise her efficiency and colleagues' bravery for a lifetime. FR
