





Russian artist Alexander Tylevich's glittery, 35-foot Tree of Life statue represents the merging of science and faith. Symbols of scientific disciplines taught in the Pomponio science center adorn steel spirals that form a crown of thorns around a cross of Christ. The words of a Jesuit paleontologist are etched into its base.
