# Adopt-a-Doc Scholarship

Initiated in 2010 with a gift from pediatrician Russell Libby, MD '79, the Adopt-a-Doc Scholarship program provides alumni and friends with the opportunity to support a current GW medical student throughout their the student's four years of medical school. Adopt-a-Doc enables tangible connections and engenders-facilitates lasting relationships that are important to future physicians, especially as they begin their journeys.

With a minimum commitment of \$20,000 to be **provided gifted** over four years in equal installments of at least \$5,000, an Adopt-a-Doc Scholarship will support one student throughout their that student's four years of medical school. The Adopt-a-Doc Scholarship thus allows the donor to "adopt" a future physician at the start of their medical career.

### A Reunion Gift in Loving Memory

Brenna Clougherty, MD '08, who served as chief resident of pediatrics at Children's National Health System (Children's National), was a devoted physician who touched innumerable dozens of lives. Many of those who knew her best felt compelled to find the perfect way to honor her after she died from cancer in March 2018, just six months before her tenth 10th George Washington University (GW) School of Medicine and Health Sciences (SMHS) reunion.

Members of the SMHS MD Class of 2008 <u>concluded realized</u> that raising money for an Adopt-a-Doc scholarship would be the <u>perfect\_ideal</u> way to memorialize Clougherty's giving spirit and passion for education. The class, along with Clougherty's family, friends, and resident cohort, raised more than \$30,000 for a four-year scholarship. MD student Elizabeth Ghandakly, class of 2022, is the recipient of this scholarship.

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#### Seeing Eye to Eye

Is there such a thing as a self madeself-made man or woman? Thomas E. Flynn, MD '86, doesn't think so. Rather, he believes each successful person receives has had some help along the way. For him, that helping hand was GW Trustee Emeritus Sheldon Cohen, AA '48, BA '50, JD 52'52. Originally wait-listedwaitlisted at the School of Medicine and Health Sciences, Tom credits the former GW Board of Trustees chairman with helping him get an interview which that ultimately secured his acceptance. "Sheldon Cohen believed in me," Tom says, "and I will never forget that August Sunday when the phone rang. I got the spot of someone who dropped out the day before classes started...I thought I was dreaming."

Tom's dream of attending GW came true that day, and <u>now-now</u>, more than 30 years later, he and his wife, Susan Scherbel, are giving back to ensure <u>each future</u> <u>generation hasfuture generations have</u> the same opportunity. The couple has pledged \$100,000 to establish the Flynn Family Adopt-a-Doc Scholarship Fund, which will support five students for the duration of their medical education at GW.

These scholarships are more than just an opportunity to help SMHS students as they begin their own journeys; this is an opportunity to recognize the impact Sheldon had on us.
