Die Hard lives to see another day

Die Hard, the granddaddy of all action flicks, is back and with a vengeance. Does it still have the legs to hang with the big boys?



Apparently yes, because in A Good Day to Die Hard, the fifth in the action series and first since 2007's Die Hard 4.0, the stakes are higher and the bombs and car chase scenes even more explosive.

Die Hard 4.0 saw John McClane, Bruce Willis' character, saving his daughter from cyber-terrorists holding her hostage. A Good Day to Die Hard continues with the parental theme, this time introducing us to John McClane Junior, a.k.a. "Jack," played by newcomer Jai Courtney. In the movie, McClane travels to Moscow to bail his son out of jail, but gets pulled into the terrorist plot his son is somehow involved with. Soon, father and son are facing off against what seems to be the whole of Russia, causing major international mayhem and carrying on their shoulders the burden of saving the free world once again.

A Good Day to Die Hard has two new things going for it. First, it's set outside of good ol' U.S.A. for the first time, lending plenty of "fish out of water" moments for native New Yorker McClane.
Second, the estranged relationship between father and son is explored, when in previous films Junior had only been mentioned or briefly shown. What makes the movie interesting is that the son is said to be even more badass than the father.
