Basket hounds

At these summer tournaments, the players will do whatever it takes to please the crowd—even jump over a Hyundai By Jennifer Lisle

f you take your basketball neat—meaning indoors, with players who follow the rules and don't hassle the refs—then you'll probably be satisfied by the Nike tournament at Hunter College or the Pro Am at Riverbank State Park. But if you like your basketball in the form of an upside down shot on the bar, with players such as Basic Instinct, Best Kept Secret, Ala Mo and Will Power wreaking havoc on the court, passing from behind their necks, showboating for girls in the crowd and, well, getting a motherfucking swerve on, then go to

a summer street ball tournament.

The best known tournament, and definitely the biggest spectacle, is the Rucker, held at Holcombe Rucker Park in Harlem. "It's completely unpredictable," says Danielle Gardner, director of *Soul in the Hole*, a street ball documentary airing on HBO this summer. "You never know what's going to happen, but it will always be a show."

The Rucker's roots as a showcase of talent go back to the '60s, when it was run by Bob Cullough. Julius Irving, Fly Williams, Herman Helicopter and World B. Free used to go up and make it showtime. One day in 1981, on Mr. Magic's Hot 97 show, Crash Crew bragged that it could beat Disco 4 in a basketball matchup. Disco 4 took up the challenge, and when the two teams showed up at Marcus Garvey Park, more than 1,000 people were waiting. That competition soon moved to Rucker Park. Now officially known as the Entertainer's Basketball Classic, the tournament draws big-name players (Rod Strickland, Mario Ely and Kevin Garnet) as well as rap stars (L.L. Cool J, Biggie Smalls, or whoever else Puff Daddy from Bad Boy Records decides to bring). "Deep down, all sports figures want to be singers and all singers want to be sports figures," says Greg Marius, original Disco 4 member and Entertainer's Classic founder.

Now, more than ever, a player can't show up with just a basic game. He has to be a crowd pleaser—someone who shakes and bakes, and can talk mad trash—or the crowd will boo him out. In order to escape that fate, players push themselves and taunt each other in the most out-

rageous ways. Last year, one player tried to jump over a Hyundai in a slam-dunk contest. "He missed the shot, and his foot went through the windshield, but the crowd loved it," says Marius.

Once a player wins over the spectators, they're with him forever. "I once made a three-point shot to win the game, and the crowd came down and ripped off my uniform," remembers "Master Rob" Hockett, a 13-year Rucker veteran. "All I had on in the end was my jock strap and my Nikes."

Other tournaments, such as Soul in the Hole in Brooklyn, are more of a local scene. Everyone in the neighborhood comes out to watch their favorite players, and vendors sell everything from juice to haircuts-while-you-watch. Soul in the Hole's reputation is for harder, more no-nonsense playing than the Rucker, but the tournament is rooted so locally that any team from outside the neighborhood will be put through the ringer by the refs and the crowd.

In downtown Manhattan, the big scene is still at West 4th Street. Since this tournament is played on a small court, it's also famous for tougher, more balls-to-the-wall (or, in this case, balls-to-the-fence) playing. The easy-access location, outside the West 4th Street subway stop, also draws a random mix of spectators, including devoted locals and Euro-trash tourists.


