Columbia had a rough weekend after losing three games in the Maclay Invitational in Tallahassee. So, as the team took the field to face district-rival Gainesville last night, they were goal hungry and ready for a win.

ATLANTA — The score made it appear No. 15 Florida was outclassed in its SEC championship game against top-ranked Alabama.

Gators cornerback Teez Tabor insists that wasn't the case. He was convinced Saturday's ugly 54-16 loss would have been different if not for three first-half intercep-

tions.

"No question," Tabor said without hesitating. "It's a 17-point difference at the half. It's a tie ballgame."
