# Generals blow away Tigers

#### Columbia loses semifinal game to Lee on Friday.

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JACKSONVILLE - The Tigers spent last week vigorously prepping for the Generals star quarterback. Even the in-game adjustments made wouldn't make a difference.

Robert E. Lee quarterback Derrick Jones anchored his team in a stellar semifinal rematch performance. The senior scrambler slipped through the teeth of Columbia's defense consistently, tallying 152 of his total 325 yards on the ground.

"I tip my hat to him," Columbia nose tackle Robbie Moon admitted. "He's a really good quarter- Tigers struggled to move

back."

Jones' third touchdown of the night gave the District 2 champs a comfortable lead after halftime, and Lee wouldn't looked back, stifling the Tigers down the stretch.

Lee running back Allan Bass added two touchdowns on two carries in the fourth quarter as the Generals booted the Tigers out of the postseason 43-7 Friday night.

"I think we took the preparation too lightly," wide receiver Nate Maxwell said. "At least on my part. I think we overlooked these guys, and started thinking too far ahead."

Columbia's offensive woes from earlier in the season suddenly resurfaced against Lee. The Generals' pressure was too much to bear as the

the chains. Columbia quarterback Davin Schuck was held to 127 passing yards.

In his final career game, Schuck was sacked six times including a safety midway through the second quarter that put the district rival Generals ahead 9-0.

Lee dominated on the defensive line throughout the contest, shifting the offense away from its normal identity and holding the unit to one score, like the last meeting.

Despite the safety, hope still wasn't lost on the Columbia sideline. The Tigers regained some momentum in the Backyard on their ensuing drive.

Columbia senior running back Kamario Bell wouldn't be denied a touchdown in his final outing. Bell's

## **Gators clinch SEC East**

Florida gets a tense win over No. 16 LSU.

BATON ROUGE, La. — Florida's defense stuffed LSU's Derrius Guice on a do-or-die run from the 1-vard line in the final seconds and the No. 21 Gators held on for a tension-filled 16-10 victory that clinched the Southeastern Conference East Division. The stop capped a

defensive struggle in which No. 16 LSU converted a fourth-and-10 play on its final drive, only to get stopped on back-toback runs from the 1 to end the game. Fullback J.D. Moore came up short

on third down. Florida quarterback Austin Apppleby completed only seven passes on 17 attempts, but one of his connections went for a of Guice's fumble in the pivotal 98-yard touchdown first half and the second to Tyrie Cleveland. Eddy Piniero scored the rest of

Florida's points on field goals of 36, 24 and 34 yards.

LSU (6-4, 4-3 SEC, No. 16 CFP) controlled most of the game and held considerable statistical advantages, outgaining Florida (8-2, 6-2, No. 23 CFP) 423 vards to 270 and holding possession for 34:02. But on three occasions, the Tigers failed to score after driving inside Florida's 10 — the first time because

# **Indians fall to Madison County**

#### Fort White loses despite early 17-point lead.

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FORT WHITE — Going into the fourth quarter Friday night, it looked like the Indians would avenge last year's loss to Madison County make it to the state semifinals.

With a 10-point lead and the home crowd feeding their adrenalin, the Indians looked to have all the tools they needed to win their

regional final matchup against the Cowboys. But a fourth-quarter comeback by Madison secured the No. 1 ranked 1-A team in Florida the 21-17 win, and the chance to move on in the postseason.

"I just feel so bad for our coaches and players who have put so much into it and sacrificed the world to make this a reality," Fort White head coach Demetric Jackson said. "To have it slip out of our hands like that is devastating.'

After securing a 17-0 lead early in the second half, the Indians slowly began to see their lead and the game move out of reach.

A seemingly-revived Cowboy (11-0) offense plowed down the field to score three touchdowns, while the Madison defense left the Indians scoreless. rackingup two interceptions.

After the Cowboys scored 21 unanswered points, the Indians saw a glimmer of hope, when senior C.J. McCoy recovered a Madison County

Hunter Houston's missed 37-yard field goal on the first drive of the second half was one of several lost opportunities by Columbia Friday night.

While the Tigers' offense

failed to find a rhythm, Lee's offense, led by Jones, continued to move the chains.

The Generals (9-1) scored four unanswered touchdowns after halftime against the Tigers (7-4) en route to their first regional final berth since 1996.

It was a rough ending to a memorable season for the Tigers, who won six straight games after their September loss to the Generals.

"At the end of the day, we have to come together as a team," linebacker S.L. McCall said. "At practice we play against the toughest offense and the toughest defense. The game should have been easy."

However, the hope for a comeback quickly vanished, when on the first play of possession, quarterback DJ Jackson's pass to running back Kalin Timmons bounced off his hands and into the hands of Madison's Travis Jay, giving the Cowboys the ball, and the win.

"I'm basically hurt, seeing a game in our hands just slip away," junior playmaker JacQuez Pelham said.

Pelham was a driving force for the Indians, and led his team with 131 rushing yards. Pelham was the first to put points on the board for Fort White, with

an early second quarter touchdown.

Jackson scored his team's only other touchdown of the game also in the second quarter when he ran the ball one yard into the end zone. The senior quarterback completed 16 of 25 passes for


126 yards. Fort White kicker Brandon Shrum's 28-yard field goal at the start of the second half gave the Indians their 17-0 lead. After that,

the Cowboys took over. Touchdowns from Madison County's Teryon Henderson, Derrick Staten Jr. and quarterback Keyshawn Mcquay put the Cowboys on top. Despite a last-ditch effort to take back the lead, the Indians walked away from Arrowhead Stadium with the loss, their first and last at home this season.

"It's hard to imagine," Coach Jackson said. "We were the better team, we just didn't finish the game."
