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Tree slices home in half

Resident: 'So glad we weren't here when it happened.'

Watching the Thomas family smiling and chatting in their Lake City home Wednesday morning, you would never know there was a giant oak tree lying in the middle of their bedroom.

Sanel Thomas, her husband Eddy, and their children Andrey and Jozelyn Brinson packed away photographs and clothes, preparing to leave the home they rented for three vears.

They had lost plenty in the last few hours, but it didn't dampen their spirits.

All that mattered was that nobody — especially a 9-month-old baby who'd been scheduled for a nap in a bed now crushed under the weight of splintered wood - had gotten hurt.

"It was in God's hands," Sanel Thomas said.

Just after 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Sanel was getting ready to lay her goddaughter, 9-month-old Larayah Walker, in her bed when her daughter got called in to work at the Lake City Mall and needed a ride.

TALLAHASSEE - In a major shift from last month, a poll released Wednesday shows Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump overtaking Democrat Hillary Clinton in the key swing state of Florida.

In a head-to-head matchup, Trump leads Clinton by a margin of 42 percent to 39 percent in Florida, erasing the Democrat's eight-point lead in June, according to the poll conducted by Quinnipiac University. Trump also

Storms included hail and 60-mph winds

Lake City got 2 inches of rain in about 30 minutes.

An intense thunderstorm in Lake City on Tuesday afternoon caused structural damage to at least three homes in East Gate Village and left county roads lit-

tered with tree limbs.

Storm clouds began gathering around 3 p.m. and did not abate until after 6:15 p.m. with the heavy rain and hail starting around 5:30 p.m. About 2 inches of rain fell in approximately 30 minutes.

Estimated wind gusts were 60 mph, according to the National Weather Service of Jacksonville. The weather service said that small hail was also reported. The

windshield of a car on State Road 47 was struck by hail, resulting in about a 2-foot crack.

But the real damage was in East Gate Village, a mobile home community off Pinemount Road. A home rented by Eddy and Sanel Thomas was destroyed by a large oak tree that split the structure in two. (See related story above.)

A large tree also collapsed the front deck of the home of Ava

Casto on Tuesday night. Casto did not know how severe the damage was until she woke up Wednesday morning. "I was shocked," she said.

Kate Guillet, meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Jacksonville, said pea-size to penny-size hail was documented. A severe thunderstorm warning was issued for the county.

County Attorney Joel Foreman said in previous interviews the lawsuit raised valid points.

Foreman's Under advice, the county commission opted in June for a fresh start with a new ranking committee.

Lifeguard President Brett Jovanovich could not be reached immediately for comment.

Lifeguard, which has been the county's EMS provider since 2011, mounted a legal challenge to halt negotiations for the contract when Century was chosen the first time.

The county argued the lawsuit was moot since it decided to start the process over.
