## **UF FOOTBALL SEC works to** avoid repeat of **UF-LSU** fiasco

Officials hope to prevent similar situations.

BATON ROUGE, La. — Florida's visit to LSU this weekend — for what was supposed to be a Gators home game — is the result of an acrimonious stalemate last month over what to do about an impending natural disaster.

Southeastern Conference officials hope to avoid having the rescheduling or relocation of future league games handled the way LSU and Florida did it during Hurricane Matthew not just because of the logistical headaches and divisiveness it caused, but also because it has become an unwanted story line in the SEC East Division title race

No. 21 Florida, which needs a victory to clinch the East, was supposed to host LSU Oct. 8 . Instead, the Gators must now travel to Death Valley for 16th-ranked LSU's "Senior Day.'

SEC Commissioner Greg Sankey said Wednesday


that discussions are expected to begin during the next conference athletic directors meetings in December about how to refine the process of rescheduling games that need to be delayed or moved, with the aim of producing recommendations which will be forwarded to university presidents for approval. Currently the conference commissioner lacks authority to unilaterally make a scheduling change. League rules dictate that rescheduling must be agreed upon by both schools, forcing Sankey to serve as a medi-

"The presidents have made clear to me their intention to address our regulations and bylaws in order to establish a clear path to a decision-making process that gives the commissioner's office authority to resolve scheduling issues in a fair and timely manner," Sankey said in an email to The Associated Press. "We will use the Hurricane Matthew experience to analyze our processes and to provide clarity to our regulations and bylaws in order to address

## Florida State slides past Iona with 99-78 win.

TALLAHASSEE — Since the start of preseason practices, Florida State coach Leonard Hamilton has been selling his team's depth as their biggest advantage. On Tuesday night, the Seminoles put that on full display.

Six players scored in double figures as the Seminoles cruised to a 99-78 victory over Iona. It is the first time since the 2014-15 opener against Manhattan that they have had that many players in double figures.

"Overall I was pleased with the direction," Hamilton said. "The biggest challenge for us is to utilize the quality of the depth. We're trying to explain that we have to understand that each night it is going to be different guys that are going to step up. We're a team that is going to win by committee."

Freshman Jonathan Isaac led the way with 20 points as the 2-0 Seminoles shot 58 percent from the floor (34 of 59) and were 30 of 42 when not shooting 3-pointers. Phil Cofer had 13 points and six rebounds while Terrance Mann (12),

# Indians' energy propels them through playoffs

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FORT WHITE — The playoffs can be the most exciting and the most grueling part of any football season. While teams are hungry for a shot at a state championship, many struggle to keep their energy levels high after playing game after game, week after week.

However, the Indians do not show any signs of losing their momentum as they head into Friday's regional final against Madison County. In fact, as they continue to progress in the postseason, the team's energy level seems to have only gone up.

"There's a lot of juice flowing," Fort White head coach Demetric Jackson said. "There's a lot of energy, a lot of attention, a lot of what you need for football."

face Lee in a rematch duel Friday night. A chance to get even and advance to the regional finals.


"Everybody expecting us to lose," linebacker Jaylen Brown said. "If we play Columbia football, we'll take care of them. Our offense wasn't really clicking the first time we played them, but now we're scoring at least 28 points a game.'

Columbia's offense has indeed surged since its loss to Lee, routing each of its following regular season opponents - averaging 37 points a game.

Lee last year sparked a similar turnaround to its season after being shutout 56-0 by Columbia at home. The Generals won their next five of six games to reach the postseason for the first time since 2008.

Lee has been as good as advertised sitting at 8-1this season, answering the preseason hype which surrounded the team after its overachieving finish in 2015.

The Generals though are playing in their first regional semifinal game in over a more ready to seize it.

"Those kind of factors have to have some sort of impact on the outcome," Columbia coach Brian Allen said. "I've definitely thought about that. Columbia is feeling confident despite entering as underdogs. Local media outlets have projected a Tigers' loss this week extra motivation for the overlooked group.

While Lee coasted through the regular season, Columbia had to fight from behind to return to the playoffs for a sixth straight year. The Tigers have earned the chance – once and for all - to prove to everyone who the best team is in District 2.
