Windham Hospital **Emergency Department** Tops in the State in Patient Satisfaction

in the 99th percentile for satisfaction according to a patient survey by Press Ganey, a national health care performance improvement organization. In the survey, the Windham Hospital Emergency Department

(ED) outperformed the mean score for all other emergency departments in the state by 9.4 percent.

Press Ganey is contracted by Windham Hospital to independently and objectively complete patient satisfaction surveys that are mailed to patients randomly.

In the latest survey conducted from October 1 through December 31, 2012, Windham Hospital ED patients were asked to rate their experience in areas such as wait times, courtesy and skill of doctors and nurses, efficiency of lab personnel and the handling of their personal and medical information by hospital staff.

Patient's comments about their treatment in the Emergency Department included:

• "I Love your staff. Nurses and doctors are the best professionally and very caring."



• "Was treated by staff as if they were treating their own family member."

• "Nurses spoke to me like another human being, not a number or a product, was a very nice surprise."

Press Ganey regularly surveys patients to assess their satisfaction with services received,

and reports findings quarterly for 23 separate Connecticut emergency departments.

"We are very proud but not at all surprised by this recognition for the talented staff of our Emergency Department," said **Stephen W. Larcen,** PhD, President and CEO of Windham Hospital. "To hear anecdotal information about individual community members and the excellent care

they're receiving is particularly rewarding."

The Jeffrey P. Ossen Emergency Center at Windham Hospital is a spacious, state-of-theart facility staffed with a team of physicians and nurses specifically trained in providing fast, expert emergency care. The center has achieved an outstanding record of delivering timely care to its patients. ED wait times are now under 30 minutes 85 percent of the time.

Renovated and expanded in 2006, the Windham Hospital Emergency Department sees more than 36,000 patients annually.

- Created COPD Nutritional Guidelines for both weight gain and weight loss
- Created an icon on the hospital's internet page with nutrition information
- Created a pediatric nutrition risk assessment protocol at the hospital
- Begun to offer continuous glucose monitoring to diabetes patients
- Created "Weight Assessment" and "Bringing Food from Home" materials to be included in patient admission folders
- Celebrated World Diabetes Day with a community health fair to help create greater awareness of diabetes
- Worked with Windham Middle School in a grant-funded Nutrition & Activity Program to help students understand the importance of good nutrition and physical activity



Local Medicare Advocate Judith Stein Appointed to Bipartisan Long-Term Care Commission udith Stein, founder and executive director of the Center for Medicare Advocacy in Willimantic, and married to Kenneth Dardick, MD, has been tapped to join the federal Bipartisan Long-Term Care Commission. Created earlier this year as part of the American Tax Relief Act, the commission is responsible for developing a plan for a comprehensive set of long-term care services for seniors and people with disabilities.

Focused on legal representation of the elderly since beginning her legal career in 1975, Attorney Stein was the Co-Director of Legal Assistance to Medicare Patients (LAMP), where she managed the first Medicare advocacy program in the country. She has extensive experience in developing and administering Medicare advocacy projects, representing Medicare beneficiaries, producing educational materials, teaching and consulting. She has been lead or co-counsel in numerous federal class action and individual cases challenging improper Medicare policies and denials.

"I cannot think of a single person better equipped than Judy Stein to serve on this commission as it addresses the issues facing seniors and our aging Baby Boomer population," said Congressman **Joe Courtney** (D-Second District). "Over the past 25 years, Judy has transformed the Center for Medicare Advocacy from a local voice into a national leader on Medicare and Medicaid policy. I am extremely pleased that her years of experience and expertise will be put to good use as the commission tackles big challenges ahead."
