As a result, in the past year, orthopaedics have captured more market share growth than any other specialty at Windham Hospital.

Among the department's areas of specialty are hand and upper extremity treatment; total joint care including hip, knee, ankle, foot, shoulder, elbow, and finger replacement procedures; sports



ccording to the American Heart Association of Connecticut, cardiovascular diseases and stroke are the top causes of death in the state. To better provide local, high-quality care to a growing number of patients in Eastern Connecticut, the cardiology team at Windham

Service With A Smile: Valet Parking Returns to Windham Hospital

indham Hospital is now offering a free valet parking service at the Atrium/Shea entrance. Visitors simply pull into Shea Circle, where a uniformed attendant greets them, assists them to the door if needed, and then parks the car.

Making its debut in the midst of construction and inclement weather, the new valet service will continue year-round, in response to feedback received from patients and visitors about the need for more convenient parking.

The new service is part of the hospital's commitment to excellence and extraordinary service to patients from the moment they enter the hospital grounds. The hilly nature of the campus can be difficult for people to navigate whether they are walking with a cane or crutches, in a wheelchair, feeling the effects of treatment, or simply pushing a baby stroller. Cold weather, snow, ice or construction further complicate the situation. This service offers curbside access to the hospital, and eliminates the need to maneuver through the parking lots.

Although staff members from many departments had suggested initiating a valet service, the Security Team at Windham Hospital stepped forward to research needs and traffic patterns, analyze service options and create the proposal outlining location and hours of operation. Valet parking (staffed by Valet Park of America) is current-

ly available Monday through Friday, from 6:30 am to 3:00 pm. In the future, valet service may be expanded to other entrances.

arilyn Kritzman, MD, FCAP, a pathologist with Pathology Associates of Windham, has been with Windham Hospital since 1996. She is Board Certified in Anatomic and Clinical Pathology. With the hospital's synergies from the recent partnership with Clinical Laboratory Partners (CLP) and Computerized Physician Order Entry (CPOE), the laboratory is seeing an increase in volume.

As a youth, Dr. Kritzman was fascinated with science, mostly as it related to living organisms. She also had a strong desire to help people. These factors led her to apply for medical school and to pursue a career in medicine. She emigrated to the United States, marrying her husband in California. Coincidentally, when he was transferred to Connecticut, she was offered a residency at Hartford Hospital. "We immediately liked Connecticut as a good place to raise a family," she recalls, and they have lived in West Hartford ever since. When she completed her fellowship at Hartford Hospital, Dr. Kritzman joined Windham Hospital after learning that Nadia Nashid, MD, FCAP, Chief of Pathology and Laboratory Medical Director, was looking for a pathologist.

Born and raised in South America, Dr. Kritzman has never forgotten her roots. For the past five years, she has travelled to Central America once or twice a year through a Vermont-based organization called Grounds for Health. Through local coffee plantations, a small team of volunteer OB/GYNs, nurses, midwives, and social workers visit selected communities for one week. During this time, the team provides 400-600 women with cervical cancer screenings, pap smears, diagnosis, treatment, and patient education. The team also trains local healthcare providers to continue the work once the team is gone.

When asked what she likes most about being a pathologist, she said that she enjoys working behind-the-scenes within her field of expertise. "It's pretty amazing. The microscope opens up a whole new world that very few people get to see." The Laboratory is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Please call 860.456.6790 for more information.

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medicine, including surgical and non-surgical treatments and prevention techniques on both an individual and team basis; and physical therapy.

The hospital also has a strategic partnership with Eastern Rehabilitation Network (a member of Hartford HealthCare) and one of Connecticut's largest physical therapy providers. This partnership enables patients to interface with top therapists in the area, facilitating a full and speedy recovery.

To provide such top-level care, Windham Hospital goes far beyond the x-ray to treat its patients. MRIs, bone density studies, sports medicine imaging and advanced imaging-related injections are just some of the specialized diagnostic tools the hospital is using to address musculoskeletal health issues. In many cases, even the subtlest of joint injuries can be detected before they become a major problem. This leads to a choice of therapeutic treatment over surgery, faster recovery times, and the patient's quick return to a normal lifestyle.

"We really do have a vast wealth of resources, technologies and treatments to help get patients back to enjoying the activities that are important to them," says **Charles Shooks, MD**, Chief of Staff at Windham Hospital, "but what really sets us apart is our physicians." At the heart of the department are its three dedicated physicians, **Stephen F. Scarangella, MD; Vincent I. MacAndrew, Jr., MD;** and **Robert O'Connor, MD.** These highly qualified doctors are among the leading practitioners in their fields.

Dr. Scarangella's expertise is in hand and upper extremity conditions, with a specialty in traumatic, neurological, and arthritic reconstructive surgery. His patients range from children and recreational athletes, to elite professional athletes. He is a consultant for the Detroit Tigers baseball club; team physician for the minor league affiliate Connecticut Tigers; and team physician for the athletic teams of Eastern Connecticut State University. ext orders are NOT acceptable. The Joint Commission recently clarified that it is not acceptable for physicians to text orders for patients to the hospital or other healthcare resources. Why? Because there is no ability to verify the identity of the person sending the text, and no way to keep the original message electronically as validation of what is entered into the medical record.

Beginning April 1, specimens submitted for laboratory testing MUST have the patient's full first and last name plus date of birth. Specimens that are not properly labeled will be rejected.

History and physicals on pre-op patients must be completed less than 30 days prior to surgery.

Computerized Physician Order Entry (CPOE) went live on February 16. Please keep me informed on how the new process and technology are working.


