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BILLS GET OK FOR **S**TADIUM LOAN

• BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — The Buffalo Bills moved closer to landing \$200 million in NFL funding to help finance their bid to build a new stadium, a person with direct knowledge of the situation told The **Associated Press** on Friday.

The NFL's stadium and finance committee backed the Bills' request for what's called a G4 loan, by recommending the team's application be presented at the league's owner meetings for final approval, the person said, speaking on the condition of anonymity because the decision was made privately.

The committee's approval was anticipated. and it will require 24 of the NFL's 32 owners to formally OK the loan during a vote scheduled to take place on Monday.

 BEREA, Ohio (AP) — Deshaun Watson sat stoically behind the microphone, and for nearly 40 minutes barely talked about football.

Tigers go down swinging in defeat to Lancers

HERSHEY — Southern Columbia didn't go down without a fight, turning an early fourth-quarter, 13-point deficit into a two

possession game with just over one minute remaining. The Tigers, unfortunately, couldn't get closer than five, falling to Neshannock, 62-56, in the Class 2A girls

basketball championship. The loss snapped the Tigers' 20-game winning streak dating back to Jan. 14. They finish 29-2.

"We could be sitting at home and not even be having a medal," Southern coach Kami Traugh said. "We're still one of the top two teams in the state, and there are a lot of positives

son. There's only one happy team out of this game, and unfortunately, it wasn't us."

Southern went on a 10-1 run, spanning just shy of 3½ minutes to close within 56-51 with 1:15 left to play. The Tigers couldn't close the gap further, and much of that was due to not driving home shots that fell for much of the season. They missed close range shots, including layups, a trio of free throws and when times got desperate, a pair of 3-pointers.

The Lancers, meanwhile, did what they had to do to keep the Tigers at bay. They made their last six free-throw attempts and shut down all but Loren Gehret — who scored the Tigers' final five points on defense.



"They were here and ready to go," Neshannock coach Luann Grybowski said of the Lancers. "They were a lot more nervous than I thought they'd be. Once we took a 13-point lead I thought we were set. Then they hit a couple of shots and it's a game again.

That press defense did something not many teams can say they did: gave Southern fits.

Alli Griscavage entered the title game leading the team with 16 points and 12.3 rebounds per game. She still had a strong performance with 12 points and nine rebounds, but with all-state player Mairan Haggerty – a fellow 6-foot, 1-inch player — and Megan Pallerino (5-11) defending, they made those seemingly easy shots all year that much tougher for Southern — which did out-rebound the Lancers, 40-29.

"We knew we were going to be outsized," Traugh said. "We were hoping that we could get some more outside shots, but they play good man and we just had to

move some more. "Alli is our top scorer and top rebounder, but we were getting points from a lot of other girls. Her fouling out wasn't the issue for me, it was us as a team not boxing out and doing what we had to do defensively, and

that's as a team.' With the Tigers taking away the inside for much of the contest, the Lancers adjusted nicely by moving the ball around until a girl was left wide open. That player was often found beyond the arc, with the Lancers draining nine 3-pointers. Four of those occurred in the third quarter, helping them carry an 11-point lead into the final frame.

It also helped them take their lead for good with 4:40 in the first, hitting a pair of treys after Ava Novak started the contest with a 3-pointer of her own.

Despite never regaining the lead, the Tigers did tie things at 19 by going on a 6-0 run to start the second quarter. Tillett and Gehret helped keep the Tigers close by scoring eight first-half points apiece.

"It's a big stage and I feel once they got comfortable, we started playing our game," Traugh said. "I think that's what led to that second-quarter run."
